
GVN Urgent help needed


The number of people helping with the production of the magazine each month is becoming worrying low. Without adequate help we will not be able to continue as now.

NO OVERNIGHT PARKING ON THE CARNSER CAR PARK – It has been brought to our attention that several people staying in holiday cottages in Blakeney, are told by the owners of the cottages that they can park overnight on the Carnser Car Park on Blakeney Quay. This is not true, the signs advise that **no overnight parking** is permitted on The Carnser, and this is due to the fact that the Carnser Car Park is liable to unpredictable tidal flooding. Many of the vehicles that are caught out and flooded have been parked overnight on the Car Park when they should not have been. There are alternative car parks for overnight car parking, including Coronation Car Park and Blakeney Village Hall Car Park.

EXTRACTS FROM THE JANUARY FULL COUNCIL MEETING...

Planning Items – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building & Appeals.

PF/23/2598 – Proposal; Erection of car port and alterations to access/boundary walls at, **Southgate**, **Wiveton Road**, **Blakeney.** *Resolved* – *No objection*, although we do endorse the comments made by both the Conservation & Design Team and the Landscape Team.

PF/23/2642 – Proposal; Erection of two-storey front extension, raising of roof of single-storey side extensions, insertion of dormer windows on front and rear and external alterations at, **29 The Pastures, Blakeney.** *Resolved; No objection, but we do wish to include the CPRE Standard Light Pollution Clause; i.e.* **Standard Light Pollution Clause;** National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) Clause 191c and Norfolk County Council's Environmental Lighting Zones Policy both recognise the importance of preserving dark landscapes and dark skies. In order to minimise the light pollution, we recommend that, if this application is permitted, any outdoor lights associated with the development should be:

- 1) Fully shielded (enclosed in full cut-off flat glass fitments)
- 2) Directed downwards (mounted horizontally to the ground and not tilted upwards)
- 3) Switched on only when needed (no dusk to dawn lamps)
- 4) White light low-energy lamps (preferably LED's*) and not orange or pink sodium sources.

*Ideally with a colour temperature of 3,000K or 3,500K.

FINANCE

Accounts totalling £13,885.91 were approved.

Agreed to request the sum of £48,015 from NNDC as the **2024/25 Precept** figure.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups;

Blakeney Surgery – *Cllr Nigel Sutcliffe* firstly wished to note his formal thanks to Rosemary Thew, for stepping in during his absence.

- We have now received a response from the Nfk & Waveney ICB to our letter dated 6th Oct 2023. Their response is unsatisfactory and hence we will be replying to them accordingly, and suggest that they reply within a week, before we go to the media.
- The Clerk will ask Katie Franklin for a copy of the formal submission of Holt Medical Practice. The final decision is due on 13th February 2024. This will be an open meeting

• held in Norwich and our District Cllr is due to attend.

Dinghy Park Committee – *Cllr Rosemary Thew* advised that the committee met last week, and mentioned a number of items, i.e. the future of winter permits, security/thefts and prevention and charging v donations. (All in DP minutes.)

CORRESPONDENCE –

Members noted the information from NNDC regarding the **Affordable Housing Crisis** in the district and Blakeney. It was suggested that we make enquiries with regard any potential **S106 money**, (**proposed allocated site on Langham Road**), asap, ie. mark in sand, to be used by BPC for the benefit of the parish.

Members received an update with regard **The Parish Room**, formerly known as the Scout Hut;

- Full responsibility of this building now lies with BPC
- Insurance is in place
- The room is now being advertised in the pages of the GVN
- NNDC are now looking into Business Rates
- Looking into possible other future uses of the building either as a standalone, or with other BPC buildings
- Bookings need to increase to cover running costs
- Future use is currently uncertain; may have to consider commercial use
- Further updates will be given in due course



Please support the annual February Film Festival







Dear Friends,

We have more speed data from our SAM2 speed camera, this time on Blakeney Hill, which is a 20mph zone. The average speed was 25mph, and the 85th centile speed 30mph, this is obviously much too high. 

News from Duncan Baker MP

Our extended Ukrainian family continue to be very much part of our lives and we spent Christmas Day altogether with Anna and Sviatik opening presents, as part of our family so the children were altogether. As the war shows no sign of ending, we continue to look after this little family, and will do so until the end. Just before Christmas though, Anna was keen to see the Thursford Christmas Spectacular. Apparently, there is nothing like it in Ukraine! So, it was lovely to take her and we were lucky enough to meet up with John Cushing, the incredible brains behind the show. Needless to say, Anna thought the show was absolutely marvellous.

East Runton may get its Blue Flag back again

Wonderful news for all of us that campaign to improve our water quality. At the start of the month, the Environment Agency released the testing results for our North Norfolk beaches. None of our beaches went backwards, and in fact East Runton was restored to being assessed as having excellent water quality again. I quickly wrote to NNDC to request East Runton is given their Blue Flag back and they replied to say they will submit an application to do just this. It means that a majority of 4 out of our 7 beaches have been rated 'excellent' and 3 are assessed as 'good'.

On top of this, my constant campaigning to have more testing and new laws to clean up our water companies is bearing fruit. This is despite the constant misinformation of rival political parties that has worried residents and damaged businesses with their dishonest information, all for political gain. I am glad they have been proved wrong!

The Sheringham roundabout

I think we are gearing up for some amazing news with this key project of mine this year. To improve the safety and congestion on the A148 at the Holway Road junction, I have been campaigning for the government to help us with the funding to build a roundabout in Sheringham. Residents from Cromer to Sheringham to Holt, and all the villages in-between, want to see this built. It will of course also improve all the rat running through the villages of Beeston Regis and Upper Sheringham.

I am now in the final stages of negotiating the roundabout to be included in the 'Levelling Up' deal for Norfolk. If agreed, when the deal is finally announced, we could see the money delivered as part of the overall County package. It would mean we finally get the money to build the roundabout, which everyone tells me they are desperate to see delivered!

I won't give up my campaign or negotiations to get this project delivered. If shoehorning the roundabout into this Norfolk deal gets it delivered, I will do everything I can.

Tackling coastal erosion

The last debate in Parliament for 2023 was regarding coastal erosion in Norfolk and Suffolk. It was vital that I remained in Parliament until the very end to be in the debate, to represent the many communities that suffer from this issue.

Experts predict that in the next 85 years, 1,000 homes could be at risk. With rising sea levels due to global warming and more extreme weather patterns, it is almost certain that we will see erosion speed up. Currently we see between 30cm to 2m of erosion along our coast each year. But some places have seen far more, such as Happisburgh, in just the last few months.

I have been campaigning for more support, although we have done well in North Norfolk in terms of funding to support our changing coast. We were the first area in the entire country to receive special funding under the coastal transition accelerator programme (CTAP). We received £15m to help areas such as Overstrand, Trimingham, Bacton and Happisburgh to plan for the future. We have £20m coming to bolster sea defences in Mundesley and Cromer and I will keep calling for future investment in Walcott and the surrounding area for the sand-scaping project that has protected the village and gas terminal.

I will always do what I can to protect our coastal communities.

Flooding public meeting

With storm Babet causing havoc and more continued wet weather during December, I have arranged a major public meeting to discuss how we tackle the ever-increasing flooding we have seen across the constituency. Most of the problems have occurred in the East of our region. Particularly Potter Heigham, Hickling and Horning. But of course, we have had flooding in the Glaven Valley and Sheringham too.

You are most welcome to attend the meeting on the 2nd February at Hickling Parish Hall. We will have representatives from NCC, the Environment Agency, the Internal Drainage, Board, Anglian Water and Henry Cator, the Chair of the Flood Resilience Forum coming. The Broads Authority will also be present to represent their areas of expertise.

Into the Future?

I'm going to kick this off with an analogy that I hope will illustrate the sheer velocity of the moment we are in, of our headlong rush into the unknown.

1. A recent metaphor posed by Tim Urban was for us to look at human history as a book with 1000 pages; so, taking the human species to be 250.000 years old each page would be 250 years. For almost all of the book nothing happens, we are hunter-gatherers for thousands of years. Small improvements in hunting skills, preparing food and killing each other perhaps but otherwise little changes. Civilisations like Egypt, Mesopotamia, and the Indus Valley don't appear until page 970. Christ isn't born until page 993 and it isn't until page 1000 that the modern world begins and the technological boom we are in fills the last few paragraphs.

Modern technological development is accelerating exponentially. Compared to all those past millennia we are rushing at breakneck speed in a vehicle that has no driver and no brakes. It's easy to assume that every leap forward in technology is a leap forward in benefit, but this is not always the case. Technological innovation, particularly of the fastpaced kind we see today is full of possible benefits but also fraught with risk. There has never been a shortage of dystopian visions, of ways in which we can/might /or will destroy ourselves. Intellectual optimists like Steven Pinker think that as a sentient species, we have the 'capacity' to come up with antidotes to most of them, but do we? I think it unlikely as idealistic aspirations are usually eclipsed by the unstoppable momentum of the masses. As the biologist E O Wilson commented, our problem is that we have palaeolithic emotions, medieval institutions and God-like technology. Just like an uncontrolled 'crowed rush' we are propelling ourselves forward en masse where instinct (we are still animals after all) rather than intellect is at the helm.

Exploding population, climate change, digital technology, AI, Gene Manipulation, and a connectivity unimaginable to previous generations are all propelling us into the unknown; what we can envisage is exciting, but also frightening, what we cannot is almost certainly going to be much more terrifying. There seems to be an inevitability about our relentless forward momentum that no person or group can guide. New technologies appearing before the last have been assimilated, a war as in Ukraine driving high-speed development of weapons that will change warfare forever. Clouds of AI-controlled drones the size of your hand that have more killing capacity than the fifth army, and individual ones that can pick a person off in the street.

Indeed AI, perhaps the most frightening of all, Elon Musk predicts that soon new algorithms will vastly exceed human intelligence, but as usual money and complacency will hamper any attempts to protect us against it. Anyone who says that A I poses no threat doesn't know what they are talking about. Back in the days of the Wright brothers, when they were making aeroplanes that you peddled and were made out of sticks and paper, they could not have dreamed of Concord or the A380 Airbus, and neither can we with AI, all we know is that what it may do is beyond our imagination. The threat that I see is that we are creating our successors, and perhaps that is what we are meant to do.

At the recent AI summit at Bletchley Park, the discussion was about how AI could be policed or regulated. How can you police something smarter than you are, don't they think it will see it coming? If it were possible, which it isn't, a pause in this headlong rush might give us a moment to consider before we jump into an age where we will almost certainly be extra to requirements. A chance to investigate how we might adapt ourselves to keep pace with an intelligence unimaginably superior to our own. Could we modify ourselves to keep pace? A symbiosis of man and machine might be a way. Current concerns among those who haven't recognised the full significance of AI's potential are that this technology will deprive millions of their jobs. That's what the Luddites thought, but every advance brings new work, there are already countless robots doing what we used to do, but new technologies create new jobs, how many for example now work in the unforeseen world of IT or building wind farms?

Steven Pinker makes the optimistic point that we should not assume that a superior AI intellect would necessarily be as bloodthirsty as we are, or rather as men are, he sites women as an example of intellect without dominating ambitions (clearly, he is not a hen-pecked husband) but does he have a point? I don't think so, AI is on the verge of moving beyond a point where any human being can follow. Quantum computers are just around the corner, they can compute in seconds what a conventional computer would take years to accomplish, couple that with AI and we will be like our dogs and cats are to us. Steven Pinker's view that they may not be malevolent might hold. But their total disregard for us would make us superfluous and therefore dispensable and AI not having human altruism could, without noticing brush us aside. Even if we were to come up with working constraints it seems likely to me that AI will make its greatest advances in warfare, where international competition will eclipse any mechanisms that are put in place to contain or constrain the deadliness of the weapons it creates.

What seems like wonderful progress in gene splicing and virus control can be used for more sinister purposes, viruses can be altered and made more deadly, and the information to do this is online for anyone to access. It is beginning to look as if Covid 19 may have been created in a laboratory, how difficult then would it be to go a step further and manipulate it to leave no survivors? And anyway, most developed countries already have shelves of bottled viruses that could kill everyone on the planet. Incomprehensibly the H5N1 avian flu virus has been picked up and altered to make it more contagious. At this point, I can see you putting this down and saying for goodness sake just forget it. This seems to be exactly what the Western world is doing, turning the other way, in a

state of denial, fiddling while Rome burns, or as the apocryphal tale goes, like the senators of Byzantium in closed session debating the sex of angels while the Ottoman hoards were breaking down the gates of their city. For us today it's like a coach full of people hurtling down a hill with no driver and the passengers squabbling among themselves about who should sit where.

All of this is tangled up in a strange dichotomy of values, where on the one hand we seem to be moving into a posttruth era, where deceit, duplicity and disinformation are becoming de rigueur; politicians lie without shame and the government and the media freely peddle disinformation. All of which erodes trust, which is the bedrock on which civil society rests, but add to this the new culture of oppressive thought and language control and we are being disabused of the tools we need to address all of the above. It's as if a weather front is passing through the 'social atmosphere' as George Orwell called it, blowing away reason and rationality and leaving a trail of unreason and irrationality behind it, earlier societies valued the wisdom of age and experience, today we are being guided by the immature ideas of ultra-sensitive juveniles, a world where what people 'believe' supersedes what is real; so not just post-truth but post reason. I believe that it is this, more than any of the aforesaid risks threatens to pull the rug out from under civilised society. Because Trust, Free Speech, Reason and Rational Discourse are the vital cogs of a civilised society.

A Memory of Princess Diana


