


THE GLAVEN CHRISTMAS CARDS





As you will see from the notice the Blakeney Village Hall AGM is to be held on 16th November at 5.00pm in the Wallace Room of the Village Hall. All are welcome to find out what has been happening over the last 12 months and to discuss future developments.

2022 is the first year that the Hall has been able to operate fully again, post Covid and I think I can say it has been a successful year. The Blakeney Players have put on 2 well attended and highly enjoyable plays and the Hall has continued to be used by small groups for Badminton, Carpet Bowls, Tai Chi, Pilates and Yoga. The popular Film Nights

have restarted and the Hall continues to be used by the U3A for large scale meetings and quizzes. There have been 'local' 2 wedding receptions and the feedback from these has been extremely positive. In addition, the Craft and Antique Fairs continue to be well attended. Attendees and organisers of all the events have commented extremely favourably on the improvements to the toilets and foyer undertaken during lockdown.

The Committee continue to maintain and improve the facilities, and like every household and business are seeking ways to mitigate the dramatic increase in energy costs. We are awaiting an Energy Efficiency Audit and have already received quotes to upgrade the loft insulation. We are also awaiting costs to double glaze the large window area in the main hall facing the playing fields and have also started to investigate the costs and benefits of installing solar panels on the large south-facing roof and looking at upgrading/changing our rather old and inefficient night storage heaters.

Jill Tibbetts, who has been an active and dedicated hands-on member, is retiring from the committee, though she will continue to be involved with the Film Nights and help with the bar. She will be sorely missed.

It's going to be a busy year and we would welcome new members to the committee who would like to be part of the ongoing running of this valuable community asset or who might wish to get involved in a particular area of interest.

Local Government Elections – 4th May 2023 –

We are fast approaching the next round of elections for North Norfolk District Council and Blakeney Parish Council, the 4-year cycle comes around quickly! So, if you or someone you know, is interested in standing for either the District Council or our Parish Council, then do keep an eye out for further information in the coming This process requires all existing Parish months. Councillors who wish to continue in the role, and other persons who wish to serve as a Parish Councillor, to submit nomination paperwork in the nomination period of late March/early April next year and, where the number of nominations received exceed the number of Parish Councillors to serve on the Council, then a contested election will be held. This would be at the same time as the elections to North Norfolk District Council - i.e., Thursday 4th May 2023. If you are keen to find out more about being a Parish Councillor, then by all means, contact the Parish Clerk for an informal chat.

Extracts from the 4th October 2022 Full Parish Council Meeting...

Chairman's Announcements -

Our Chairman and Vice-Chairman are now both fully trained for the Community Speedwatch programme and are assisting with the Langham scheme, in the hope that a visit will be reciprocated by the team, in Blakeney. If you are reading this, and think that you may be interested in joining the team, then please do get in touch.

Reports from County & District Councillors -

County Councillor – Michael Dalby had circulated his report in advance which focused on the 'NCC Cabinet' to consider further savings to address the budget gap.

District Councillor – Victoria Holliday had circulated her report in advance and it will be included elsewhere in the pages of the GVN.

Planning – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building.

PF/22/2245 – Proposal; Conversion of dwelling into two separate dwellings with associated external alterations

Any possible applications to the **Coast Resilience Grant Scheme** – extremely tight deadlines; **Resolved** could it help with the corner of The Carnser if time permits.

Resolved to ask 'Secret Gardens' to add the mowing the **Langham Road Verge** (site of intended new Trod) ahead of the PP Trod Scheme being implemented this winter.

Cllr Jane Armstrong left the meeting for item no. 8.6.

Resolved that having considered the reply from the owners of 39 New Road, with regard the chestnut paling fencing & associated costs along **Sheila's Way Footpath** that we offer £500 as a full and final settlement.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups which have met recently if applicable.

Blakeney Village Hall Trust – Cllr Jane Armstrong – The BVHT noted that they were awaiting to hear further from the Parish Council, once BPC have received legal advice. They are also looking into possible energy savings, having received an 'Energy Audit'.

COUNCILLORS QUESTIONS -

The following question was received from Cllr Jane Armstrong.

Further to the survey of Blakeney's **Public Benches** last October/November, please could you outline what cleaning and maintenance has been carried out since then and also if any work is planned over the next few months.

ANSWER – Other than broken seats replaced, there has been no cleaning or maintenance work. A local contractor had been appointed, but sadly due to his extremely busy work schedule, did not manage to fit in this work before going off long term sick a couple of months or so ago.

Another local contractor has recently confirmed that he may be able to help us again, hence I will share the details with him as soon as I am able.

CORRESPONDENCE -

Level of service at Blakeney Surgery - Resolved to i) Send the letter as drafted by Cllr Sutcliffe to the GVN etc, encouraging residents to write to Holt Medical Practice, ii) accept the offer of a follow up meeting by our MP Duncan Baker, iii) Ask what the full/proper report says, in relation to the state of the Blakeney Surgery & iv) Share this with our neighbouring parishes/newsletters as before.

Cllr. Jane Armstrong in relation to **Street Lighting** – In the light of the current energy situation and the increasing cost of electricity, would Blakeney Parish Council consider turning off the streetlights which are under the Council's control for part of the night. (The lights are currently on from dusk til dawn.) This would reduce electricity consumption and would also be in line with Blakeney's Dark Skies Policy. **Resolved** that we obtain costs of changing the street lights to run from 'Dusk til Midnight and from 6am til 8am'.

Street Lighting clean and visual inspection 2022 and defect list and quotes for replacement items were received ahead of forthcoming budget consideration. *Resolved* that we get the light at the junction of Coronation Lane/Back Lane fixed, to run from 'Dusk til Midnight and from 6am til 8am' subject to cost, and that we apply for a quote to change the whole street lighting stock to LED, with the reduced timing, and apply for grants for this work, and simultaneously, via the pages of the GVN, ask our residents if they feel any of the current street lighting stock should be removed for good and not replaced.

Based on this...

A question to the parishioners of Blakeney; If you have street lights near you, then could you please let us know if you a) would be happy for them to be switched off permanently or b) prefer them to be set up on a timer, so that they operate from dusk til midnight and again from 6am til 8am. If you respond, please kindly tell us which road you are referring to.

Review of all signage in the village in line with the NNDC Conservation Area Appraisal & Management Plan document. Resolved; i) Produce a 'You are Here' map, which details the village, ii) Produce a business map/sign, which lists the businesses in the village, iii) Steve Soanes to produce a 'mock up', iv) Something cohesive on railings, v) Fingerpost sign, formalised, may need planning permission, vi) Revisit the NNDC Conservation Area Appraisal & Management Plan.

Resumption of BPC Meetings – We continue to use The Scout Hut for our Parish Council meetings for the time-being, as it is more spacious than the Parish Office. However, in order to manage numbers, we continue to ask that if you do wish to join us at a meeting, if you could please let The Clerk know in advance that you plan to attend (a quick phone call or an email), that would be helpful and we will set the room out accordingly. 01263 741106 or clerk@blakeneyparishcouncil.org.uk

Thoughts from the Rectory for November 2022

Dear Friends,

During the lockdowns of the last couple of years, some people described themselves as getting "stir-crazy", finding it difficult to be cooped up against their will. The origin of the expression, of course, comes from prisons ("stir" was another name for prison, that started in the US, although even the OED doesn't claim to know why).

"Stir" and "stir up" are words with multiple meanings. They can refer to porridge, to emotion, to political activism, and much more.

To call someone a "stirrer" is not usually a complement. People generally don't like "stirrers" – the types who tend to stir up trouble for others, by highlighting differences of opinion, or inflaming tensions, or just gossiping. But there are constructive "stirrers" as well – those we might in some contexts call "prophets", the people who are prepared to raise uncomfortable questions and important ethical matters. There are all sorts of issues in our day which some people would like to brush under the carpet – climate change, economic injustice, unfair trade, etc – but which the prophetic voice will call attention to and thus try to stir people into recognition and action. Often at the expense of their wellbeing or popularity.

There's also a quite different sort of stirring that's traditionally associated with this month of November. "Stir Up Sunday" was the name given to the last Sunday before Advent, because the Collect (or special prayer) for that day, in the old Prayer Book, began with the words: "Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people."

And "Stir Up Sunday" – given the images it conjures up – then also became the traditional day to make the Christmas pudding, an activity with which all the family would join in. In our contemporary Common Worship prayer book, a similar prayer is used after Communion on that day.

Maybe when Stir Up Sunday comes along this year (20th November), we can use it not just as a reminder to make the Christmas pudding (if we're not buying one from the supermarket!), but also as a reminder of its origin, and as a spur to preparing ourselves for the real, wonderful meaning of the seasons of Advent and Christmas coming up. And perhaps too, we could use it as an opportunity to stir ourselves and others into a greater awareness of the crises that confront us. And, following the old prayer, to make ourselves not just willing, but faithful.

Happy Advent when it comes! Richard.

Cley Parish Council's Chairman's Report October 2022

We were fortunate to have Dulcie Walsh, NNDC Energy Officer, talk to us about the Warm Homes Grant. This provides insulation and low carbon heating to those on incomes below £30,000. There are other grants available for those ineligibles for a Warm Homes Grant; the NNDC Energy Officer on 01263516177 will be happy to help you.

We're delighted so many of you are now attending Parish Council meetings. We will try the PA system again next meeting to make it easier for you to hear.

It has been pointed out that there are about 100 refuse and recycling bins out and about the village not where they should be. They can be hazardous when they blow over on a road, and cumulatively detract from our beautiful village. This has been ongoing a while.

The instructions from NNDC are that bins should be put out on a property's curtilage no earlier than 7pm the evening before collection day, and no later than 7 am on the day of. NNDC has the power to enforce this. The Parish Council asks that parishioners put their bins out only overnight at most. This applies to second homes and holiday lets: now collection day is Friday it should to easier to manage as that is a popular handover day.

Still on the subject of bins, I sincerely hope by the time you read this any 'teething problems' with the changeover to Fridays have been resolved. If you're still having issues with missed bins, wrong day collections etc, please get in touch with me, not Serco customer service.

Some of our beautiful loke walls are looking slightly the worse for wear. Given these are part of our rich heritage, it would be wonderful if they received a little TLC. Maintenance is far preferable to rebuilding. We will look to see if any grants are available.

High Street residents have requested to meet with the Parish Council to discuss the traffic management plan from Highways which we shared with you on our website. As before, there are various points of view. A wider consultation with village residents will follow.

A new bench will be installed on the West Bank by NWT. We know this is a favourite spot for many of you, so I hope it gives great pleasure.

Wild camping is not allowed in North Norfolk. Most campervan users are very responsible, but campervan overnight parking can lead to degradation of our most sensitive landscapes. We will be putting up NNDC sponsored signs along the Beach Road which say campervan overnight parking is not permitted.

NNDC are undertaking a Planning Service Improvement Review and are asking for feedback on customer experience via a questionnaire. The public consultation starts 1st November and

will be advertised through social media, the Outlook Magazine and NNDC's website. Paper copies can be obtained by visiting the Council offices or calling customer services who will post one out. This your opportunity to let the Planning Department know your views on their performance.

There are elections for both Parish and District Councillors next May. Re the Parish Council, if you want to discuss the role further, want to know more about the process of election, or are interested in standing as a parish councillor, please get in touch with the clerk on clerk.cley@gmail.com. If you're interested in standing as a District Councillor, please get in touch with Emma Denny at NNDC (emma.denny@north-norfolk.gov.uk)

We're delighted that 9 Old Womans' Lane will remain in the existing housing stock of Flagship homes and will be relet.

During the hot dry summer when we had some nearby wildfires, we discussed the need for fire awareness with the Fire Service. They suggested we put together a resilience plan with important numbers and a list of 'neighbourhood doorknockers' who could ensure nearby houses were ok in any emergency situation. We're putting together a glow in the dark list of emergency numbers for residents, and were wondering if anyone would be prepared to come forward as a neighbourhood door knocker. If you would like to do this, please give your details to the clerk (clerk.cley@gmail.com).

We have experienced a lot of unplanned power cuts recently. To limit the number going forward, UKPowerNetworks will be undertaking a tree trimming programme to clear the extensive backlog of tree branches which are interfering with our power cables. This requires planned power cuts as they do this work, which I appreciate is an inconvenience, but you will be informed by a letter which at least gives you the chance to fill a thermos and dig out your gas camping stove. I am told this will reduce unplanned outages; let's hope this is the case.

There has been a great deal of discussion about late night events at Barn Drift. We have asked that events end at midnight as there have been some occasions of noise disturbance way into the early hours.

The next meeting is Thursday November 10th in the Village Hall at 6.30pm. The agenda will be published on the Notice Board, on the website (www.cleypc.info) and we'll mail it out to those on the Parish email list (if you want to be included in this please email the clerk). Please comment on or ask general questions about Agenda items before the meeting by getting in touch with the clerk or myself, or come along and participate. Minutes are posted as usual on the noticeboard and website.

Cley Warm Space

Wiveton

Cyril Ramaphosa

Watching and listening intently to the Queens Funeral Service in Westminster Abbey with my brother Tony, I caught a quick glimpse of one familiar face in the great congregation. It was Cyril, Ramaphosa, now President of South Africa. For me it was a breath-holding jolt of poignant memories of the special connection between us since 1974. This is an extremely condensed story of that connection:

In 1974, inspired by Father Trevor Huddleston (an English priest working in Soweto Township a few miles outside Johannesburg) we established a Rugby School Amnesty Group and asked to adopt a black 'prisoner-of-conscience' in South Africa, imprisoned under the terrible Apartheid regime of that time.

Cyril Ramaphosa, aged 23, living with his family in the vast, sprawling, half derelict Township of Soweto became our first adopted Prisoner of Conscience, - imprisoned under the vicious, all- white Apartheid government. Amnesty gave us names and contact details of Cyril's family and details of his arrest. He was in his third year as a law student at Turfloop University, the only university for 'blacks', built high up in the parched and unfertile hills, miles from the nearest town of Pietersburg. Cyril was already prominent in the campaign for black students' rights and chairman of the Turfloop branch of the South African Students Association and the National Students Christian Movement. He was arrested, interrogated, and held in solitary confinement in Pietersburg prison and, as I found out later when I met him, was being threatened and tortured on a daily basis and told that he would be transferred indefinitely to Robben Island in Table Bay for forced labour in the infamous lime quarries. (Mandela had already been incarcerated on Robben Island for many years).

The growing Amnesty Group at Rugby – mainly six formers - doggedly wrote, over the next few years more than 450 courteous, well-informed letters of appeal for Cyril's release. We wrote to members Parliament, to every member of the infamous Bureau of State Security, (BOSS) to lawyers, reporters and anyone else in a position of influence in South Africa. We were, encouraged and supported superbly and continuously by Mandy Moross. With two sons at Rugby School, the family lived in Johannesburg where Mandy worked for a huge, mining corporation. He was able to feed us continuously with the names and addresses of potentially valuable contacts, check the accuracy of details in the letters we wrote and open a separate bank account for the Ramaphosa family for us, so that we could get money to the them, making it possible for Samuel, his father, to travel all the way to see Cyril in prison. He became a completely invaluable, dedicated supporter. He and his knew everything and everyone and his generosity to us grew and grew. Finally, after Cyril was released, he insisting on flying Jim and myself to South Africa, lending us his official chauffeur and car for four days to see enough of black, dawn- to- dark working lives, the places they worked and to meet some key political figures, powerful businessmen and some of the remarkable and courageous men and women working for change in South Africa.

When Cyril had been finally released and was at home in Soweto with his family, we could not write to him because BOSS were watching him continuously and, blocking all mail to his address so it was impossible to arrange a secret meeting with him somewhere in Johannesburg and plan how we could now help him to complete his law degree by correspondence course. No 'whites 'allowed into Soweto without a permit.

Our application was refused immediately. Our only hope was to find and gain the trust of a black man, working in Johannesburg and living in Soweto, with his own car and, willing to take the risk of driving me, undercover into the Township to find Cyril. It seemed a completely impossible task. The only 'black' we were seeing and talking to each day was Mandy's chauffeur, Hosia Mogano, on loan to us for four whole days. He was impeccably trained not to look directly at his passengers, (invariably sitting behind the driver) and only to give standard answers, briefly and simply to any questions and to keep his eyes always on the road! We started to break down this rigid formality by one of us always sitting beside him on every journey, asking him questions, telling him about our family, about things that mattered to us and light-hearted descriptions of our life in England – and about Mike Wood the first Flying Doctor in Africa whose wife Sue was a cousin of my mother's and how we loved them both. On the third day Hosia began to turn and look at us, also slowly to tell us something of his own life in the East Transvaal where he was an "Elder' of the Christian community there.

"Hosia would you be able to take us and be with us for the Evensong Service in Johannesburg Cathedral on Sunday? It is the only church in the whole of South Africa where black and white people are allowed to worship together!" A first big smile from Hosia. 'Oh yes Missy, oh yes! I will be very glad for us to go together!" We went, hours before the service started, so walked – one on each side of Hosia – talking and asking questions all the while he showed us around nearby streets. The long service ended. We walked out –Hosia between us – into the instant African darkness. He suddenly stopped, gave a great bellow of laughter into the sky and two huge hands descended on our shoulders. 'This is very wonderful! My heart feels very full! This is first time of my life that I have two white friends!'

I took the deepest breath of my life, told him about Cyril Ramaphosa's release from prison and asked him if he would smuggle me into Soweto to see him in two days' time – before we had to fly back to England. I showed him part of the letter that Cyril had written to me on the day of his release; I bear no bitterness towards anybody who has been responsible for my hard times. These experiences have filled me with a profound sense of forgiveness a person, a nation can only take so much suffering. One day I know we shall somehow free ourselves from this heavy burden . . . it will be

like the sun rising through a long, cold, grey fog.' I showed him the pendant I had made for Cyril from the stone I had found on Cley beach near the Watch House on the same day that he had been released.

I take you Missy. I keep you safe. We find him together'. That journey, under a rug on the floor of his car and how I met the whole Ramaphosa family is another story, only to be told face-to-face to anyone who would like to hear it but never in print.

At the end of this November, the first State Visit to Britain in the reign of King Charles will be by Cyril Ramaphosa – at the Queens invitation, before she died.

Paul Veitch, who worked for many years for Amnesty lived in Wiveton and we were pleased to have a personal reason for its position here. Local letter cutter Teucer Wilson, an Amnesty supporter, carved the words 'It is better to light a candle than to curse the darkness' a motto Amnesty has adopted, in Forest of Dean Sandstone. It was unveiled by Barbara Veitch, Paul's widow, on June 11th, a warm summer's day when North Norfolk group, and a number of people who had sponsored the stone gathered for a short ceremony including a poem by Jonathan Ward commissioned for the event.

It was the culmination of a germ of an idea coming to fruition, a monolith for those who pass to reflect on and to be inspired and touched by the simple truth of the words. The North Norfolk group are grateful to all who contributed and made it possible.



Letter to the Editor

I write to inform readers of a proposal by telecoms company Cornerstone to install a thirty-metre telecoms mast and base station on Hunworth common with no viable alternatives offered to the community or open consultation with the residents of the area.

Barely 7 acres, but packed with a diverse range of plants, trees and wildlife, many species indicating the ancient nature of the land this tiny area of common land has not been affected by farming, industry or the modern world is designated a County Wildlife Site and is within the Hunworth conservation area.

Visited by villagers and countless people from the surrounding area Hunworth common remains one of only a few sites in the area where people can freely access nature with no restrictions ~ to wander and linger, to picnic, to pick fruit or play and build dens as has been the way for centuries.

The imposition of this mast and its associated ground works would devastate the site, ecologically and visually. Straddling an area where this spring a conservation group planted three hundred trees, provided by North Norfolk District Council, as a small mammal, reptile and insect refuge the mast structure would be starkly and unavoidably visible to anyone walking on the common from any direction.

This plan sets a worrying precedent introducing industrial structures here and other areas of common land, especially as there is a stated likelihood of expansion and mast sharing by the company.

Better telecoms connectivity is of course in the interests of all in the area, but should not be at the expense of such a rare natural resource especially when there are many other more suitable sites that have not been properly considered by the telecoms company and others involved.

Our common land must be protected from such exploitation and I urge you to contact the local MP (Duncan Baker) and councillor (Andrew Brown) to express your concern over this ill-conceived proposal, press for it to be rejected and a proper and open and inclusive process take place to establish a more suitable site.

A SEAWEED INDUSTRY FOR NORFOLK?

On 20/Sept a meeting was held at Morston Village Hall to discuss a proposal submitted by James and Willie Athill to undertake a pilot project to grow seaweed in the sea just under three miles North of the mouth of Blakeney Harbour. It was explained that seaweed is harvested in the UK and Ireland now, but this is almost all dredged wild material. Dredging wild stock devastates the sea bed and is not sustainable long term as the market for seaweed is growing rapidly. Experiments have shown that seaweed can be cultivated using ropes or nets suspended in the sea. The market for the product is quite diverse:

Added to cattle feed it reduces the production of carbon dioxide produced as well as being a nutritious food.

When added to fertiliser it enhances the effectiveness of the fertiliser.

The process of growing it absorbs carbon dioxide.

There are many other potential markets including as human food and pharmaceuticals.

It was stated that a number of Norfolk farms were interested in testing the product.

The vision of the proposers of the project is that it should be a North Norfolk enterprise, with the product grown, harvested, processed and used locally. They have evolved designs for the structures needed to support the ropes or nets which they consider to be robust enough to withstand heavy weather. At this stage they are proposing a small 25HA area of seabed is allocated to test and develop the growing and harvesting process. This area is currently used by local fishermen for potting etc. and would be lost to them if the experiment goes ahead. The proposers suggest that the seaweed growing operation would in the long term be beneficial to marine life, creating greater biodiversity and increasing stocks of crabs and lobsters in the area.

Representatives of local fishing interests objected strongly to the proposal as it would reduce the area of seabed available to them and which they have fished for many years and are officially licenced to use. They feared that if the experiment was successful much more seabed would be allocated to seaweed growing with serious consequences to their livelihood.

There was some suggestion that seaweed could be grown within the area potentially allocated to the new wind turbine extension projects. This requires further research.

The meeting concluded without reaching a consensus. The proposers will continue with their application for permission to proceed with the project.

LAYSON SINGS CHANSON has been on the road since the beginning of 2011 to tie-in with the most recent edition of my Jacques Brel biography, *La Vie Bohème* - and it will be coming at last to the Maltings, Wells-Next-The-Sea on **Friday 11**th of **November 2022.**

Recent media coverage has been fulsome with phrases like 'mesmerising', 'a man possessed', 'a wonderful evening by a master raconteur at the top of his game'. Here is further comment: -

'His delivery and performance style has led to a deserved cult status' (*Time Out*)

'Definitely more than a performance—an experience!' (New York *Village Voice*)

'Hugely entertaining. Jacques would have approved' (Rock 'N' Reel [R2])

'Everything here is equal to the doomed romanticism that was Brel's trademark' (*Record Collector*)

'A complex emotional landscape of understated dynamics and dark aesthetics' (*Folk on Tap*)

Response has been most encouraging - in that attendance has been impressive for weekday evenings, notably at Bristol's Thunderbolt, the Frome Festival, the Twelve Bar Club in central London, the Cellars-at-Eastney, the Bull-at-Barnes (famous jazz venue), the Arlington Arts Centre in Newbury, Ventnor Arts Club and Birmingham's Kitchen Garden Café. Consequences of a performance at the Rising Sun Arts Centre in Reading were a short-notice double-header with John Cooper Clarke (and a booking the following weekend for Berkshire's French Society).

As well as works by Jacques Brel, Charles Aznavour, Scott Walker and other chansonniers, Gallic and English, we - i.e. me and keyboard player Andy Lavery - venture into curious but connected realms, ranging from an arrangement of French symbolist poet Paul Verlaine's 'Un Grand Sommeil Noir' to Dave Dee, Dozy, Beaky, Mick and Tich's 'Last Night In Soho' - sung absolutely straight and, by contrast, 'Sweeney Todd The Barber' - which I used to do with my group Clayson and the Argonauts, but hadn't unveiled in public for a quarter of a century. Prefaced by an explanatory talk that is as entertaining as it is educational this show will appeal to both chanson devotees, those interested generally in Gallic culture and folk merely seeking fun.

A further point of interest is my 'other' career as an author of around thirty books thus far. As well as *La Vie Bohème*, relevant output also includes *View from The Exterior*, a biography of Serge Gainsbourg. More conspicuously, there's been the best-selling *Backbeat* film tie-in, *Beat Merchants* (a definitive study of the British beat boom), authorised histories of The Yardbirds and The Troggs - and *Death Discs*, also the subject of a programme I scripted and presented on BBC Radio Two ('Clayson's show is as wacky as anything else you

will hear on BBC Radio Two' - *The Guardian*). Moreover, I not so much dipped a toe as plunged headfirst into many other - often unexpected - musical waters - such as a 2002 tome about Edgard Varèse, Frank Zappa's boyhood hero, and the missing link between Stravinsky and John Cage. This brought me to the attention of Gail Zappa, Frank's very late widow, who appointed me to pen a life of her husband - which is to be published in spring.
