



A reminder: VISITORS/GUESTS/HOLIDAYMAKERS please be aware...

NO OVERNIGHT PARKING ON THE CARNSER CAR PARK — It has been brought to our attention that several people staying in holiday cottages in Blakeney, are told by the owners of the cottages that they can park overnight on the Carnser Car Park on Blakeney Quay. This is not true, the signs advise that **no overnight parking** is permitted on The Carnser, and this is due to the fact that the Carnser Car Park is liable to unpredictable tidal flooding. Many of the vehicles that are caught out and flooded have been parked overnight on the Car Park when they should not have been. There are alternative car parks for overnight car parking, including Coronation Car Park and Blakeney Village Hall Car Park.

Would you like to be considered as a representative on the Blakeney Dinghy Park Joint Management Committee?

We wish to appoint two Members of the Public, as public representatives on the Dinghy Park Joint Management Committee. Whilst Peter Roe & Steve Roch, are both happy to continue, we offer the opportunity to the wider public before appointing. Anyone interested must be aware of the following criteria (which means that the members of the public cannot be serving Parish Councillors or members of the Blakeney Sailing Club. Interested persons must apply in writing to the Clerk by Friday 25th August 2023.

- 1. The Dinghy Park Joint Management Committee (DPJMC) will comprise the following named representatives, which are to be agreed by Blakeney Parish Council before they attend their first meeting as a new representative:
 - 3 x Parish Councillors
 - 3 x Blakeney Sailing Club Members
 - 2 x Members of Public
 - 1 X Blakeney Harbour Association (was a recent addition; they represent all user groups as opposed to just one)
 - 1 x National Trust but with no voting rights
- 2. No one group has more than 40% Group Representation on this committee, whether directly or indirectly. Going forward, any individual being nominated for the DPC, must declare their membership of any other group and the appointment will not be accepted, if it takes any group over the 40% threshold.

EXTRACTS FROM THE JULY FULL COUNCIL MEETING...

Chairman's Announcements:

Electric Car Charing Points – Blakeney Village Hall Trust had met with Anglian Car Charging and having discussed the finer points, including costs and the rapidly changing technology, they have decided to reconsider this in a couple of years' time and not proceed at the moment. (Our understanding is that the Royal British Legion are still in discussion with regard their site in the High Street.)

Scout Hut – The depleted committee met recently and are keen for us to move this forward, although the ramp remains an issue, i.e., not compliant with DDA or planning permission, items which are to be sorted before BPC takes over any responsibility.

County Councillor – Michael Dalby to be asked if he can chase the outstanding work on Back Lane, work which has been undertaken would appear to be somewhat lacking.

Open Public Session – The Liberal Democratic member, standing for the next General Election, shared some information regarding Holt Medical Practice, as Melton Constable Surgery currently falls within his Norfolk County Council division, hence a mutual concern and he would urge everyone to respond to the Holt Medical Practice Consultation which is likely to open at the end of this month.

Planning Items – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building.

PF/23/1149 – Proposal; Alterations to garage including modifications to roof, to join it to the main roof to accommodate a bedroom in roof space with formation of four new dormer windows at, Avalon, 8A Morston Road, Blakeney. Resolved – No objection.

PF/23/1209 – Proposal; Proposed first floor loft conversion with dormer on west-facing roof slope; alterations to fenestration and external materials at; **2** Kingsway, Blakeney. Resolved – No objection.

RV/23/1263 – Proposal; Variation of condition 2 (approved plans) of planning permission PF/21/2307 – to vary single-storey extensions, removal of part of roof and extension to provide first floor accommodation and other external alterations at; Cranford, High Street, Blakeney. Resolved – No objection.

PF/22/1415 & LA/22/1416 – Proposal; Alternations, partial demolition of garden wall and erection of garden shed and Internal and external works to dwelling at; The Friary, Mariners Hill, Blakeney. Resolved – Object; We agree with the comments made by Historic England, in that; Heritage Assets are an irreplaceable resource and should be conserved and great weight should be given to this. The desire is to preserve or enhance the character and appearance of

conservation areas. This application does not concord with this desire.

PF/23/1329 – Proposal; Porch to front elevation of dwelling at; **Point View**, **Saxlingham Road**, **Blakeney**. *Resolved* – **No objection**.

PF/23/1330 – Proposal; Single storey extensions and external alternations to dwelling at; **Charnwood**, **Pintail Drive**, **Blakeney.** Resolved – **Object**; We consider this to be overdevelopment of the site.

FINANCE - Accounts totalling £12,788.62 were approved.

- Since our July Parish Council meeting, we have now had the Whole Council Training evening, which was attended by 9 out of 11 cllrs, all of whom enjoyed the session which was delivered by Norfolk Parish Training Partnership.
- NCC Highways have advised that they will support
 the parish as much as possible in our desire to follow
 the NNDC Conservation Area Appraisal Plan,
 with regard reducing the amount of rogue signage in
 the village. They ask that BPC contact the
 businesses/organisations first and ask them to remove
 their boards, stating that if they do not then highways
 will remove them and take them away for recycling.
- To confirm that the number of members of the **Dinghy Park Management Committee** is in fact 9, not 6 as mentioned at the AGM.
- A149 Hunstanton to Sheringham proposed Speed Limit Amendments NCC Community & Environmental Services have advised that following the number of objections and reoccurring concerns received during the statutory consultation, NCC has decided not to reduce the speed limit from the existing National Speed Limit down to 40mph and this scheme will no longer be progressed.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups

Blakeney Surgery (Holt Medical Practice/HMP) – Cllr Nigel Sutcliffe

- The survey undertaken by our MP has been published and he is to contact HMP about its results. We await to hear the result of those discussions.
- The survey completed by Healthwatch has now been completed with 271 respondents. The majority of those (76%) indicate that the closure would have a negative impact upon them particularly with regards to how they are to travel to get medical support. This

- report will be used by Healthwatch in their consultations with the Integrated Care Board (ICB).
- Four FOI questions have now been asked of HMP to provide details of;
 - 1. The work relationship between HMP and Holt Medical Services Ltd.
 - 2. A request for their financial year end balance sheets from 2018 to 2023.
 - 3. Any discussions regarding the sale of Blakeney surgery.
 - 4. Any discussions regarding the purchase of Blakeney surgery.
 - We await a response from HMP.
- My application to join the HMP Patients Participation Group has been rejected on the grounds of my close involvement in the resistance to close the surgery.
- Healthwatch have had a meeting with HMP regarding their requirement as part of the ICB process to undertake a consultation process as the 'contractor' in accordance with 'Advice Note 3: Procedure for requests to close branch surgeries'. The keys issues coming out of that meeting are that;
- HMP will arrange patient engagement meeting at Blakeney with the date to be determined and with an independent chair provided by Healthwatch.
- Three drop-in sessions will be arranged at Holt surgery, Melton Constable surgery and Holt library with the dates yet to be agreed.
- Healthwatch will work with HMP to prepare their own survey.
- Healthwatch will act as the 'honest broker' to ensure the timetable for a 3-month consultation period is maintained.

Whilst this is progress, bearing in mind that so far HMP have done nothing with regards to consulting with patients about the closure of the surgery, it does give me a cause for concern. Our efforts so far have been with the patients who have been adversely affected by the closure of Blakeney surgery. The consultation by HMP will be based upon the whole of their practice, most of whom will be unaffected by their closure decision. Can I ask that all BPC councillors make sure they get involved in this Healthwatch process at any opportunity you can.

BPC agreed unanimously that it was time to get involved in a direct dialogue with HMP to raise our concerns and to express community concerns. It was agreed that our Chair, Vice Chair, and the District Councillor, should arrange a meeting with HMP to commence this process.

Blakeney Neighbourhood Plan - Cllr Rosemary Thew -NNDC have advised that the referendum will take place on Thursday 14th September 2023, and we urge everyone to vote on the day. A 'Referendum Information Sheet' will be published on the NNDC website no later than 28 days prior to the referendum. While the Neighbourhood Plan cannot be formally 'made' (adopted) until after a positive referendum result, national planning policy and legislation stipulates that emerging Neighbourhood Plans, and in particular 'postexamination' plans, should be given appropriate weight in decision making where that Plan is a material consideration to the application. Consequently, the issuing of the Decision Statement on Thursday 29th June brought into force the Neighbourhood Plan as a material consideration in the planning application process, where proportionate regard and weight should now be given to the post-examination draft neighbourhood plan (referendum version) in decision making as far as it is material to any planning application.

Dinghy Park Management Committee Meeting – *Cllr Alban Donohoe* gave a summary of the last meeting and the minutes will be available on the BPC website as usual.

We have reappointed outside members to the following committees; **Party on Pastures/Events**; Alison Wagstaffe, Alison Jewell, Lynn Massingham & Jess Daynes and also the **Dinghy Park Management Committee**; the Blakeney Sailing Club will reconfirm their representatives to us very soon, as will the Blakeney Harbour Association, (in the meantime, status quo) and our 2 public representatives, Peter Roe and Steve Roch, have both advised that they are happen to remain, however, we do have to advertise these position also.

No Councillors questions.

Thoughts from the Rectory for August

Dear Friends,

"BREATHING SPACE"

Ahhh!... August... holidays... summer. You can almost hear people taking a concerted deep breath! Well, of course, August is a month we still traditionally associate with holidays, and with "taking a breather."

Needless to say, many people will not be heading off anywhere with their proverbial bucket and spade this month, either for reasons of work, or age, or finance, or having taken a holiday at some other time, and so on. But for many, it will be a time of rest and relaxation, a breathing space in a busy life.

And we need our breathing spaces. Whatever our condition, and however we take our relaxation, we all need to pause and re-charge. And this goes much further than summer holidays. The same principle applies each week and even each day. We are not built to carry on dashing around continuously like robots. God has given us a pattern of busy-ness and stillness, built around the biblical idea of a Sabbath rest.

I remember attending a day event called "Breathing Space." It was a sort of mini-retreat, a chance to stop and draw breath, and to reflect on the blessings of God in creation, humanity, and art. One person was speaking on "the importance of making space (breathing space) in our lives, so that God can work in us."

My take is that one of the keys to fulfilment is to find God in everything, and to feel in touch with God. To do that involves awareness, and the gift of finding joy in the moment. But I think we can only do that if we make space in our lives. Breathing space. Not easy! But perhaps we can make ourselves stop and look at a sunset or a flower or a painting, and not rush past. We all need breathing space. We are, after all, as has been pointed out before, "human beings" not "human doings"!

This August, I hope you have some opportunity – at home or away – to draw breath and re-charge your batteries. But do not forget the need for little breathing spaces throughout the other eleven months of the year too!

We have completed 80 concerts since we started on October 14th 2021. Highlights for this season up to Christmas will include programmes for the Cley WI, words and music about Nelson and the poet Thomas Hardy - and of course the usual varied instrumentalists. If you have not managed to come before, do please give us a go. There is no charge for the music or the refreshments afterwards, although we encourage you to make a donation to the Church Restoration Fund.

Cley Parish Council's Chairman's Report July 2023

We were pleased to meet Tim Schofield at July's PC meeting. He is the planning advisor working on the replacement dwelling on the Arcady site, together with a local conservation and heritage architect. He stressed that there will be public consultation at the design stage, prior to any application being submitted. Apologies to those joining remotely that the zoom connection was so poor.

There will be a Public Meeting on 1st August at Blakeney Village Hall from 5-6.30pm to discuss the future of Blakeney Surgery, where the practice will give its reason to close the surgery and parishioners will have an opportunity to speak. If you are going to Harbour Day instead, the practice will be running a survey from 14th August which is open till 30th September; hard copies will be available at each surgery and sent to housebound residents; drop-in sessions will be held at Kelling and Melton surgeries and at Holt library (dates to be confirmed). There will also be comment boxes in each surgery.

The practice will text patients a link to the practice website page and the survey. You can email or write to the practice. The survey will be available in large print, translated into any language or in braille. The consultation period ends 30th September so there is plenty of time and ways to share your views. If you do not have a car, I calculate it will be a 3hr 42m round trip by bus from CLEY to get to Kelling Surgery (including an hour's walk if the Holt Hopper bus stops running) and a 5hr 24m round trip to Melton!

We are currently discussing with the Village Hall Committee an approach by Norfolk County Council to ascertain our interest in their community focussed electric vehicle charge point (EVCP) network, as the Village Hall owns the car park and their views are essential.

NNDC Enforcement and Planning Officers have been out to the Barn on Cookes Marsh to look at recent works. We wait to hear the outcome.

We were disappointed that the proposed speed limit reduction along the A149 from Hunstanton to Sheringham will not be progressed due to negative feedback from consultees. The funding that had been made available has been set aside for other measures to improve the route and keep villages and road network as safe as possible.

We think we may have found government funding for the second defibrillator to be installed in the newly repainted phone box.

We still have plenty of money available for hardship support from our £2,500 Community Support Grant so do please contact the Clerk if we can assist you at all, clerk.cley@gmail.com or 07812384889. All enquiries will be treated confidentially.

The next Parish Council Meeting is on Thursday September 14th in the Village Hall at 6.30pm. The agenda will be published on the Notice Board, on the website (www.cleypc.info) and we will mail it out to those on the Parish email list (if you want to be included in this please email the Clerk) and the village WhatsApp group. Please comment on or ask general questions about Agenda items before the meeting by getting in touch with the clerk or myself, or come along and participate. Minutes are posted as usual on the website.

District Councillors Report July/August 2023

From NNDC: 'Youth Council

The NNDC Youth council is prioritising mental health, with a focus on engaging with local schools to raise the profile of mental health support and services. They will be working with MIND to promote their services for young people.

Planning

We are expecting the processing of planning applications held up by Nutrient Neutrality to be starting late summer. Blakeney Neighbourhood Plan referendum will be held on September 14th. Holt Neighbourhood Plan has been approved at referendum. Work continues the draft of the Glaven Valley Conservation Area appraisal which will go out to public consultation after it is discussed at the Planning Policy Working Party. Biodiversity net gain on planning applications of 10% becomes mandatory in November. Enforcement have 194 live cases and are clearing the backlog of historic cases.

Coastal

There is a bid for a UNESCO world heritage site status for an East Atlantic flyway along the east coast, including North Norfolk, for migratory birds, supported by the RSPB and other stakeholders.

Benefits

The Financial Inclusion team provides support and guidance to residents on money matters such as debt advice. In the last 7 months they have had 650 cases referred and have completed almost 300. Discretionary Housing payments are available to help with rent arrears, rent deposit, moving costs and ongoing rent shortfall (for example for those on housing benefits but living in private rented housing).

Households in receipt of Council Tax Support will be awarded up to £25 against their council tax bill. It's proposed that NNDC gives Citizens Advice a grant of £66k to provide advice and advocacy services, including a specialised debt advisor based at NNDC one day a week. We are keeping the invaluable Community Connectors through the end of April 2024. Social Prescribers received 77 referrals in the last two months. Please get in touch with me or call NNDC (01263513811) if you would like to be referred for any benefits.

Housing

Through government grants of £1.8 million, NNDC and Flagship have purchased 11 homes for refugee households, another 3 for Afghan households and one for a homeless household. Long term, these will be available to households on the housing list and the homeless. These are much needed as we have 3 homeless Ukrainian families, 2 in temporary accommodation and one family being asked to leave by their hosts. NNDC anticipates completion of 27 affordable houses in 23-24 with 350 in the next few years.

These are also much needed as there were 2538 households on the housing list as of 30th June, with 72 households in temporary accommodation. The Early Intervention team which targets people at risk of homelessness opened 48 new cases April to May and helped 28 households to stay in their own homes or find alternate accommodation. NNDC is loaning £110k to Homes for Wells to help purchase of two affordable homes and support their work. Eligibility criteria for warm homes grants have been simplified and more residents are eligible for energy efficiency works. The Integrated Housing Adaptations Team is busy with 87 new contacts in the last 2 months. 142 Disabled Facilities Grants were awarded last financial year. It is proposed that the Disabled Facilities Discretionary grant scope is broadened to allow more homes to be adapted. It is expected this will cost £240k and be funded by the Better Care Fund.

Sustainable business

NNDC has received £150k and will receive £300k from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. This will go the North Norfolk Sustainable Communities Fund, Visit North Norfolk, the Go Digital programme for businesses and The New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership. NNDC has received £364k and will receive £1 million from the Rural England Prosperity Fund. A capital grant scheme to support local businesses and communities is currently being finalised.

An online Business Support Hub has been created which provides advice, information, and resources to support you and your business. Contact economic.growth@north-norfolk.gov.uk for more details.

Property services

Project enabling works are progressing at the Albert Street conveniences, however we are waiting for a budget to be confirmed.

Environment

Approximately 3.5 tonnes of small electrical equipment and batteries have been collected in the first few months of the scheme

Bin collections continue to be an issue. Please contact me with problems.

Customer service

The average wait time for a customer service representative is 4m 22s which is not at the target of 2m 30s.

Finance

The outturn position for 22/23 is a £0.782m overspend.'

I continue to wholeheartedly support the campaign against the closure of Blakeney Surgery. If you do not have a car, I calculate it will be a 3hr 42m round trip by bus from CLEY to get to Kelling Surgery (including an hour's walk if the Holt Hopper bus gets cancelled) and a 5hr 24m round trip to Melton! There will be a Public Meeting on Tuesday August 1st at 5pm in the Village Hall, for you to hear the reasons this closure is proposed and share your views. It would be great if as many of you could come to this meeting, though I realise the 1st is Harbour Day which is understandably very popular. If you cannot make it, the practice will be running a survey from 14th August which is open till 30th September; hard copies will be available at each surgery and sent to housebound residents; drop-in sessions will be held

at Kelling and Melton surgeries and at Holt library (dates to be confirmed). There will also be comment boxes in each surgery. The practice will text patients a link to the practice website page and the survey. You can email or write to the practice. The survey will be available in large print, translated into any language or in braille. The consultation period ends 30th September so there is plenty of time and ways to share your views!

The Coastal supermarket, which was in Blakeney, is now going to be in Holt from Thursday 20th July, based at Independence matters, Holt Hub, Charles Road, Holt, from 10am-12om every Thursday. You pay a one-off payment of £3.50 to join (lifetime membership, no renewal cost) then this can be used at other bases e.g., Wells at the Cottage Hospital (which is open Wednesdays 1-4pm, Fridays 10-1pm and Saturdays 9.30-12.30). The food is about 30% cheaper than Tesco and the fruit and veg is free!



Letter's & Articles

Still Life

Having lost three dear friends in the space of two weeks, and two others in recent months I'm prompted to take a break before the last leg of our coastal walk and reflect on the passage of time and the brevity of our lives.

As a child I played in and around the old granaries and coal stores of Blakeney; inside they were as they had been the day the last ship sailed. Balks of timber, old tins and buckets, a rusting and untidy footnote to so many busy centuries, but among it for me a few prizes in the form of some very rare match boxes. I was too young to realise I was looking at the end of a history, of the events and the excitement this place had seen from Tudor times until just a few decades before that moment, the last ship left the quay in 1919. Within a decade of my rummagings that world was gone, vast storage spaces turned into shops, flats, and art galleries, I only see it now in sepia or black and white photos. Looking through them it becomes a familiar world, but not in colour, and it almost becomes natural think that that was how it was, to forget that their world was in colour, not perhaps the bright colours we have today but in colour nonetheless.

Piddy Palmer with his white beard standing self-consciously in his best suit and hat holding his little cart with it's shellfish, samphire and un-skinned rabbits; was his suit blue? brown?, grey? I wonder. A group of women with spotless white aprons in the street, poised delicately and unconcernedly amongst the horse muck, beyond them some young lads clearly fascinated by something as mysterious as a newfangled camera.

On a bright summer afternoon two women walking up the high street, one of them pushing a pram, with no inkling that I would be watching their backs 100 years later. A group of children beside the channel in their Sunday best; were they dressed for the photo or had they just come from chapel? Or less likely at that time, from church. Their smiles reaching into the future to make me smile, and quite a reach as this is one of the oldest I have, it must have been taken at least a 140 years ago. Those children will have had children of their own, become grand parents, and possibly, if they survived the first world war, great grand parents, and will have been in the ground by the church now for over 70 years; we are fleetingly transient, like passengers on a train we come and we go, This village, every village has hosted many generations, every few decades the village has a different population*, all knowing it in a different way. The world those children knew, the village they knew, the life they knew, so different. Queen Victoria was on the throne and they may well have been among the very first that 'had' to go to school, and so avoided the toil of child labour.

Even with that education what would they grow up to be? Fishermen, deckhands, farm labourers, scullery maids, probably not much else on offer unless you were the son or daughter of one of the wealthy merchants. Not far away a ship lying on her side on the hard, probably to be caulked or re-tarred, an image which reminds me of one of Sam's Parson's stories (he was alive at the time) of a ship laid up for caulking, but due to a misunderstanding was broken up instead, I bet they were popular.

So many frozen moments, a cluster of mussel canoes and sailing dinghies, overloaded with people watching a regatta swimming race. A crowd of hundreds gathered by the quayside for lifeboat day. A man standing by his wheel barrow, arms folded, looking at a horse and cart passing with what looks like someone's household possessions heading off down the hill. Where were they going? Was the furniture about to be loaded onto a ship for Newcastle or London, or were they just going round the corner. The London and Newcastle packets plied regularly from Blakeney to those two places, much quicker than overland, Blakeney then was the equivalent of a rail terminal today, people coming by wagons from all around to travel to distant places.

The Taffy, the only steamer to ever get up to the quay, a bustle of activity around her, men pushing barrows, others clearly hurrying with sacks on their backs. This might appear to have been normal quayside activity if no other information were available, but in the same interview with Sam Parsons, I learned that she was so big that they knew the spring tides they had taken advantage of to get her up to the quay would only give them one more opportunity to get her out again, so every man on the quay was roped in to get her loaded. She had come in stern first having been turned by the bridge, the only place wide enough for that to be achieved. She looked so big towering over the porters, but when she reached Newcastle with her grain, she would would have appeared to be little more than a tug against the ocean-going vessels she would have tied up amongst. And this of course, apart from relentless siltation, was the reason for the collapse of all that history, the surge of progress during that terrible war turned wooden coastal traders into larger steam ships, too big to get up to Blakeney.

The Minstrel a beautiful ketch tied up at the quay and owned by Billy (Slussy) Temple, he sailed her, with either a boy or his dog as 2nd mate; a large vessel to sail single-handed, but I wouldn't disbelieve it. He would come up to the quay with a load of coal from up north and sell it straight from the ship to the people of the village, often delivered by young boys with little carts. By the spring when it had all been sold, he would load up with grain to go back the other way.

The Yankee, a large 70-foot ex-lighter converted into a steam powered tug sitting alongside low quay, what is left of her rusting remains today on (of course) 'Yankee Ridge' just a short distance away from Pinchen's Creek where the ferry boats once unload their passengers on the Point. Seeing the length of what is left of her it is difficult to imagine how such a large vessel could ever have easily turned round in the channel, even at that time. Only the manoeuvre of the Taffy seems likely.

Westgate Street, showing a post office and shop in the middle of the row that now houses the Spar shop. When I lived in Westgate Street in the 1950s there were no shops at all, just a small bakery on their end of the row. I recall going to see my first film 'Treasure Island' at the Regal Cinema in Holt and getting off the cinema bus at the crossroads and looking down a dark Westgate Street to see the only light above the Kings Arms swinging sign; I was Jim Hawkins back by the Admiral Benbow. But odd how there was a shop, then there was not, then Dudley and Kenny Hill came along and there was another in exactly the same place to eventually become the Spar.

And more recent shots; photos that don't seem like history to me as I was there. The 53 tidal surge and its aftermath of wreckage, the mountains of tangle splashed up against the Blakeney Hotel, the beautiful Jane Hannah lodged in Quay House wall, all one side of her smashed in, the Hotel's entrance completely blocked with boats and a huge lake called Blakeney Freshes.


And closer in time, faces I know, those I shared my life with. Friends, relatives, workmates and wise advisors. Stratton Long my employer for a few years and a valuable friend and guide, Billy Long and Jimmy Temple, John Bean and Kitch, John Wallace, Harry, and Colin Bishop, and of course my walking companion Mike Curtis; friends with whom I spent so many happy times. They are of course in colour, as they will remain in photos, in memory and in dreams.

* Sadly, the turn of the generations is coming to a close as the indigenous community declines and will soon disappear altogether as the new populations will come from elsewhere. For all its history Blakeney has had inward and outward migration, for probably 2000 years the village make up has slowly altered as people leave and arrive, Scots, Danes, Swedes and Dutch, comings and goings and the village gene pool slowly changing. So, from Doomsday till the last century if would be almost completely different, but never will its population have been so entirely replaced in such a short time.
