



We are back from our half term break refreshed and ready to go and we have good news! We are now able to share our Ofsted result with you and the school has maintained a "good" rating. The report is available online but here are a few of the highlights!

Teachers work closely with leaders to translate the curriculum into enriching lessons

Teachers' checks of pupils' learning accurately pinpoint the next steps pupils need to be successful. This is a school with a family feel. Pupils are warmly welcomed and supported by staff who give them expert care and attention.

Pupils feel and are safe. They say that bullying is rare.

Lessons are calm and orderly.

Pupils of all ages learn well and have fruitful discussions and debates about what they have learned.

We are all very happy with the report and thankful that it reflects what we feel about our school. There is always room to keep improving and as a team we are committed to making Blakeney the best it can be.

Over the break, our outdoor area and Rainbows classroom had a bit of a re-vamp, thanks to our new class teacher, Miss Collison. There's nothing like a bit of spring/summer cleaning to get ready for an action-packed term! The new learning theme of the World Around Us will see Rainbows class out in the village regularly. Mrs Owers has lots of experience in the Early Years Foundation Stage area of our curriculum and already knows many of the children from nursery. A reminder: VISITORS/GUESTS/HOLIDAYMAKERS please be aware...

NO OVERNIGHT PARKING ON THE CARNSER CAR PARK – It has been brought to our attention that several people staying in holiday cottages in Blakeney, are told by the owners of the cottages that they can park overnight on the Carnser Car Park on Blakeney Quay. This is not true, the signs advise that **no overnight parking** is permitted on The Carnser, and this is due to the fact that the Carnser Car Park is liable to unpredictable tidal flooding. Many of the vehicles that are caught out and flooded have been parked overnight on the Car Park when they should not have been. There are alternative car parks for overnight car parking, including Coronation Car Park and Blakeney Village Hall Car Park.

EXTRACTS FROM THE MAY FULL COUNCIL MEETING...

FINANCE

Accounts totalling £32,165.02 are to be paid - Clerk/RFO Report – Brief update on figures to date were given - To transfer the running of the 2023/24 Payroll to Norfolk Association of Local Councils with effect from next pay date for the remainder of this financial year - To add HMRC PAYE to the monthly direct debit list with immediate effect.

To accept the **Parish Partnership Scheme Grant** for **Village Gateways** noting the much-reduced current cost of just over $\pounds700$ compared with over $\pounds11,000$.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups which have met recently;

Blakeney Surgery – Cllr Nigel Sutcliffe.

Members are in receipt of the letter that the ICB sent dated 18th April 2023, as a response to our letter dated 4th April 2023. It states that patient feedback submitted by Holt Medical Practice does not constitute the feedback that the practice will have to demonstrate as part of this process. The Holt Area Patient Participation Group dated 20th March 2023; minutes refer to only 2 patient members. Myself and Victoria Holliday are trying to join this group.

All residents should have received a letter from our MP Duncan Baker dated 21st April 2023 explaining his support for our campaign. It contains a link to a survey that can be completed.

The survey to be distributed by 'Healthwatch', Norfolk has now been approved and will be dealt with in the weeks to come.

BBC Radio Norfolk has requested to interview patients and others involved in the campaign. We have now been approached by the EDP for a response, which we will deal with after the local elections.

Neighbourhood Plan – *Cllr Rosemary Thew summarised.* The referendum date is likely to be 20^{th} July 2023. NNDC are preparing a referendum version of the plan which they will share with us, with modifications highlighted. Notice of referendum must be issued by 11^{th} May. Thereafter, there will be 'some' weight to the plan with full weight post referendum. Prior to the referendum, an information statement will be issued by NNDC, and polling cards distributed and hard copies of the plan will be available, and details of the referendum will be displayed on both the NNDC and BPC website. NNDC would not accept the Steering Group's desired changes to affordable housing at BLA04. They said it was in conflict with strategic policy.

Traffic Matters Working Group - Cllr Nigel Sutcliffe. The TMWG met last Thursday to be updated on where we currently are.

A consideration to be able to buy into a dedicated Traffic/Civil Enforcement Parking Officer to attend at Blakeney on a more regular pattern will not happen. They cannot fill their current vacancies and we have no budget for the extra cost. So, for the time being this item has resulted in no further action.

The Traffic Signage review by NCC has been completed but the Group feel it is inadequate and have identified further work that can be completed. This issue will continue to be discussed and revisited by the Group. Village Hall Car Park and Car Park charging. We now have the legal advice on the Deed of Trust dated the 31st March 1980. It shows that BPC own the land, but BVHT do the dayto-day administration. If car parking charges are to be progressed further, we need to enter a 'Deed of Variation' or some other agreement to achieve it. The TMWG recommend that you agree to BPC commencing a dialogue with the VHT to see what can be achieved.

Motorhome Tourism in Blakeney. We have a request for some permanent parking bays to be allocated for motor homes in the Village Hall car park. The TMWG recommend that this course of action is not approved.

Traffic Consultation – This was an issue when TMWG first started its work two and a half years ago, but now it is not as we are aware of the limitations of what can and cannot be done and therefore it requires no further action.

Keep Blakeney Special Campaign – This has been ongoing for a number of years. From the start, BPC and NT (the co-owners of the Carnser) did not support this, due to its effect on traffic displacement around the village when our other car parks are full and the effect it has on financial income streams. This has been discussed previously and the TMWG recommend no further action is taken.

COUNCILLORS QUESTIONS

Question from Cllr Jane Armstrong; With reference to the Lawful Development submission (ref. CL/23/0164) in respect of car parking in Blakeney Dinghy Park, please could you explain who made the decision to submit this in the name of Blakeney Parish Council and with what authority.

Answer; As leaseholder of the land, having had conversations with both The National Trust and NNDC it was beneficial in terms of a reduced fee (public money, cost then shared by both parties), that the application be submitted in the name of Blakeney Parish Council. The Clerk as 'Proper Officer' dealt with this item in conjunction with The National Trust as part of our joint working protocol. (It must be remembered that this is a CLEUD application, i.e. historical evidence based & not a planning application which seeks permission to do something new, i.e.. two very different items.)

CORRESPONDENCE

Cllr Alban Donohoe updated the meeting in relation to the **Blakeney Channel Coastal Community Team** and requested that BPC consider funding another survey of the area at a cost of $\pm 1,500 + VAT$, the results of which would determine the next steps and whilst there was a consensus of agreement, this would be an item for the June BPC agenda.

Following a meeting instigated by Cllr Jane Armstrong in attendance, along with the Parish Council Chairman, Rosemary Thew, with NNDC Democratic Services Officer Emma Denny and NALC (Norfolk Association of Local Councils, County Officer, Sarah Bristow) to discuss **BPC Procedures** on 28th February 2023, the following were *resolved;* (though it was noted that members felt that it was unfortunate that a Parish Cllr had chosen to go to NNDC over

such matters, given that they had been considered by this council previously);

Councillor requested agenda items – If the Clerk/Proper Officer feels that wording should be changed/shortened, then this should be discussed with the Cllr.

Provision of Committee meeting agendas and minutes to all Cllrs – Given that 10 out of the 11 current Parish Cllrs do not wish to receive these items, the Clerk/Proper Officer recommended that all Parish Cllrs would be asked at the forthcoming AGM, if they wish to receive said items, and they will only be sent to those who wish to receive them in addition to the actual committee members.

Schedule all Meetings in advance for the Year – Every committee of BPC has historically been granted delegated authority which means that they choose when to hold their meetings, as opposed to being set by BPC. Based on the outcome of the forthcoming AGM, the committees can each be asked how they wish to proceed. All have in fact preferred to call their meetings on an as and when needed basis, i.e.. due to information being sought, site visits, and the nature of the unique committees and the work/life balance of the individuals.

Managing the play equipment – Should we undertake weekly visual inspections? Unless it is a legal requirement or required by our Insurance provider, then we are happy with the arrangements already in place, i.e.. professional quarterly inspections. If we are instructed to have weekly inspections, then Cllr Alban Donohoe and Cllr Jane Armstrong, would be happy to train and undertake this role.

Agreement of payments – BPC currently complies with the criteria to approve payments. Accounts are open to inspection by the public as is advertised each year.

Recording of meetings – BPC does not wish to record its meetings and neither does it have the equipment to do so.

We held our Annual General Meeting preceding the Annual Parish Council Meeting on May 11th. The annual Chairmans Report is attached.

The Coronation Picnic was a huge success. About 225 parishioners and friends enjoyed cream teas, ice creams, cakes, beer, wine and children's games in glorious sunshine. Very many thanks to our clerk, Gemma, for organising and running the day. Also, very many thanks to all the organisers and helpers, to the church for allowing us to use the Garden of Rest, and the Village Hall and the Swallows for kindly lending us essential items such as chairs and urns.

The Community Café continues to welcome parishioners and visitors. Thank you to our cake makers – they are delicious. The afternoon bingo is popular – do come along if you haven't tried it! Many thanks to our volunteers without whom this could not happen. If you'd like to join our friendly team, please do get in touch with me.

We still have plenty of money available for hardship support from our £2,500 Community Support Grant so do please contact the Clerk if we can assist you at all, <u>clerk.cley@gmail.com</u> or 07812384889. All enquiries will be treated confidentially.

We still have a vacancy on the Parish Council, to which we need to coopt. Being a Parish Councillor is a great way to get involved in and help your community. If you are eligible and interested in standing, please contact the Clerk for more details (<u>clerk.cley@gmail.com</u>). We would love to hear from you.

Members of the Public have the rights to view last year's Parish Council accounts from 5th June to 14th July. Please contact the Clerk on 07812384889.

We have been contacted by residents complaining of dog fouling on parish footpaths especially the East and West Banks and the boardwalk. We believe this is likely to be visitors unaware of the location of dog bins – we do have 6 in the parish. We'll be putting signage on the relevant paths. Glaven Valley Bereavement Support Group will meet on Monday 12th June at Merchants House, Blakeney 4.00pm to 5.30pm. Anyone who has suffered bereavement is very welcome. Refreshments at 3.50pm

Several of you have mentioned the Hilltop footpaths are unsafe through uneven ground due to soil erosion. They have been inspected by the Footpaths Officer but we're asking for another visit to review. We're also requesting – again – that handles be fixed on the descent from the Coast path at Artemis and before Zetland House.

You'll be pleased to hear that our Roadside Nature Reserve on Holt Hill opposite the intersection with Bridgefoot Lane has been extended and will be resigned. It is a good location for wild orchids.

Noise disturbance from events continues to be an issue. Whilst we are very grateful for the 12MN cut off at Barn Drift, we had complaints the other weekend with an unlicensed musical event (or rave) on the Hangs which went on until broken up by police in the early hours. We're hoping to get a list of events at the various venues (including Wiveton Hall, Knotting Hill Farmhouse and the Windmill) so that we can decide who to contact in the case of noise disturbance- ie Environmental Protection or the venue itself if planned, or the police if unplanned.

A councillor questioned the need for the National Trust to drive along the shingle bank to Blakeney point given the bank's importance as a flood defence. The Trust says it has been carrying out repairs to the Lifeboat House which needed to be compressed into a tight window based on seal and bird breeding seasons. There were therefore more vehicle movements than usual. Normal wildlife management traffic uses the same track along the ridge but during breeding season goes along the sandy beach at low tide.

The next Parish Council Meeting is on Thursday June 8th in the Village Hall at 6.30pm. The agenda will be published on the Notice Board, on the website (<u>www.cleypc.info) and</u> we'll mail it out to those on the Parish email list (if you want to be included in this please email the Clerk) and the village <u>WhatsApp group</u>. Please comment on or ask general questions about Agenda items before the meeting by getting in touch with the clerk or myself, or come along and participate. Cley Parish Council Chair's Report 2022 - 2023

2022-23 was another hugely successful year for Cley Parish Council, due entirely to our outstanding Parish Clerk, Gemma, who goes over and above her duties to serve our parish, and our hard-working Cllr's, who are always prepared to help out.

We had two outstanding royal celebrations. At our jubilee party in June 2022, a hog roast and the Old Wild Rovers were enjoyed by about 150 guests and raised an impressive £627 for Ukrainians in Norfolk fund. At our coronation picnic in May 2023, for which Gemma very cleverly obtained a lottery grant of £1100, about 225 parishioners enjoyed cream teas, ice cream, music and children's games in glorious sunshine. Many thanks to our inspirational committee members for organising and hosting.

We received a grant of £2000 from the Norfolk Community Foundation to set up a Warm Space, and the Village Hall very generously gave us a reduced rate for the Club Room which allowed us to open three days a week for 4 months over the winter. A very generous parishioner and her sister donated a fabulous coffee machine and we served delicious coffee and cakes to and played bingo with about 561 parishioners. By popular demand we are now running a community cafe on Wednesdays, which is supported by generous donations. We are very grateful to all our helpers who offer a cheery welcome.

A great deal of work took place on the allotments. We employed professionals to clear away asbestos. Many more plots have been let and more than 300 hedge trees planted. We were fortunate to receive a grant of £1840 from Norfolk County Council to put in a fifth tap and install 20 water butts. We also held two well attended and enjoyable allotment socials. Special thanks are due to Christine and Roy Williamson for the enormous amount of time and effort they put into keeping the allotments running smoothly.

New this year was our Toad Patrol under the direction of Richard Sear supported by a grant of £360 from Norfolk County Council, which paid for signs, hi viz jackets and head torches. 24 volunteers went out in all weathers to save 1129 toads, 105 frogs and 11 newts. This was a brilliant result and we are very grateful for everyone's hard work.

We received a Community Support Grant of £2500 from Norfolk Community Foundation which we have been distributing to parishioners who need help.

Many thanks to all the volunteers who helped with our litter pick in March which collected 18 bags of rubbish from the Parish.

Our Heritage Walk has proved popular and we are very grateful to Richard Jefferson and Sarah Poppy for the historical content, and to Gemma for organising a grant of £3000 from North Norfolk District Council 's Art and Heritage Fund to pay for very eye-catching leaflets and the to-be-produced information boards.

The initial drop-in session to launch our Neighbourhood Plan was well attended. The work in the initial phase, which is to gather the evidence supporting the need for a Neighbourhood Plan, is funded by a grant of £9990 from Locality.

We hoped to reduce the number of bins incorrectly placed outside properties. We counted 100 bins where they shouldn't be, but so far have had little impact.

This is the fourth year we've been asking for NWT to install a temporary loo on the beach. This is to no avail. Though we know 'unsanitary instances' occur, frustratingly we are now being asked for evidence in order to restart discussions.

We've tried twice to start a Speedwatch group to check speed into the village, but haven't had enough volunteers to make this possible.

We've still to complete the Newgate Green (in front of the church) improvement works which will see limited church parking and the grass banked and restored.

We're participating in the campaign to save Blakeney Surgery.

We've deferred any action on traffic problems in Cley. None of the many alternatives considered seemed entirely satisfactory or guaranteed to be effective, so it was deemed inappropriate to invest large sums. Parking seems less of an issue than previously so we've removed the cones and will review.

District Councillor's Report May 2023

From NNDC

'<u>Elections</u>

Following the elections, the composition of the council is now Lib Dems 25, Conservatives 12 and Independents 3.

<u>Coastal</u>

Coastal maintenance works have been undertaken at Wells, Sheringham, East Runton, Cromer, Overstrand, Bacton, Walcott, and Happisburgh.

<u>Planning</u>

NNDC has joined the Joint Venture in Nutrient Neutrality (with Natural England etc) so the brake on many planning applications should be lifted late spring.

The Enforcement Team are down to 176 cases from historically high levels: new cases are logged within 24 hours and site visits within prioritised case requirements.

Benefits

The 4th round of the Household Support Fund has just gone live. This will help those eligible with energy costs. Discretionary Housing payments are available for those struggling to stay in their homes.

NNDC has been given 1.25mill to provide 11 additional affordable homes for Ukrainian and Afghan refugees by December 23. Long term these will become available as temporary accommodation or affordable homes.

There are 20 plus affordable housing developments coming forward in the next 2-3 years which should result in 350+ houses.

There are 2775 households on the housing list and 69 households in temporary accommodation.

The criteria for energy efficiency improvement works has broadened so more homes are eligible.

Wellbeing

The Community Connectors are on Poppyland radio every Monday at 3pm discussing community groups and what support is available.

Environment

A solar car port is being built in the Reef car park to provide renewable energy for the leisure centre. Please contact me regarding bin collection issues.

Sustainable growth

The first allocation of the UKShared Prosperity Fund has been received ($\pounds 150k$). Some of this will go to the Sustainable Communities Fund to which you can apply.



Glittering prizes - a personal view

It was one of those wonderful sunlit winter mornings when the low sun caught the underwings of a group of Pinkfooted Geese heading for the Blakeney fresh marsh. Another nearby flock swung south to land in a field on the southern edge the village. I have enjoyed this view from our house over many years in all weathers; Curlews probing the wet ground for worms or one of the wonderful village-nesting Barn Owls quartering the rough ground along the field boundary.

All changed recently when this prized visual 'window' of a view between the trees slowly began to disappear as yet another, probably million-pound mansion, emerged from the site of a demolished rather outdated and frankly ugly small bungalow. Understandably, unless we are lucky enough to overlook open areas with restrictive covenants or are living on the very edge of the tidal zone, none of us have rights over our views. Of course, this is nothing new. In line with a government initiative to give more control to local communities over planning and development decisions, Blakeney Parish Council boldly took on the writing of its own Development Plan. 'Great' we all said! Hundreds of voluntary hours and public consultation over several years has attempted to distill what Blakeney people think are the priorities to both conserve and enhance our village. We are told that the country is massively short of new homes, but we all know that within the Glaven Valley and other popular villages in NR25 this is particularly challenging, since, because it is such an attractive place to live, work and play, and however many houses are built, prices are likely to stay way above the national average and out of reach of most people. This remains a source or worry and frustration. Whatever else the Blakeney Development Plan manages to achieve, it is hoped that a way will be found to re-balance the situation to provide more 'affordable homes' for rental or purchase, so that one of the key aspects of the Plan will become more than just an aspiration.

So, who are the winners?

In Blakeney, if my experience of seventy years living and working in rural villages including Blakeney, is correct, I see that the many new houses and smart modernisations throughout the area have been a significant bonus for those who have inherited property, and a great win-win for those with large gardens who have parcels of land to sell to developers or direct to builders for second-homers, and fortunate first-timers and retired people joining the community. Sadly, there may also be some opportunist buyers speculating on property simply as a commodity, benefiting from the fact that property prices have risen considerably faster than inflation. The property boom continues.

The question of second-homes and holiday homes remains a fertile topic for provocative TV documentaries, but with acknowledgment that tourist areas provide both seasonal financial boom and winter gloom. The popularity of North Norfolk is very good news for numerous trades, local shops, the hospitality industry, the boating industry and eco-tourism. It is recognised that these provide considerable local employment, without which communities would be even harder hit.

Some would say that the sale of 'Council Houses' in the past has added to the housing problems throughout the country, but against the almost universal difficulty of finding affordable housing, the local provision of rental properties through the Blakeney Housing Society and other organisations is something to be gratefully celebrated, as is the great voluntary work behind the scenes to facilitate these visionary charities. Volunteers seem to be in increasingly short supply these days, but Blakeney is very fortunate that its generous number of clubs, societies, our school and churches and other organisations and facilities are still able to flourish, often due to the hard work of selfless volunteers, regardless of how long they have lived in the village.

Congratulations to the winners of the recent Parish Council elections! Thanks, and good luck in your deliberations and actions in continuing to steer Blakeney into the future and balancing the aspirations and needs of current and future generations, and not least in the conservation and promotion of green spaces so vital for our well-being and our struggling wildlife biodiversity.

Boots along the Coast Path, Part 2 Wells to Brancaster



The sun felt good on our backs as we made our way down the bank toward the Lifeboat House. The day had become pleasantly warm, so halfway down we had a break, and while we sat, I sketched. I spent about 30 minutes trying to capture the scene – wind on the water and the bright contrast between dark pines and bright sand. I failed. At least 30 windsurfers were zipping up and down, and several colourful Sharpies were racing out in the channel at high speed. With quite a few holidaymakers still around it had a busy feel after the solitude we'd had up till then.

Coming off the bank we had a short debate as to which way to go. Along behind the pines past Abraham's

Bosom? Or straight onto the beach to enjoy the beach huts? I remembered coming to Abraham's Bosom on a primary school outing and wondering why it had been called that, because I didn't think men had bosoms, and also, I couldn't bring myself to say where we'd been when I got home. We went straight on. I think for a stranger coming over the ridge the beach huts would be a surprise. There are so many, stretching away in a line as if poised for the gun to race down to the sea. Once it would have been a sprint now it would be a distance race. Their line decays gently to the west, from a slight decline in their appearance and upkeep to an ending of just four posts sticking out of the sand. As the dunes and pines gradually receded on our left the great sweep of Holkham bay unfolded ahead, the curve of the shoreline carrying the eye gracefully to Scolt Head in the far distance.

The fast-moving cloud shadows continually altered the perspective, one moment the pines across the bay seemed close enough to touch then, as the middle ground darkened, they fled miles away. I have known this beach all my life and it has never been the same twice. Our passage over its expanse seemed slow but the walking was firm and we made our best progress here travelling in a straight line.

As we walked, I reflected on the ways I had known it – all seasons; day, night, summer, winter, warm nights in the sea up to my chest on the end of a trout net, to snowy gale-swept days on the end of a fork, and a fishing incident that had explained an old story. Billy Long told me how just after the war a shipmate of his from London came to stay and he took him netting. Wading into the shallows his friend stood on a flounder that buckled under his foot. It gave him such a fright that his legs gave way and he collapsed into the water, something we thought might only happen to a landsman.

Many years later pulling a net here on a warm still starry night, walking slowly backwards with a steady dreamy rhythm, lost; a star field of phosphorescence swirling in my wake and the real thing blazing above me, its glory only offered to night-attuned eyes. Suddenly there was an eruption and snort as a seal surfaced right alongside me. My legs gave way and I was floundering, unable to stand as the chest waders filled up and I was going under; I thought I was about to drown. Stanley Webster on the other end of the net thought it was a great joke. I wonder if all the strength going out of your legs might be a kind of fear/flight reaction. I guess if a big cat were to spring at you a sudden drop might just save your life - although people also wet themselves when frightened and I'm not sure how that helps, but it does explain the saying, 'going weak at the knees.' It also prompted recollections of another day, very unlike the breezy one we were experiencing when the lack of wind had given the sea a glassy smoothness, my eye could slip down the sky from its zenith to the sea at my feet and nowhere detect an horizon. I had tried to paint it using seawater but had been foiled by Boots. Excited by the feel of sand under his paws and frustrated by my staying still for so long began to run round and round me, getting faster and faster spraying sand all over me and ruining the sketch. And I remembered a time spent digging here with another friend. I had discovered a large area of good-sized lugworms almost where Mike and I were at that moment. At the time bait was scarce in other places so this new find seemed like a gift from heaven. But it was going to need two of us to get at them as they were under water and

we would have to dam and bail. Otherwise, it was perfect. We could cycle along the track behind the pines and then just walk through the dunes and be there. We spent several enjoyable weeks getting good bait in a short time – one of the few occasions I got some enjoyment from bait-digging.

Thinking, talking, and walking go well together, ideas bounce back and forth and the passing scene offers inspiration to brains benefiting from an increased oxygen supply. We had the most wonderful banter for the whole journey. Imagine sitting in a room with one other person for an entire day – how long could you keep talking? We both began to feel some fatigue in our legs, and across that expanse even a good stride doesn't move the scenery past very quickly. But eventually we left the flat easy walking of the bay and made our way into the dunes. This called for increased effort. Struggling up even the smallest of them came hard on the legs, particularly the knees. Nevertheless, we climbed the highest of them for a better view. What we got was a surprise. The sand that was stinging our faces as we climbed should have been a clue.

Reaching the top, we saw that the whole dune had become an enormous blowout, a whirling cauldron of sand, a particulate hurricane with a calm centre of exposed pebbly beach at the bottom. Bits of wood long entombed in the dune were exposed along one side, while the other side, blurred by a fastmoving veil of sand, was perfectly smooth. As we watched we could see its otherwise impassive countenance slip into small avalanches which, when they reached the bottom were whipped away on the wind. We wondered just how long those bits of wood had been there. They had the look of ship's timbers, if they were, then the first Elizabethans may well have shaped them.
