APPEAL FOR DONATIONS

The Glaven Valley Newletter relies on funds from our readers to cover the costs of editing and printing the Newsletter each month. Advertising goes some of the way to meeting the costs – but only around half of the cost. We appreciate that a number of you already support the Newsletter financially through annual or monthly donations, but it is, we are afraid, only a small proportion of our readership. Although we produce 1,500 copies, last year we received contributions from under 200 recipients.

Last year, we decided not to appeal for funds and to rely on a combination of our loyal supporters who donate each year via standing order and the fact that we had a small surplus from previous years.

This did mean that in 2021 we operated at a deficit and we are keen to ensure that we get back to a break-even position in 2022. We are very grateful for the support shown by Blakeney Parish Council who awarded us a grant of £500 in March, but we will need donations from our readers to ensure we cover our costs.



Blakeney Harbour Association – maintaining, preserving and protecting Blakeney Harbour for over 50 years...

In 1968 the Soviet Union invaded Czechoslovakia, Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy were both assassinated and protests were taking place across America against the war in Vietnam. Closer to home, the Ford Escort replaced the Anglia, the M1 was completed and The Beatles Yellow Submarine debuted in London. The average house price in the UK was £4010!

Here in North Norfolk, a small group of boatmen and

fishermen with a shared concern about the potential dangers around the harbour entrance at times of adverse weather and heavy swell, came together to form Blakeney Harbour Boatman's Association.

Over 50 years later some things have changed and some are sadly familiar but the Blakeney Harbour Boatman's Association has become Blakeney Harbour Association (BHA) and its volunteers are still working to keep the Harbour safe and to preserve this special environment for future generations.

In its early years, the BHBA worked with extremely limited funds but the professional boatmen gave their time and energy to ensure the shifting harbour entrance was safely marked for daylight entry with all manner of drums and flotation devices which were donated by locals. Whilst leisure users of the harbour were welcome to join, only professional members were allowed to vote on any decisions.

In addition to its important buoyage work, the BHBA was gaining respect as 'the voice of Blakeney Harbour' and was often consulted by statutory authorities about infrastructure projects or plans for new regulations. Volunteer Harbour Wardens were also on hand to offer advice to visitors or to 'police' boats seen to ignore speed limits in the Harbour or water-skiing outside designated areas.

Over subsequent decades, the numbers of leisure vessels using the harbour has expanded hugely while commercial fishing has almost disappeared and the numbers of professional boatmen earning their living from the Harbour has decreased. The decision was taken to change the name to Blakeney Harbour Association, better reflecting the views and needs of Harbour users and in 2015 BHA achieved Charity status.

Blakeney Harbour today is a busy waterway with seal boats ploughing to and fro taking tens of thousands of visitors to see the seals on the Point and hundreds of leisure boats sailing, fishing or just enjoying time on the water. The Pit is crowded with moorings, many other craft take to the water from sheltered quays in Cley, Blakeney or Morston and increasing numbers of kayakers and paddleboarders are seen exploring the many creeks and backwaters of the marshes. Many more visit the area birdwatching, walking the coastal path or simply taking in the spectacular scenery.

As a result, the work of the BHA to maintain, preserve and protect the harbour is more important and more challenging than ever. Although the complicated and obscure history of the harbour and its ownership mean that the organisation has never had the legitimacy of a Harbour Authority to collect mooring fees or impose fines, the Trustees are supported by a network of volunteers in carrying out a huge range of activities to keep harbour users safe and to maintain this special environment.

Perhaps most importantly, the BHA position and maintain a network of over 70 buoys around the inner and outer harbour area, together with other beacons and withies to guide skippers through the shifting channels. The founders of the BHA would be familiar with the regular surveys on foot or by

boat to check whether the markers are correctly positioned but would be more surprised by the monthly drone flights at low water which help to form a detailed picture of the Harbour. This picture is further enhanced by annual lidar surveys carried out by Environment Agency.

They would also be envious of the fact that all the buoys in the outer harbour are lit, each with its own identifying pattern of flashes. Had this been possible over 40 years ago it may have prevented the sinking of fishing vessel Concord with the tragic loss of 5 lives as it attempted to enter the harbour under darkness in very stormy seas. These days, the entire system of navigation aids is audited annually by Trinity House and we are pleased to report that we continue to exceed standards expected for a harbour of this size.

Those same founding boatmen would also be amazed by the amount of information the BHA makes available on its website, from tide times and heights to an interactive map of the navigation markers which pinpoints the exact position of every buoy. A BHA weather station situated in the heart of the Harbour gives live information about wind speed and direction and skippers can also access live data about swell heights. The website also includes a wealth of guidance and history about the Harbour.

The huge number of vessels using the harbour also means that wrecked or abandoned boats are a bigger problem than ever and BHA works closely with the National Trust to arrange for their safe recovery and where necessary, disposal. You can help by informing us of any abandoned boats by emailing info@blakeneyharbourassociation.co.uk.

As part of its mission to protect the harbour, speed limit signs are placed to help prevent saltmarsh bank erosion by ensuring wash is kept to a minimum, the long-standing Harbour Wardens do their best to manage behaviour in the harbour and CCTV has been installed at Morston Quay to enhance security.

Finally, BHA are pleased to support the work of other organisations that are working to sustain and improve the Harbour area and were recently delighted to make a contribution to the Cley Harbour project to sustain the Glaven channel and maintain safe moorings at Cley Quay. We are also supporting the plans of the B3CT Group in Blakeney who are exploring options to maintain the Blakeney Cut.

Membership of BHA has grown significantly since the early days and now numbers around 500. Apart from supporting our work, membership numbers add strength to our voice to protect the Harbour.

(Jenny Girling was nominated, but advised that she wished to step down from this role and not accept the nomination, having filled the position for many years. The Chairman and members thanked her profusely for her work and support over the years.)

Extracts from the meeting of Blakeney Parish Council which was held on Tuesday 3rd May 2022 in The Scout Hut. (Full minutes will be on the website in due course.)

Chairman's Announcements — The Chairman gave a summary of the site meeting held at the former school field, Langham Road with NCC, Broadland, Blakeney Neighbourhood Housing Society & NNDC, the outcome being that Broadland will consult on a planning proposal in due course.

Open Public Session –

• Summary of Cllr Jane Armstrong's comments, in relation to item no. 11.9. on the agenda. I believe the asset register is currently incorrect, as the fence between Sheila's Way and the garden of 39 New Road (my garden) belongs to 39 New Road, rather than to the Parish Council.

Planning – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building.

PF/22/1006 – Proposal; Enlargement of first floor window opening in south elevation to allow for insertion of glazed doors with Juliette balcony at; **Southgate**, **Wiveton Road**, **Blakeney**. **Resolved** - No objection.

FINANCE

Accounts totalling £14,987.50 were paid.

Clerk/RFO Report -

- **PF/21/16587** Land known as the Former School Field, Langham Road, Blakeney; Planning application for overflow car park NNDC have agreed an extension of time for 3 months, i.e., 7th July 2022.
- **Norfolk Ultramarathon** 2nd July 2022 Happy for them to set up again on The Carnser.

Approved the list of **Direct Debits** to be paid for 2022/23.

Agreed to ratify the decision to allocate an additional £1,000 to the **Platinum Jubilee budget** as per the request of the Events Committee, making the total budget £2,000 the same as 10 years ago for the 'Diamond Jubilee'.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups which have met recently;

Queen's Platinum Jubilee (RT) – Plans are continuing to progress well, and all events will shortly be advertised.

Party on The Pastures (SA) – Plans are progressing in line with pre Covid years.

Blakeney Village Hall Trust (EH) — The village hall operations are almost back to normal following the easing of Covid restrictions and the facilities renovation work is complete. Wifi is installed and functioning across the whole of the premises. Finances are breaking even, with a modest reserve in the bank. New modernised lighting will be installed in the main hall this month. We remain anxious about the escalation in the electricity prices and so we are exploring more efficient means of heating the hall and the economics of installing solar panels on the roof.

CORRESPONDENCE -

We are happy to sign the **BPC & Blakeney Village Hall Trust Agreement** for a further 12 months and during this time, we ask BVHT to check what legal documents Butcher Andrews may hold and to share with us any advice that will help us to resolve any outstanding concerns.

We have relaunched the 'Outstanding contribution to the Community' **Volunteer Awards** for 2022, and there are full details of this in the pages of the GVN and on our Facebook page and website.

Resolved to accept and trial the **Protocol for handling** councillor's emails.

Resolved not to place 'Matters Arising' as a regular item to the Full Council Agenda.

Resolved not to circulate the agenda and draft minutes in respect of all **Parish Council meetings/committees** etc, to all councillors as and when they are produced.

Resolved to ask the owners of 39 New Road, to produce their deeds for the land in relation to the request that we remove the reference to 'Sheila's Way Footpath & stock fencing to 'Sheila's Way footpath' only on our **Asset Register** and we shall do the same, in order to consider the request further.

Thoughts from the Rectory for June 2022

Dear Friends,

We all know what the main event is this month. June begins, of course, with an extended celebration to mark the Platinum Jubilee of the Queen. You'll all have seen publicity here and there for the many events in our villages over the period from Thursday 2nd to Sunday 5th, and there will be plenty of further information in this edition about what's going on. It's an extraordinary milestone, and the response nationally is testament to the admiration and affection in which the Queen is held. She has undoubtedly been a sort of national anchor in sometimes stormy waters. The world looks very different now from how it looked in 1952, and there have been many ups and downs along the way, for the country and for her personally.

She has often said, of course, how important her faith is to her – the spiritual rock on which she has built her life, and the provider of the example she has sought to set. Of t he hundreds of books written about her, one is called "The Servant Queen". It's an apt title, because she sees her role as serving this country and its citizens, not just being in nominal charge. We held Messy Church again in May in Blakeney Church – the first time we'd been able to do that for some months. Messy Church is an informal gathering for children and their parents/carers, on the second Tuesday afternoon of the month, after school.

We enjoyed having over 30 children back, with a similar number of adults, making crafts, eating, singing, having fun. The theme this time was "Celebration", with a special eye to the Jubilee coming up. The crafts the children enjoyed that day included making crowns and lanterns (for the procession down Blakeney High Street on Thursday 2nd). The Jubilee weekend will be a celebration for all ages, in every part of the country and beyond. The Queen has been a blessing and an inspiration for many. It will be a worthy cause for thanksgiving. May God bless her. And may God bless us all as we join the celebration, wherever we are.

Cley Harbour

Cley Harbour Committee has had a busy year. After a long period of fund raising and two years obtaining necessary permits, we were at last in a position to undertake further improvements to the navigation. This included a maintenance de silt to the quay are and upstream to the road freshwater sluice and a de silt of 500m downstream of the tidal gate. The downstream section was to also stabilise the banks and improve access which has made a significant difference to both sailing and rowing this stretch of the Cley Channel. The works were undertaken in February by a local contractor who has conducted many marsh-based projects in the area. We were extremely fortunate to obtain grant funding for this work from the NNDC Sustainability Fund, Defra and Blakeney Harbour Association. It is significant that there are more sailing craft mooring at Cley Quay than at any time for many years.

We also have permission to construct a Canoe rack which will encourage more canoes to use the channel. The works were only possible through the generosity of people's donations, volunteers who ceaselessly turn up to a myriad of working parties, a very positive committee, and the landowners for allowing access, my thanks go out to all. So, we look forward to a very positive season ahead with the following events already planned.

Cley Open Gardens – Organised by Jane Peploe and Kaye Read this event is on 11th & 12th June. Funds raised are going towards Cley Harbour and also the RNLI. Please see the advert elsewhere in this GVN.

Harbour Day – This ever-popular day is on Wednesday 10th August. We have various activities on offer inc Canoe racing, Walk the Plank and food and beverage is available. Entertainment comes in the form of Nelsons Shantymen, Pirate Joe and Steve Sausage a quite brilliant across the board entertainer.

Cockle Day – This year the Cockle fleet is again sailing to Cley in its now annual event. The fleet is arriving on the morning high tide (a proper marsh tide) on Sunday 14^{th} August.

She is a very special person and an outstanding parish councillor, and all our thoughts and best wishes for a speedy recovery are with her and her family. We hope by the time you read this she will be well on the mend.

As it's the first month of the Parish Councils new year, I would like to say we had a very productive 2021-22, entirely due to our hugely talented clerk, Gemma Harrison, who goes over and beyond to make Cley a better place to live, work and visit; and our hard working, dedicated Cllrs, who are constantly working away in on Cley's behalf. We are so fortunate to have such a competent and committed clerk and Parish Council.

We had a fascinating Annual Parish meeting, with local historian Richard Jefferson giving the history of Cley in 15 minutes (no mean feat!) and Charles Sanders talking about the evolution of his bus company, which actually nicely mirrored what Richard said about the recent history of the village. Many thanks to both Richard and Charles for their contributions.

Cley Parish Council invites you to the Jubilee Picnic on Newgate Green on Sunday 5th June 2pm-5pm. There will be a hog roast (vegetarian option available), tea, coffee, cake, beer, wine and soft drinks available. Entertainment will be provided by the Blakeney Old Wild Rovers. The WI has very kindly offered to bake cakes but we would be delighted if anyone else would like to contribute – please either bring along to the picnic or drop off the day before at my house.

Everyone (including visitors and holiday makers) is very welcome to attend our first village party for several years, but we're catering for those who live, work or own a property in Cley. We hope we've got the numbers right but we may run out of food and drink, so you might want to bring along your own picnic!

The Parish Council will provide some seating and tables and there will be limited disabled parking bays available (adjacent to the green) along with a drop off point for those bringing their own chairs, rugs, tables, picnics etc. In order to try and make the Jubilee Picnic as sustainable as possible do bring their own plate/mug/cup/glass, which we will fill up for you!

The Friends of Cley Church are giving out Jubilee mugs to the first 25 children who live in the village (aged 17 or under) to come forward on the day.

We can get substantial government grants to produce the plan but we hadn't budgeted to spend any extra. We will continue looking.

I omitted to say last month that our striking village gates were the result of a very generous donation, for which we are enormously grateful. I hope you agree they are both attractive and impactful.

The Ambulance Trust is running a First Aid course in Cley in July. Cley Parish Council has agreed to pay for seven flood wardens to be trained, one for each village 'zone'. The fact our flood wardens are keen to do this extra training is a sign of their dedication, and it seemed only fair to support them, given they put a lot of hard work into preparedness, and of course, in an emergency, we would be dependent on their skills. If anyone else would like first aid training (you would need to pay), do get in touch.

We're still talking to Norfolk Wildlife Trust about a loo on the beach for the summer holidays. If Cley Parish Council either owned or managed the car park, it would be a very simple matter to get permission for this, and we could go straight ahead, but unfortunately, we don't, so NWT will have to apply for planning permission. It will be tight to get a loo down there for this summer - fingers crossed.

St Mary's Church, Wiveton - 'A Church For The Future'

Wiveton Parochial Church Council (PCC) is delighted to announce that The National Lottery Heritage Fund has awarded a significant grant of £135,997 to St Mary's Church. This grant, made possible thanks to National Lottery players, together with grants from charitable trusts, generous donations from private individuals, substantial funds raised by the Friends of Wiveton Church and money from the Listed Places of Worship VAT recovery scheme, will enable the PCC to deliver its ambitious 'Church For The Future' project. This focuses not only on the conservation and restoration of the chancel roof, but also on an innovative activity programme of learning, interpretation and engagement.

These activities include delivering an Environmental Day Conference in the summer of 2023 to prepare and equip all churches across the Diocese of Norwich (and beyond) to respond to the climate emergency. The Bishop of Norwich will deliver the keynote address and the conference will form the centrepiece of a year-long programme of nature conservation activities including a haymaking day, a bat tracking evening, a 'Dark Skies' event and a churchyard survey by the Norfolk Wildlife Trust. Other project activities will include a Science and Symbolism STEM Day of learning for local schools and new interpretive signage and trails exploring the church building and the habitat and biodiversity of the churchyard.

Upon completion of this project, this beautiful medieval building will be preserved for the use and benefit of future generations and we will have inspired other churches across the Diocese to increase their positive environmental impacts through a focused programme of nature conservation, enhancement and interpretation.

The project will begin in July 2022 and will be complete by December 2023.

District Councillor's Report May 2022

UKRAINE - NNDC has employed a Ukrainian Support Officer to extend a warm welcome to Ukrainians settling in North Norfolk: at the time of writing there are 39. Drop-in sessions for refugees and hosts will be held twice weekly at NNDC.

COASTAL - the recent award of government funding (part of a £36 million investment) will allow communities and businesses at erosion risk in North Norfolk to work with NNDC to explore innovative approaches of adapting to coastal erosion. First steps are to work up the initial business case to get the first funding.

HOUSING - there are 2560 households on the housing waiting list, which is still much too high but in fact the lowest number for five years. 160 affordable homes were built last year. The number of households threatened with homelessness is up 14% from last year which is appalling, but NNDC does have 16 homes for temporary accommodation. The Integrated housing adaptations team have received a record number of enquiries, up to 431 in 21-22. NNDC is now working with Flagship to undertake adaptations to their

properties which should reduce waiting times for much needed house modifications for residents.

BENEFITS - the second round of the Household Support Fund started from 1st April. NNDC is working with NCC to launch the scheme as soon as possible. The £150 energy rebate scheme will be rolled out in May. If residents are paying council tax by direct debit the rebate will happen automatically; if not, they will receive a letter from NNDC to make a claim.

WELL-BEING/CULTURE- social prescribing referrals have increased to 934 in 212-22 from 603 the previous year.

The Mammoth Marathon will be held Sunday May 15th, running from Sea Palling to Sheringham, the half marathon from Mundesley.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT- NNDC has delivered support to businesses through the 'Go digital 'program (50 businesses helped with digitalisation); the Visit North Norfolk Membership program (172 tourism businesses helped with marketing and data); and the North Norfolk Care Academy (which has so far created 6 jobs in the care sector).

ENVIRONMENT - NNDC will undertake a caravan site inspection, focussing on coastal sites and those with potential safety issues.

The Love Holt Market will run till December on the first Sunday of the month.

Volunteer litter pickers delivered a successful 'fishing for litter' project, placing dedicated bins at fishing locations to collect marine fishing waste, which was then recycled. This will lead to permanent siting of such bins.

10 galvanised steel BBQ bins have been installed at Blue Flag beaches for BBQ waste.

PARKING - the public consultation on the NNDC Car Park Consolidation Order (i.e., car park charges) runs from 17/4-20/5/2022 and can be found on the NNDC home page. The most relevant pages of the consultation document are 10-12.

PLANNING - GIRAMS (Green Infrastructure Recreational Mitigation Strategy) measures are being implemented as of 1st April. This is mitigation to address the adverse effects on Habitat Sites from increased footfall and comprises a one-off payment from development, e.g., new house building, which will go towards protecting these special landscapes.

Nutrient neutrality - the guidance from Natural England regarding nutrient enrichment affecting the ecosystems of the River Wensum and Broads by development and agriculture has created a hiatus in decision making for new homes applications in the catchment areas (for North Norfolk, the district south of Fakenham and Holt). New development will require mitigation such as improving wastewater treatment works, offsetting nutrient loads from development by removing run off from agricultural land, and creating new wetlands. Mitigation proposals will be at catchment level and

therefore across local authorities. The Government has offered £100k per catchment for additional officer time.

This guidance will cause significant delay in the progress of the New Local Plan.

Local plan - the consultation yielded about 1000 representations. Overall, the plan was warmly received. The policies on biodiversity, the environment and connectivity were welcomed. Objections were raised including to the adequacy of infrastructure capacity and the need for increased provision to be in place before development occurs. There were questions as to whether enough emphasis was placed on the control of second homes.

NNDC can make modifications to the Local Plan at this stage as a result of the consultation, but they have to be evidenced.

Part 5 In the Village

About a quarter of a mile out from the Mash Green where Agar creek bends to the west the water was deeps even at low tide, it was known, perhaps still is, as Dead Man's Hole. We didn't know why it had that name but it was deep and we could dive there at low tide. 'Naked Island' nearby was our base, where we left our clothes to swim naked. The mud there was glorious, indelibly black and gooey with great smearability We splashed water on the banks and made mudslides, and when eventually smothered with it from head to foot would run back up to the quay to perform what we imagined were African or Red Indian dances in front of the Blakeney Hotel. The guests eating their lunch must have wondered if they were not cruising on the Zambezi.

On one of those days Duggy, being teased by one of the local girls, gave chase into the water and came out changed, unmistakably naked from the waist down but wearing what looked like a black pullover, his Oliver Hardy physique adding to the comedy. He then resumed the dancing, or whatever current activity the natives happened to be engaged in, oblivious to his altered appearance. The next day he told me that on his way up

the High Street he had been collared by a policeman and taken home by the ear. In spite of getting a roasting from his parents as well as the policeman, he seemed not to understand what all the fuss was about, why would he, he was only nine years old. What did a child know about the problems adults have with nakedness, let alone indecent exposure?

We were on the marsh from dawn to dusk, on summer days that were cloudless and azure blue and the water was as warm as we were full of life. We went home each day exhausted, mud in our ears, the marsh in our clothes and the scent of sea wormwood fixed in our memories for ever. All I have to do when wandering on the marsh in summer is rub some of it in my hands and, like little Horse Pepper ships, those days float back clear and untouched by the years. As long as I can find a sprig of that, the best of my childhood will always be with me.

At this time Duggy was temporarily living in the High Street (West Corner being let for the summer) just opposite what were then known as Coronation Gardens, now a car park. In those days it was an orchard, stately old apple trees amongst rough grass set out in a square with two seats on each side. In those quieter times a high value was placed on a space where one could just sit in peace and allow the past to mingled with the present. How have we managed to lose something so precious? The men preferred the Quay Corner seat with its view over the marsh. But on summer evenings there would always be a few elderly ladies on those seats. It was the place where all the children played. There were times when the trees were as full of children as they were of fruit and, like the fruit, most of them seemed to fall to the

ground at some point. Out of my age group I must have been the only one to escape without a broken arm. One boy had two. On his first day out of hospital, and with his broken arm in a sling, he fell out of a tree and broke the other one. If that happened today, someone would be charged with neglect.

In the furthest corner of Coronation Gardens there was an almost impenetrable thicket of blackthorn and other prickly shrubs, somewhere in the midst of which an older girl and her sister gave procreation lessons. I was very keen to get in on this but I could never find them. I spent a lot of time crawling around on my hands and knees, hoping to improve my understanding of the world, but I never found them. They were in there, though, I knew they were, a belief that was spectacularly confirmed one day when Billy (Buster) Starling went beating around with a stick and half-naked children scattered in all directions.

Far more dangerous than falling out of trees were the bravery tests. By this time, I was part of a larger group which often played in and around the church. The door to the tower had always been unlocked, and later when it became locked (perhaps because we had been spotted), I knew as a choirboy that the key was hidden on a hook behind my surplice in the vestry, so we were free to go up whenever we liked. In the tower's clock room, there is a small door that opens onto the roof of the nave. The first test was to walk out as far as possible along the ridge. One boy, and only one, could make it all the way to the stone cross at the far end. I never managed much more than about a third of the way – but I did remain standing, which some could not.

There was another test which, while less dangerous, was much more difficult and which no-one could pass. This was to climb the flagpole on the top of the tower. From the ground it looks quite small, but it is a very big pole. The problem occurred when you reached the point where the four support stays met. They were very difficult to get past, and in trying to do so you would at some point be forced to look down. When you did, oh dear, the top of the tower had shrunk to the size of a postage stamp and the illusion that if you fell you would plummet all the way to the ground was totally convincing. I'm sure most of us could have got to the top but we were beaten by that illusion.





- Operate the Wheelyboat "Poppy", a specially adapted ferry boat for the disabled
- Arrange respite breaks and awaydays
- Provide online workshops addressing loneliness and isolation through creative writing
- Making our events and meeting rooms available for new businesses
- Provide training to support Armed Forces personnel, veterans and carers

The RBL club will use surplus cash generated by our hospitality business for these activities




