

The theme was 'The light of the world' Cat got us all started and focused, encouraging us in some energetic dance moves.

This worked really well with BHA AGM following on immediately afterwards. Thanks to all those that attended and we will respond to all the enquiries received.

The documents give a summary of the engineering works that B3CT plan to carry out 2022/23 subject to obtaining the necessary consents from landowners and regulators.

It is based on minimising the impact on the natural environment whilst at the same time improving the navigation of New Cut. The purpose is to "work with nature" in order to provide a 10-metre-wide navigational channel within New Cut to lengthen the amount of time that leisure craft can use the channel at high tide.

The aim is to regrade the channel, removing the sand bars, but not digging a new deep channel, so as to increase the flow of the New Cut.

The main engineering principles are:

- To protect the channel banks where possible so to prevent further erosion of them to; reduce loss of ancient marshland and reduce the eroded materials silting up New Cut
- To speed the flow of New Cut to encourage natural flushing of the channel
- No export of siltation from site where materials are dredged, they will be;
 - o relocated behind/in new brushwood frames or hard structures
 - used to fill rills/small channels in the Old Cut and on the western bank of New Cut to maximise the speed and energy of the tide when flooding and ebbing
 - moved with the aim of straightening New Cut to increase the tidal speed and ease its navigation by moving existing sand banks

The plan is to apply these principles in 5 zones of the Quay and New Cut as follows:

Zone A-Red House slipway to the public slipway on the Carnser

- Brushwood on the northern bank opposite the Quay, from the east end of the Red House beach to the Carnser corner. This is to prevent erosion of this northern bank currently caused mainly when the flood tide is deflected from the Quay. A gap will be left in the brushwood frames and structures to allow the Greasy Pole to be provided still.
- A new timber quay heading on the Carnser corner, from the end of the existing concrete quay heading on the car park round to the first (public) slipway following the line of the original timber quay heading. Height 1 to 2 metres so that Juno can still be floated over in winter
 - Silted material, mainly in front of the Blakeney Hotel, to be relocated elsewhere in New Cut

Zone B – Bridge Creek

- Straighten the channel westwards, from the bridge over the creek, so it is perpendicular to the bridge
- At the Cut end of the straightened Bridge Creek place two curved brushwood frames (north and south of new channel) to direct the flow from Bridge Creek northwards
- Relocate silted material (mainly by the Sailing Club slipway) elsewhere in New Cut to brushwood frames and fill rills

Zone C and D- North of Bridge Creek to top of the New Cut

- Construct brushwood frames on the western side of New Cut to protect that bank
- Relocate silted material elsewhere in New Cut to brushwood frames and fill rills
- Straighten the channel where possible to create a 10-metre-wide channel by relocating silt to other areas

Zone E - Corner of New Cut

• Relocate silted material elsewhere within New Cut to brushwood frames and to fill the Old Cut

Conclusion

The B3CT committee has arrived at this plan by; working with our consultants Exo Environmental, initial consultations with stakeholders, visiting other harbours with similar siltation problems. We consider this plan the best practical solution and compromise to deal with the siltation and navigational problems in the short to medium term.

We believe that this approach will minimise the impact for; the environment, boat users and mooring owners – though during engineering works there may be the need to move moorings or restrict navigation. The engineering will be completed during autumn to spring.

This design has rejected a number of engineering solutions as not being suited to New Cut, in particular – hard stone groynes, groynes or other structures protruding perpendicular into the channel, dredging and carting away the silt.

Next step

Depending on the exhibitions and any other consultations we will then move to obtaining the necessary statutory consents and approval from landowners.

B3CT has no funds currently. In order to obtain the necessary consents, then to carry out the engineering, we will need to raise fund raise from; public funding if available, seek donations, crowd funding or community fund raising.

Much is happening as we plan to fully re-open over the coming weeks. Many of you joined us for our open evening to hear about the community activities that are planned, and which are already under way. A programme that uses creative writing as the catalyst for online meet-ups, to address loneliness and isolation in the Armed Forces, gets going later this month.

We are preparing our timetable for the Wheelyboat (a small ferry to operate in the Harbour for use by the disabled) to commence in the Spring. Very encouraging interest from all sorts of local groups from special schools to Parkinson's groups.

The work to get our new community room refurbished has run into a few delays, but it should be operating early in '22. In the meantime, the Harbour Room itself is available most days.

Extracts from the meeting of Blakeney Parish Council which was held on Tuesday 2nd November 2021 in The Scout Hut.

Chairman's Announcements – I have received an email from the Chairman of Blakeney Parish Council in Gloucestershire, asking if we would be interested in twinning with them and they are keen to involve the Primary School. (BPC will make further enquiries.)

Open Public Session - Just to advise that the B3CT (Blakeney Channel Coastal Community Team) held a public exhibition at the village hall on the afternoon of 30th October 2021. This was well attended and much interest was shown.

Planning – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building.

PF/21/2378 – Proposal; Single storey garden room extension; insulated cladding to front elevation of main house, new entrance gates and associated boundary treatment; outdoor swimming pool and associated single storey detached 'pool house at, Blakeney Downs, Morston Road, Blakeney. Resolved – Object to the glass extension, as we feel this is simply too much glass in such a prominent location. We would also like details of the cladding material to be used. We have no objection to the other aspects of this application.

PF/21/2711 – Proposal; Erection of new agricultural worker's dwelling and change of use of associated land from agricultural to domestic at, New Barn Farm, Saxlingham Road, Blakeney. Resolved – Object; the siting of this proposed building is most unsuitable and is too visible for this most sensitive location and our comments with regard the previous application no. PO/20/1100 are still valid.

PF/21/2626 & LA/21/2627 – Proposal; Single storey side extension with roof terrace to part (internal and external works to dwelling) at, **4 Mariners Hill, Blakeney.** Resolved – No objection.

PF/21/2631 – Proposal; Replacement roof to part of dwelling with increased height and altered shape to provide additional first floor accommodation and balcony at; Stable Cottage, 6A High Street, Blakeney. Resolved – Object to the balcony, due to the overlooking of neighbouring properties.

PF/21/2778 – Proposal; Demolition of single-storey rear/side extension and erection of two-storey side extension at; **Point View, Saxlingham Road, Blakeney**. **Resolved** – No objection.

FINANCE

Accounts totalling £20,731.10 were approved and paid.

Completion of Audit – Notice of satisfactory conclusion of the external audit for the year ending 31st March 2021 has been received from PKF Littlejohn.

New Dog Bin – will be located on the Cart Track opposite, The Manor Hotel in due course, thanks to NNDC.

Resolved to apply to the NCC Parish Partnership Funding Scheme for each of the following;

- Works at entrance to Overflow Car Park on Langham Road, if planning permission is granted by NNDC. Cost will of course depend on any conditions imposed by NNDC if successful, and could be undertaken by a third party, subject to the contractor meeting highways specification.
- The installation of a live **Vehicle Information Sign** (notifying all coast road traffic, that the quayside car park is full etc.).
- Informal Trod to the east side of Langham Road approx. cost £15K in total (50/50 BPC/NCC) this is the figure guesstimated by NCC, although the work could be undertaken by a third party, subject to the contractor meeting highways specification.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups which have met recently.

We have received the request from the **Blakeney Neighbourhood Steering Group,** asking the Parish Council to formally state that it is happy to sign off for submission to NNDC, the Blakeney Draft Neighbourhood Plan. **Resolved** that we, BPC are happy to sign off the draft plan for submission.

COUNCILLORS QUESTIONS –

• Jane Armstrong asked the following question – How is the Council going to respond to the Keep Blakeney Special proposal of a trial reduction in the extent of parking on the Carnser, together with specific provision of disabled parking spaces?

Nigel Sutcliffe — Chairman of the 'Traffic Matters Working Group' responded; As a member of the TMWG Jane, you are aware that the group is looking at a far greater picture and that this is just one element, and not necessarily the most important. It is also true to say that not everyone agreed with the recommendation put forward. These things take time and involve other parties and we shall respond when we are ready to. Some aspects of the first submission made by Mr Lindop have already been discussed, actioned and published after agreement by Blakeney Parish Council. The second submission made by Mr Lindop has yet to be considered by the Traffic Matters Working Group and in view of the fact that it solely deals with the future of the Carnser Car Park, The National Trust will have to be involved as the other joint owner.

Edward Hackford asked the following question – Village Hall Car Park lights; who pays?

Clerk advised that this matter needs looking into further and historical information was being gathered and that a report/update will follow in due course. But it would appear

that the lights were installed for the users of the village hall when it was built in the early 1980's.

CORRESPONDENCE –

Resolved that we, **Blakeney Parish Council** are willing to correct the published statement made on 4th May 2021 in reference to the *public roadway across The Pastures*, as it is in fact a *private driveway across The Pastures*.

Resolved that we are fully supportive of the report from a Parish Cllr, regarding concerns over the level of medical provision at **Blakeney Surgery** and that we write to the Practice Manager at Holt Medical Practice raising our concerns over the future of the practice.

A letter of objection had been received from a parishioner with regard the installation of the **Telegraph Poles** on Langham Road, which appeared without any consultation with the parish. We are aware that BT may install these under permitted development rights, and noting the valid reasons BT list for objecting, it was *resolved* that we will take no further action.

Resolved that we are happy to issue the **Coastguard Team** with a key to our playing field, in the event of an emergency situation to land a helicopter, if need be, as was the case recently.

Resolved to decline the request allowing 'The Nest' Catering Trailer to attend and operate from the village hall car park at the Blakeney Christmas market in the village hall as opposed to operating from the much-improved kitchen facility within the village hall, as this is a commercial operation.

Following an update from the Almshouse Association and Charity Commission in relation to the **Blakeney War Memorial Cottages Trust**, Cllrs had to decide on i) How many trustees the charity should have. 



The Magic of Blakeney Point Richard Porter

On 4 November we welcomed Richard Porter who gave an illustrated talk entitled 'The Magic of Blakeney Point'. Richard is an ecologist and still works part-time, mostly in the Middle East on conservation projects.

Richard probably knows Blakeney Point, and the walk there and back from Cley beach, better than anyone else as he makes the trip regularly and has done so for over 20 years.

Blakeney Point is a very important site for migrating birds and Richard showed us fabulous pictures of a Bluethroat (very rare), Pied Flycatchers and Robins (did you know that they migrated?) and he saw 400 of them in one day at the Point. Then there are the Brent Geese, Shorelarks, Golden Plovers, Little Terns and the Sandwich Terns. The Terns nest on the Point and during the breeding season areas are roped off so that they are not disturbed - their populations are internationally important.

Some 295 species of flowering plants have been recorded including some very rare species. There are literally carpets of some of these beautiful plants from the Yellow Horned Poppy, Sea Campion, Sea Kale, the delightful Sea Pea, and

the rare Matted Sea Lavender and Shrubby Sea Blite, also very rare in Britain. It would be advisable to take a little book with you to identify these interesting plants.

Then there are the butterflies – 27 species, moths, dragonflies and ladybirds (Richard 'counted' 75 million on one day!). Mammals include a hare population whose numbers are rising again after the sea surge back in 2016, weasels and stoats

Finally, the most famous inhabitants of Blakeney Point – the Common and Grey Seals. This last season saw over 3000 pups being born and it is the largest colony in England. Squid, sunfish (normally found in much warmer waters) starfish, dolphins and a Sowerbys beaked whale have all been found on the shoreline. Thankfully oiled seabirds are now a rare sight.

It was a delightful talk enjoyed by a capacity audience.

Our next event is our AGM and Christmas Party on 2 December and all Members are welcome to attend.

Music In the Afternoon

Cley Church has embarked on a programme of thirty-minute musical recitals every Thursday at three o'clock. Each programme is performed by a small and varied ensemble of instrumentalists from the locality and is open to all with no admission fee.

With over 600 medieval churches in Norfolk, many in need of extensive repair and with dwindling congregations, it is increasingly difficult to justify their upkeep unless other uses can be found for these treasures of our local history and heritage. Following the acquisition of a beautiful new grand piano, the Friends of Cley have taken the initiative to increase the footfall in their lovely church by organising a series of musical events which it is hoped will grab the attention of all music lovers in the region.

The recitals which are deliberately small scale, easy to listen to and short - a moment's peace in the busy week - started in October with Angela Dugdale (piano) and Wyatt Earp (flute). To celebrate the arrival of the new piano and the establishment of this musical enterprise a full-scale concert was performed in the church on Saturday November 6th, which attracted an audience of nearly 150 people. It is hoped that more such concerts will follow in the months ahead. Cley Parish Council's Chairman's Report November 2021

We were very pleased to finally sign the Armed Forces covenant, especially relevant in Remembrance week, committing to support the Armed Forces community in any way we can. This is in recognition of the huge sacrifices our Armed Forces make on our behalf. Cllr Meadows will be our Armed Forces Champion.

Cllrs were given a guided tour of the Glandford Treatment works which was very interesting. The new treatment tank, put in place to reduce tankering, is just becoming active – the next test will be Christmas. The highly skilled Anglian Water engineers who took us round made a plea that we don't put fat down the sink, relevant with all that upcoming Christmas feasting, also of course not to flush wipes. Apparently cotton wool buds are just as bad.

CPC has voted to create a Neighbourhood Plan, which is a community led planning framework for guiding future development, regeneration and conservation in a parish. We're looking to preserve historic assets and ensure any development (extensions or replacement dwellings) is sympathetic, so Cley's NP will focus on heritage, design and local green spaces - keeping the remit tight should make it easier to take forward. The first step is to identify the plan area, notify NNDC, and then set up a community group to manage the process. If you're interested in getting involved, please do get in touch with us.

We're also planning to create a Cley Heritage Trail for visitors, which we envisage as a downloadable walk from the Village Hall around Cley's historic buildings and spaces. This would showcase many of our buildings, which not only are stunning examples of period architecture, but also have rich histories from the time when Cley was a thriving port and beyond.

We are arranging a time when Mr Robert Carter, in his role as Deputy Lieutenant, will present Cley with a Covid memorial plaque to represent, remember and acknowledge how our community pulled together in the challenging times of the pandemic. This is very well deserved as the village response in Cley was phenomenal. We have decided to mount the plaque next to David Holmes' memorial bench as a fitting tribute.

As we gear up to celebrate Christmas, please remember to use our bottle bank (in the Village Hall car park) for your empties. The price for recycled glass is at an all-time high so it's a great opportunity to make much needed money for the village.

The interim decision letter from the Inspector who led the Hangs Inquiry in the summer proposes to confirm public footpath rights to the two main footpaths. There are proposed modifications to the original order which means there will be a period when these are advertised and we are informed this may take a while.

Check out our new planning website, www.cleypc.info/planning. This includes the latest planning applications in Cley, CPC's planning guidance, such as our

Dark Skies Policy and Code of Construction Practice, as well as links to the emerging Local Plan from NNDC and Cley Conservation and Management Plan. We hope you find this interesting and it gives you a better idea of what is happening in Cley planning wise.

The latest iteration of the Arcady appeal is under consideration; this is essentially whether or not to approve the building as built. The planning application for the Barn on Cooks' Marsh for external works as part of its change of use to a hotel (which is under permitted development) is still in process.

The next meeting is Thursday, December 9thth at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. The agenda will be published on the Notice Board and on the website www.cleypc.info. Come along, no booking needed at present, please comment on or ask general questions about Agenda items before the meeting by getting in touch with the clerk or myself. Minutes are posted as usual on the website.

Wiveton Church Crowdfunder Appeal

The Friends of Wiveton Church have launched a Crowdfunder appeal to raise funds to repair the Chancel Roof of the Church.

Two years ago, a large medieval roof timber collapsed on to the altar and the church had to be closed. Temporary repairs allowed us to reopen the church but, unless the roof is rebuilt by the end of 2022, it will have to be closed again.

The Crowdfunder film features Desmond MacCarthy and Emma Bridgewater and, as an added incentive, anyone giving £100 or more will receive an Emma Bridgewater mug made specially for the roof appeal!

A number of benefactors and trusts, including Norfolk Churches Trust, have already donated or pledged £90,000 to support this restoration but we need to raise another £60,000. We are applying to the Heritage Lottery Fund and are trying to raise £25,000 through this Crowdfunding initiative.

We simply cannot allow this building, with its medieval graffiti, its peel of six bells ringing out over the Glaven Valley and its fine architecture, to close for the first time in more than 700 years.

We have already had some fantastic support but it would be lovely if you were able to help before the Appeal closes on 29th December.

Obituary Jim Woodhouse

Jim Woodhouse loved people. This was clear in every aspect of his life and his cheerful engagement with everyone he encountered. Small wonder, therefore, that he made an outstanding teacher and headmaster, and developed an enormous circle of friends in all walks of life.

He was born in Luton on 21st May 1933, the youngest of four children to the Rev. Jack and Kathleen Woodhouse. With his father's church postings, the family moved to Huddersfield and then Newcastle during the war before Jack was appointed Bishop of Thetford and the family settled in Norfolk. Jim was sent off to school at St Edwards in Oxford, where he thrived on the intensive mix of academic learning, sport, choir and community. His sister Rosemary wrote in her diary at the time: "I've never met a boy of 15 who knows so much about so many things, is such a reliable source of information and abounds in enthusiasm for life... why can't we all be like him?"

After national service with the Royal Artillery in Hong Kong, he read English at St Catherine's college at Cambridge. Cricket and athletics balanced his literary studies, and he also helped his fellow students by parking his old Morris so they could climb back into college from its rooftop after the gates were locked at night. And when home in Blakeney he also found and fell for Sarah, the eldest daughter of Hubert and Polly Blount, who had recently acquired Cley Hall Farm. Mum takes the credit for introducing Dad to sailing in those early days – in an old converted crab boat called *The Winking Seal*. They married in Cley church in 1957, with the whole village invited.

On graduating, Jim joined Westminster School to teach English and History, finding a tiny flat to rent at the top of a tight spiral tower staircase in Lambeth Palace. Jim's natural skills and passion for his subject were soon recognised and, within a few years he became Head of English, 'Master of the Queen's Scholars '(housemaster of the scholars' house) and Deputy Head. When also responsible for the Scout troop, he even managed to negotiate permission for long trousers to be worn on midge-ridden Scottish expeditions (instead of the traditional shorts)!

Family Christmases were usually spent in Cley Windmill, often with a gang of friends and always with a home-written play or other entertainments. Dad was always creative; writing and directing for the Blakeney Players (the Millennium passion play, *Jesus in the Mirror*, and *Blakeney Bulldogs* to celebrate the 700th anniversary of Blakeney Church), directing large-scale *son-et-lumiere* productions in Binham Priory and Holkham Hall, creating and publishing a hymn when on sabbatical in the USA, and singing with local choral groups.

Then, in 1967, came the unexpected invitation to the headmastership of Rugby School. With some trepidation (and a secret nocturnal visit to inspect the place) Jim was persuaded to take on the role. So, at the age of just 34 and with four young children, they moved to Rugby. It must have

been a tumultuous experience – his first year was the 400th anniversary for the school, with the Queen and Prince Philip to host for the celebrations. In those days, the headmaster was also housemaster for the largest boarding house. And this was during the rebellious years of the late '60's, so there was plenty of house mastering and head mastering to do!

Holidays in Norfolk were vital to recharge the batteries – particularly when sailing and racing his beautiful old (also 'born' in 1933) North Norfolk 16 dinghy, *Restless*. With his brother Robin, by then farming in Walsingham, he had also bought a small cruising boat. *Grogatel* was a 22ft plywood 'Debutante' that Robin and he promptly sailed over to Holland and back, with minimal charts and no radio or other safety equipment.

He continued to sail every summer, including around Britain in 1974 with the family in the *Hannah Rose*. Many friends, family, colleagues and pupils have been invited up to Scotland over the years for sailing adventures among the Western Isles, always leaving with stories to tell, great bonhomie and an enduring image of "The Admiral" puzzling over the charts, peering for puffins or singing in wild weather. He saw how sailing brought out the best in people, and became a director of the Norfolk Boat, a charity that supports sailing opportunities for disadvantaged children and those with disabilities. Jim was also a council member of the RNLI, exploring better methods for recovering crew who fall overboard and overseeing the launch of any new lifeboats in East Anglia.

At Rugby, Jim did great things. While maintaining the high academic standards, he injected some much-needed warmth and humanity to the school. Corporal punishment was swiftly ended, and he introduced girls into the sixth form. He also got to know every single pupil and most of their parents as well. Small wonder then, over the decades that followed and just about anywhere in the world, he was approached so often and so warmly by former pupils — in the street, up mountain tops or on a ski slope.

Jim was also involved in national developments, chairing the Headmasters' Conference, chairing a committee to create a hymn book for public schools, and helping to launch and run the Bloxham project to support Christian education in schools.

After 14 years he moved to Lancing College where, he said, the challenges were the opposite of those at Rugby. With a strong arts and humanities culture, there was already plenty of warmth and community - but academic disciplines needed attention. A technology centre was built, a small leaky swimming pool transformed into a theatre, there were expeditions to Malawi and development of a school farm with sheep, pigs and Highland cattle.

Retiring from Lancing in 1993, Jim and Sarah settled in Wiveton with a steady stream of visitors, projects and further adventures. Jim became Director (East) for the Independent Schools Information Service, a Governor of Greshams (and several other schools), and a hard-working churchwarden of St Mary's in Wiveton.

The last year of his life was hard, as frailty constrained his ability to be always out and about. But his love of literature, his Sarah, his four children and 11 grandchildren, along with countless friends and wider family kept that characteristic beaming smile in place. He died at home, aged 88, on 11th September 2021. We will miss him greatly.

Coastal Ward District Councillor's Report

From North Norfolk District Council:

'The Environment Agency is planning a refurbishment of the tidal gates at Cley (exact date to be decided), refurbishment of the Wells Sea defences (west), and a flood risk management project for Weybourne.

NNDC now owns 12 homes for temporary accommodation, which is much needed as currently there are 43 householders in temporary accommodation (including 7 rough sleepers). We project that housing associations will provide 13 affordable houses this year.

The new leisure centre in Sheringham, the Reef, is almost finished. NNDC has been awarded three green flags for our country parks and six blue flags for our beaches which demonstrate the quality go our open spaces.

Social prescribing referrals are increasing and I would encourage anyone looking for support, whether struggling with budgets or looking for companionship, to contact 01263516353 or social.prescribing@north-norfolk.gov.uk. The new mental health hub at Cromer Hospital is opening in 2022. NNDC has access to the new Household Support Fund—there is £128,000 available for households in need of support for food or utilities as the economy recovers.

Very sadly, NNDC did not get funding for community renewal in Fakenham. The Economic impact of tourism in North Norfolk dropped from the usual £500 million/yr. to £240 million in 2020, but we think it rebounded in 2021 even though we don't yet have the figures.

Domestic food waste collection starts 2023.

Core funding to local councils will increase by 3% next year and NNDC is still looking at a small surplus in 2021-22.

950 houses, plus a school, business space and a hotel, have been approved for Fakenham. The consultation for the new Local Plan starts in January 2022.'

There is a trial of a rapid response vehicle (a paramedic in a car) in Fakenham to provide better coverage for the Wells and Holt areas (including the Glaven Valley). This is especially important for us at moment as ambulances are spending hours queuing at hospitals, leaving only RRVs to provide lifesaving immediate treatment. This trial, to last 12 weeks, was an evidence-based decision which we fully endorse.

We are now trying to encourage the Ambulance Trust to apply for national funding for volunteer community first responders as several nearby parishes and towns are without and we desperately need CFRs when the emergency system is so under pressure.

FOOD FROM THE PEWS By Mary Norwak REAL CHEESCAKE

As early as 1265, cheese tarts were recorded, made from rich, soft cheese pounded in a mortar with egg yolks, spices and honey and sometimes dried fruit. In the seventeenth century when the milking cow replaced goats and sheep, there was plenty of milk and cream to spare and cheese tarts were made with fresh curds instead of the soft cheese, but were still flavoured with spices, butter, cream, eggs and the newly-imported sugar. Some cooks began to add lemon juice and lemon curd (still sometimes called lemon cheese) became the tart filling. Other cooks substituted a lemon-flavoured sponge mixture for the cheese, and these also became known as cheesecakes and were very popular as little delicacies for teatime. The recipe here is for an eighteenth-century English version which is rich and delicious but very easy to make.

8 oz (225g) shortcrust pastry
2 oz (50g) butter, 12 oz (350g) soft curd cheese
3 oz (75g) caster sugar, 2 eggs
1 tablespoon brandy
2 tablespoons single cream
Pinch of ground mixed spice, 2 oz (50g) seedless raisins

Be sure to use real curd cheese from a good grocer, not cottage cheese or full fat soft cheese. The real thing looks rather like a firm version of clotted cream. Preheat the oven to 350F/180C/Gas 4. Line an 8 ins (20cms) greased flan tin with the pastry. Prick with a fork and bake for 30 minutes. Leave to cool. Soften the butter and work into the cheese and sugar. Add the eggs, brandy, cream and spice and mix until smooth. Stir in the raisins and spoon the mixture into the pastry case. Bake at 325F/170C/Gas 3 for 40 minutes. Serve freshly baked, but cold. Serves 6.


