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

This is not true, the signs advise that no overnight parking is permitted on The Carnser, and this is due to the fact that the Carnser Car Park is liable to unpredictable tidal flooding. Many of the vehicles that are caught out and flooded have been parked overnight on the Car Park when they should not have been. There are alternative car parks for overnight car parking, including Coronation Car Park and Blakeney Village Hall Car Park.

EXTRACTS FROM THE DECEMBER FULL COUNCIL **MEETING...**

Planning: RV/23/2332 - Proposal; Installation of two dormer windows (front and side), enlargement of first floor rear windows and rendering of property without complying with condition 2 (approved plans) of planning permission PF/23/1577 to allow for amendments to approved design at; 8 Langham Road, Blakeney. Resolved - No objection.

Members had no response to the Inspectors Questions to NNDC on the New Local Plan.

Accounts totalling £8044.38 were approved.

Clerk/RFO updated as follows;

Congratulations and thanks received from a member of the public, on the new 'trod' footpath up Langham Road. It is much used and makes an excellent link to the paths around Kettle Hill and New Barn Farm. Well done BPC. (The number of enquiries we have received from people, asking how we managed this, is amazing & those eligible of course, have been pointed to NCC and the superb Parish Partnership Funding Scheme.)

Two direct debits to be added to the BPC DD list for British Gas for street lighting.

Quotes were accepted and we shall look to obtain grant funding to proceed with the replacement of **Football Goals** (LincSprint) & a new **Petanque/French Boules** area (Glaven Landscaping) the latter, is firmly subject to grant funding.

We will look to undertake the repairs to the **Play equipment** ie. the basket swing as soon as possible.

Our Clerk has been instructed to obtain us the best price possible for a 1-year fixed term contract for our **Street Lighting Electricity.**

We will undertake a review of **Assets** and potential income and would ask the 'Finance Committee to also consider this', of particular note is; 1) Village Hall Car Park (ongoing), 2) Our collective buildings, 3) Dinghy Park and we will ask the DP committee to consider this asset for the greater benefit of the parish and the electorate in term of potential going forward.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups.

Blakeney Surgery – *Cllr Rosemary Thew* advised that we are now awaiting the outcome of the process currently being followed including any outstanding complaints.

Dinghy Park Committee – *Cllr Rosemary Thew* advised, that as per the recent meeting, a number of kayaks were stolen from the dinghy park early October, our understanding is that the Police have now recovered these, and reunited them with their owners.

Personnel Committee - *Cllr Rosemary Thew;* David Long & David Fincham have both been reappointed for the 2024 season.

Scout Hut - *Resolved* that i) BPC arrange for a 'Deed of Surrender' to be signed by both parties, as of 1st January 2024, ii) BPC make a list of works needed whilst funding is available, iii) Water and electricity costs to be transferred to BPC, iv) BPC to actively market the building for hire at a fee of £12 per hour and to review in 6 months' time, v) Building to be known as 'The Parish Room' going forward, vi) In parallel look into how the BPC buildings could best be used going forward, if the lettings route is not successful.







Thoughts from the Rectory for January 2024

Dear Friends,

January always has a sense of "a new chapter" about it. And it's a new chapter in a particular way for the Glaven Valley Benefice this time round. Our wonderful Tricia is retiring from her role as Benefice Administrator on 31st December. And on behalf of everyone here, we want to say a massive "thank you" to Tricia for her incredible commitment and expertise shown over the last thirteen years! Happily, Tricia's not disappearing from church, only from the desk in the office! We'll be thanking her properly after the service at Blakeney on 31st. Do join us if you see this in time. But thank you, Tricia – you are amazing!

And at the same time, we extend a big warm welcome to Nicola Turner, her successor, who is moving to Norfolk with her family, and taking over the administrator role from 2nd January. Nicola is looking forward to being part of the set-up here, and I know she'll be made very welcome.

If we look back on last year, I expect most of us could recall a mixture of highs and lows. And as we look ahead to the new year, I'm sure there are things we're excited about, but perhaps also a few things that make us anxious.

I noted something striking that Willard White, the Jamaican opera singer, said in an interview: "Show me the human being who has not suffered in some way, and I will show you a person without life – life can be difficult." Without exception, life has its ups and downs for everyone. For some perhaps more than others. Even if things are going well for us, we are always aware of the suffering of others. We have all been shaken to the core, I suspect, by the violence in Israel and Gaza, and deeply saddened by the level of destruction and suffering there.

For me, one of the things that gives hope is the way that God keeps doing new things. God keeps surprising us, and helping us to discover new things, travelling with us through the highs and lows. When asked what song would work as a soundtrack to his life, Willard White suggested "What a Wonderful World." It really is a wonderful world, even if life is not always plain sailing.

As we stand on the brink of another year (with all of us asking where on earth the last one went!), I would encourage us all to embark on it with a real sense of thanksgiving for all the new experiences that come our way, as well as for God's solidarity with us in suffering, and the way God brings good out of tough times, light out of darkness.

Willard White reckoned the best advice he had ever received from his father was "If you like it, see what you can make of it." We're about to launch into 2024. I hope we're all going to like it! Let's see what we can make of it!



Cley Parish Council's Chairman's Report

Cley Parish Council hopes you have all had a wonderful Christmas and wish you all the very best for a Happy New Year

Data from the speed camera on Holt Hill showed that the average speed going down this stretch of road was 24 mph, 7.6% vehicles were going over the limit and the average speeder was going at 33mph. The maximum speed was far too high at 45mph. Most surprising was the volume of traffic, which was a up to 2000 vehicles a day. This does flag up issues of pedestrian safety which we are going to review.

Planning Consultant Tim Schofield showed the Parish Council and villagers future Arcady proposals. These were left out for comments so I hope you had a chance to share your views.

Anglian Water attended to answer questions on water quality in the Glaven. They say permitted storm overflows from the Holt Sewage Treatment Works do not harm the Glaven. We will be able to find out in real time when these are happening as the data around storm overflows will go live in early 2024. Apparently chalk streams such as the Glaven receive no special treatment: however, the Environment Agency has imposed stricter controls at Holt

STW on phosphates in the treated water (which cause algal overgrowth). We brought up again the issue that Glandford STW are often malodorous and the response was as before, please call-in issues so they can be investigated. The contact number is 0800771881. It would help if you also notify the clerk so we can keep a log. Anglian Water also reiterated a plea for us not to flush anything down the loo that doesn't begin with a 'p' to avoid blockages in the sewage system.

Due to Gemma's fantastic grant writing skills, the Parish Council has been awarded a grant of £1500 towards the running costs of the community café. Congratulations to all who have made this welcoming 'hot spot' such a success.

We are buying more electric throws from our Community Support Grant and giving them out via the Community Café. If there are none left by the time you read this, we can get some more. Let us know. Tesco vouchers sufficient for a home delivery will be available on request from the Clerk, clerk.cley@gmail.com or 07812384889. All enquiries will be treated confidentially.

By the time you read this we really should have received planning applications for the Barn on Cookes marsh, to request permission for the render and for change of use of the land.

We have been contacted again about the proliferation of bins on the Fairstead. We didn't succeed in returning them to their correct place when we looked at this before, but we will again ask NNDC for their assistance.

We had another very successful loke working party on Dawes/Taylors Loke.

The next Parish Council Meeting is on Thursday Jan 18th in the Village Hall at 6.30pm. The agenda will be published on the Notice Board, on the website (www.cleypc.info) and we'll mail it out to those on the Parish email list (if you want to be included in this please email the Clerk) and the village WhatsApp group. News From Glandford

In common with everyone else we have had a wet autumn! The River Glaven has been almost constantly high for weeks and had come over the bank and onto our meadows on several occasions. This is not a problem for us in itself, but we are concerned about what the river water brings with it: silt, fertilisers and pesticides from farmland upstream are all carried by the river when in spate, and then of course we have the (perfectly legal) discharge from Holt sewage works.... It is not all bad, however, as we have had several excellent Otter sightings, with up to four together. Other notable sightings include a single Waxwing seen by visitors to our garden, and semi-resident Great White Egret on Bayfield Lake, while lots of Brent Geese have been flying too and fro - despite being just a couple of miles from the coast at Cley and Blakeney, Brents have been very thin on the ground in this part of the Glaven valley until this winter.

On Tuesday 2nd January 2024 we will be holding our annual New Year Plant Hunt. We always manage to see lots of interesting wild-growing plants in flower, and it is a great way to brighten up your winter. We have organised a New Year Plant Hunt at Natural Surroundings each year since 2015 and they have developed into very sociable events with just a hint of competitiveness. Everyone is welcome, and there is no charge and no need to book. Meet at the Natural Surroundings café at 10.30 am for a walk around our grounds and the nearby estate for maximum 3 hours (it is a national event, and there is a time limit!).

Our most exciting piece of news is that from January, Natural Surroundings we be part of the Royal Horticultural Society's 'Partner Garden' scheme. RHS members will be able to access our gardens for free, and the RHS will be helping to promote our work and assisting with advice and networking. We are, of course, thrilled to be associated with such a prestigious organisation. After more than 30 years promoting wildlife-friendly gardening we feel that it has now 'come of age' and firmly on the horticultural agenda, which is good for our gardens, good for wildlife and, of course, good for gardeners - there is so much pleasure to be gained from the many creatures, big and small, that can make your garden their home.

Just a reminder that we are open throughout the winter, Tuesday to Sundays from 10.30 until 4pm, with a break for Christmas 23-28 December, and that we are open on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day. Work on the drive from the main road up to Natural Surroundings has now started, and there are already noticeable improvements, with two drainage channels close to the top of the hill helping to divert water off the track and off to the side.

District Councillor's Report

From NNDC

'Planning

The new Local Plan examination hearings start in January. I will be speaking on the effect of visitor pressure on sensitive sites, the suitability of settlements to be small growth villages, and the role of principal residency in this ward. The requirement for 10% biodiversity net gain will start in January 2024 for major and April 2025 for minor developments.

The permitted development for installation of solar panels has broadened. For example, you do not now need permission to install on flat roofs providing they do not protrude more than .6 m above the highest roofline, and solar panels can be placed in front of a property between the house and the highway in a conservation area.

Don't forget the next Planning Roadshow, a training session for Cllrs, will be on Feb 1st in Holt.

Benefits

NNDC has awarded 74% of its allocation of £103k in discretionary housing payments. This has gone toward rent arrears, rent deposit or ongoing rent shortfall.

The financial Inclusion team is ready to help any parishioners with debt or benefit advice, or food, energy, or budgeting support.

There are sadly 2435 households on the housing list. Equally unfortunate is that there are 66 households in temporary

accommodation. The most common triggers of homelessness are loss of a private tenancy, no longer being able to stay with family and friends, and domestic abuse. There are c.350 affordable homes in the pipeline although c27 will be delivered this year. Do you know of any empty properties which might be let or anyone who would consider renting their property?

Sustainable growth

NNDC's Economic Strategy will be published early next year.

Environment and Waste

Food waste collections should start April 2024.

A knowledge test for Norfolk taxi drivers should be in place by the end of the year.

Finance

The first draft of the budget for 24/25 forecasts a deficit of £1.8 m rising to £5m in 27/28. This will need to be balanced.

Leisure

NNDC has been awarded almost £10m for a new sports centre and swimming pool in Fakenham.'

What Can I Say?

Script for Wells Maltings Climate debate

I'm not going to talk about the damaging effects of increasing CO2 because I believe that brings benefits as well as deficits, particularly when it comes to feeding a hungry world. This isn't concerned with possible future damage but with the collateral damage that is being done right now by a non-scientific community which has picked up climate change and run toward the flames with cans of petrol.

We seem to be moving into a post-truth era, where deceit, duplicity and disinformation are becoming de rigueur; politicians lie without shame and governments and the media freely peddle disinformation. Free speech is being sacrificed on the altar of a new and increasingly vociferous secular religion which like most religions has to persecute non-believers. The responsibility for this reaction to what climate scientists are telling us rests mainly with the media and with the BBC in the vanguard, every wildlife program narrated by their high priest ends with images of calving glaciers, raging wildfires and huge waves crashing against breakwaters, all accompanied by dire warnings of climate catastrophe if we don't act now. It's Lord Kitchener's invisible finger pointing at you out of the TV and saying 'The solution to this begins with you'! As if millions of people will suddenly begin acting against their selfinterest; not going abroad for their holidays, not eating meat, and not driving their cars, you only have to note the increase in petrol-hungry SUVs to see how well that's working out. So, it's not just post-truth but post-reason.

You get tips like don't fill your kettle with more water than you need, and switch off the TV before going to bed at night, things that equate to going to the beach and taking away a teacup full of seawater in an attempt to avert an impending tidal surge, The solution for that of course would be better sea defences, and for this nuclear power.

A further and perhaps more serious consequence is the inability to talk freely or have a rational debate, several years ago the BBC decided that Global Warming was a settled science and that they would no longer offer a platform to any who held an alternative view. Or as they described them 'Climate Change Deniers' Get the semantic connection? Climate Deniers - and the universally despised Holocaust Deniers? So, a lot of below-the-belt stuff, the purpose of which is to stifle debate and frighten people into keeping their mouths shut. So, what qualifications did the BBC have for saying it was settled?

Any scientist worth his or her salt will tell you how wrong that is. It is the opposite of what science is; science is never settled, the motto of the Royal Society 'Nullius in verba' which in translation = "no one's words" or "take nobody's word for it, says it clearly. There is nothing that cannot be questioned; nothing that is scared. Science

proceeds by dialectic. All science is modified or discarded over time. Newton's Laws of Universal Gravitation* held for 224 years*, if the BBC had existed in the 19th century, they would have called them settled science, but then Einstein came along and it became very unsettled, and we now know that even general relativity breaks down at the Planck scale; reality is mercurial.

As early as 1912 an exceptional man called Alfred Wegener who, although he wasn't a geologist, developed the idea of continental drift. With good evidence from the fossil record, he claimed that the continents of the world were drifting apart and that if you pushed them all together in one place they would fit like a jigsaw. He was dismissed and ridiculed for having the temerity to question what was considered settled science. The idea ruined him as mainstream science fell on him like a pack of wolves, accusing him of ignoring clear evidence and publishing ludicrous theories. He was the denier of his day, arguing against the entire scientific establishment. But then in 1967 came the discovery of the mid-Atlantic Ridge, plate tectonics was born and he was proved correct. Sadly, by then he was dead and his remains swept firmly under the carpet. It was as if the greater the number of scientists who believed in something the more unquestionably true it became, but he was right and a whole body of scientists and scientific evidence was wrong. Having a majority thinking the same thing doesn't make anything, especially science, right, it's not something you vote on. In my experience, the intellectual high ground affords very little standing room. Deniers are not criminals they are vital for an objective assessment of everything, every theory, and every school of thought should have to justify itself and objectively argue against itself. Deniers pick up the slack when science doesn't appear to be scrutinising itself with sufficient rigour. Only looking for evidence to back up what you believe is not science it is more like insecurity.

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Now we come bang up to date. The Big Bang Theory of the origin of the universe has held sway for many decades and was considered settled as the predicted discovery of the Cosmic Microwave Background backed it up. But the latest deep field images of the universe from the James Web infrared telescope do not show what the Big Bang proponents expected, the Hubble telescope didn't either but those images were a bit fuzzy so they were more easily ignored. But now it looks like a big spanner has been thrown in those works too. So many scientists and bodies of scientific evidence can and often are wrong, because, like the rest of us, they are human and fallible.

This hysterical climate of fear is affecting the world in so many ways, from eco-anxiety which I'll come to, to science itself. It's not a coincidence that the only oceanographers and climate researchers to have expressed any reservations about climate extremism's claims are all retired. Current climate science seems to be obeying the second law of thermodynamics- as in entropy, it's only going in one direction. Should a climate scientist find evidence that contradicts the accepted consensus and be foolish enough to stand up and say so, he or she would soon find themselves tending the roses.

Let me give you a hypothetical example. A climate scientist sees this recent headline that appeared in a national newspaper. Arctic ice melt will flood UK properties as 1.5 million are at risk due to melting Arctic Ice. He decides to contact the paper's science correspondent to tell him that his report is incorrect, and that should the Arctic Ice melt, it will not flood anything, that the ice covering the North Pole is already displacing its volume and so should all of it melt it will contribute not one extra drop of water to the ocean and will not affect sea levels in that way. * What would happen? The next day the same newspaper would proclaim 'Climate scientist denies sea levels will rise'. The day after that, he'd lose his funding and then his career. So, it's not surprising that climate scientists can do little to curb the hysteria they are the catalyst for.

Then we have Eco Anxiety, people feeling powerless to prevent a catastrophe. Which can look like this. (Video shown) Of a woman hysterical with fear crying and screaming at a TV panel for not doing enough. Now you might say that she could be more rational, but if she believes all she is told an she is certainly meant to believe it, then her behaviour is understandable, as with these (more slides) I have heard 'Just Stop Oil' and 'Extinction Rebellion' also described as irrational, but that is the opposite of what they are, if they believe everything they hear, no matter how extreme, then their protests are completely rational.

But most dangerously we are moving into an era where if you are too outspoken you can really be trouble, The Green Party called for the Norwich North Parliamentary candidate to be stood down immediately because he doesn't believe that climate change is anthropogenic and that Net Zero with damage the economy. So, if you don't agree with them, you should be silenced? What kind of world would these people have us live in? That they are unable to see the kind of totalitarian society they are creating undermines everything else they have to say. Destruction of your career and reputation is one thing, (well actually two things) but now you can fall foul of the law, particularly If you are well known or have a platform; today pretty much like in Russia you can be arrested for what you say. If for example, you made some stupid remark about ULEZ cameras and net zero, you could have half a dozen policemen turn up, turn over your house, take away all your tech gadgets, plus those of your wife and children and then be taken to spend the rest of the day in a police cell. If this doesn't worry you, or you think that is a proportional response to saying something stupid then I suggest you read Orwell's 1984 or find out a little more about what life is like for women in Iran or everyone in North Korea. Truth, Trust, and Free Speech, particularly -consensus challenging free speech- underwrite a free liberal democracy, but today, liberality has suffered an inversion and it is the liberals who are leading the new inquisition. There has never been a more important time to question what we are being told. Just don't ask too loudly.

* Newton's laws still hold true for all of our everyday experience, but were fundamentally modified on the universal scale.
