



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

Energy Crisis – Update

First the good news - we have finally received the promised government help for businesses and bills have been discounted by approximately 62%. We have also recently signed a new contract for one year starting in April and, though the new rates are considerably lower than the ones for the last 6 months, they still represent a threefold increase over pre-energy crisis rates.

I think, therefore, I am justified in downgrading the situation from crisis to major problem. The Village Hall is not in immediate danger of running out of money or of having to increase hire rates dramatically. We may even be able to put one or two more heaters on.

The long-term situation is still of concern however and the Village Hall Committee is committed to reducing energy costs and 'greening' the hall [making the hall more environmentally friendly].

We continue to explore installing solar panels on the south and east facing roofs and are awaiting a third quote. We are also exploring replacing the antiquated night storage heaters with new efficient electric radiators or an infra-red system. In tests it was also noticed that there was a considerable difference in temperature between the high ceiling and floor level and it is felt that it is well worthwhile investigating heat recovery options to redistribute the warm air to lower levels.

As previously stated in the January issue of the GVN we intend to reduce heat loss by increasing the depth of the loft insulation by 200mm. It seems also that it may be cost effective to install secondary glazing to the large glass area in the main hall.

All these improvements will cost a considerable amount of money: upward of the £60,000 I indicated in January. We are actively seeking grant assistance and I am sure we will be able to fund much of the work from there. Most grant bodies, however, require the applicant to come up with part of the costs themselves. Blakeney Village Hall does not have the resources to 'match fund' all these schemes and is therefore reaching out to the community for help both financially and for ideas and initiatives on how the money could be raised.

Half term is over and Spring has definitely sprung! Wonderful things are happening outside in our plantation area-birds are preparing to nest and fresh shoots are poking through the ground. We are making full use of this space and have a wonderful fire pit area where we can share whole school stories and roast marshmallows.

This term our collective worships will be focussed on one of our school values which is *being polite* and of course, Lent and Easter. We have already started to prepare for our Easter Service at the Church. The children enjoy their time at St Nicholas' and it is another lovely opportunity for family and friends to join us in our worship. Thank you, Reverend Richard, for always being so welcoming!

This month, some of the KS2 children will be travelling to Hindringham School to take part in our Federation netball tournament. They are all keen to show off their talents and meet up with the other children. The same week they will also be travelling to Gresham's School to a Science event in the new Dyson building. Our Year 5 children are heading off to How Hill in the Broads for their residential trip which will be amazing for them. - b. The Boats/Items may be viewed from 10am to 12 noon on Saturday 15th April 2023, at Blakeney Marine Boatyard, where John Seymour, will be present to oversee and not before.

This notice will be updated to reflect which if any items remain in our possession and therefore for sale; ahead of the viewing date.

- c. Sealed Bids must be in writing, envelopes to be marked "Sealed Bid" and contain the name, address & telephone number of the Bidder together with the amount clearly offered. Please enclose a cheque for the sum that you have bid, made payable to 'Blakeney Parish Council'. If you are successful this will be banked, and if you are not, then the cheque will be returned to you with a letter stating that you were outbid. Local Government Elections - 4th May 2023 - We are fast approaching the next round of elections for North Norfolk District Council and Blakeney Parish Council, the 4-year cycle comes around quickly! So, if you or someone you know, is interested in standing for either the District Council or our Parish Council, then do keep an eye out for further information in the coming months. This process requires all existing Parish Councillors who wish to continue in the role, and other persons who wish to serve as a Parish Councillor, to submit nomination paperwork in the nomination period of late March/early April 2023 and, where the number of nominations received exceed the number of Parish Councillors to serve on the Council, then a contested election will be held. This would be at the same time as the elections to North Norfolk District Council – i.e., Thursday 4th May 2023. If you are keen to find out more about being a Parish Councillor, then by all means, contact the Parish Clerk for an informal chat.

NO OVERNIGHT PARKING ON THE CARNSER CAR

PARK — It has been brought to our attention that several people staying in holiday cottages in Blakeney, are told by the owners of the cottages that they can park overnight on the Carnser Car Park on Blakeney Quay. This is not true, the signs advise that **no overnight parking** is permitted on The Carnser, and this is due to the fact that the Carnser Car Park is liable to unpredictable tidal flooding. Many of the vehicles that are caught out and flooded have been parked overnight on the Car Park when they should not have been. There are alternative car parks for overnight car parking, including Coronation Car Park and Blakeney Village Hall Car Park.

Extracts from the February Parish Council Meeting...

Chairman's Announcements –

Neighbourhood Plan – this is now with NNDC, who are deciding what action to take in response to the recommendations made by the examiner and what further modifications are considered necessary.

Glaven Valley Area Conservation Review - two additional public meetings have been arranged for Thursday 9th March, at: The Venue, Holt: 4:30-6:00pm & Blakeney Village Hall: 7-8pm. NNDC Officers will be accompanied by representatives from Purcell, authors of the appraisal, to explain the process and answer questions. The public consultation period will now end on Friday 31st March 2023, instead of Friday 20th January.

Dinghy Park Management Committee met on 24th January, key points; compulsory registration, tags instead of stickers and winter works nearly all completed.

Report from Police - Wells Safer Neighbourhood Police Team - Advised that no longer routinely attend Parish Council meetings. Blakeney and the surrounding villages remain an extremely low crime area.

Open Public Session – Just to reiterate the desire for BPC to apply to NNDC to make the Harbour Room and associated land an Asset of Community Value, as due to national RBL branch closures, this could become vulnerable in the future.

Planning Applications (ref. no's shown);

RV/23/0018 – Proposal; Variation of condition 2 (approved plans) of planning permission PF/21/2307 (single storey extensions; removal of part of roof and extension to provide first floor accommodation; other external alterations) to allow additional window for bedroom 2 and relocation of air source heat pump, at Cranford, High Street, Blakeney. Resolved – OBJECT; to the relocation of the air source heat pump, which will impact upon neighbours, and we also have concerns regarding the proposed additional window for bedroom 2 which will overlook a neighbouring garden.

RV/23/0014 – Proposal; Variation of conditions 2 (approved plans) and 6 (parking) of planning permission PF/21/1805 (demolition of redundant garages and erection of 3 dwellings with associated parking) to allow for amended parking arrangements for all properties at, **Land East of 21 Queens Close, Blakeney.** *Resolved* – No objection.

FINANCE

Accounts totalling £17,122.05 are to be paid.

Clerk/RFO Report – Brief update on the figures to date.

- Certificate of Lawful Development application for the existing use of the land for vehicle parking at The Dinghy Park, has been submitted in conjunction with The National Trust.
- Precept 2023/24 NNDC have advised that they reported the wrong tax base, which has now changed from 549.77 to 545.19. The result being that the Blakeney Precept request of £45K means that a Band D property will increase from £81.85 to £82.54, i.e., an increase of 0.69p in the annual Council Tax for a Band D property.
- Following completion of the improved Vehicle
 Access to the overflow field on Langham Road, via
 the Norfolk County Council Parish Partnership
 Scheme, a new/additional metal field gate is being
 sourced.
- Parish & District Council Elections The notice of election will be published on Tuesday 21st March 2023. This will mark the start of the period in which candidate nomination forms can be submitted by

those who wish to stand for election on 4th May. All applications have to be hand submitted to NNDC by 4pm on Tuesday 4th April and full details may be found on the NNDC website.

- **Police & Crime Commissioner** for Norfolk, Giles Orpen-Smellie will be attending our Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 4th April 2023.
- **Charitable Trusts webinar** Clerk and Chairman to attend this event on 15th & 22nd February.
- Scout Hut Discussion with regard the 'local lease' and its expiry commenced with the Scout Group (SG) in 2018, 2019 brought about a new Group Scout Leader and everything changed. Feb 2020 the SG were prepared to sign a 2-year agreement (in the hope that Beaver, Cubs, Scouts and Leaders would return), Covid also hampered progress, as SG individual members were unable to hold virtual meetings. Most of the SG Exec left, and has run on skeleton personnel. They had been aiming to hand the hut over in good condition to BPC, compliant for community use. They had been misinformed over building work via one of their key Personnel, i.e., they need planning permission for the emergency exit/disabled access ramp, which they have since learned does not meet with building regulations, and also sadly a burst water pipe in December, which has resulted in an insurance claim. The depleted group are dealing with these issues as best they can. In the meantime, there is no current agreement in place, and BPC have had to seek legal advice from the start, over the 'local licence' (which is not a legally drawn up document) and the legality/implications of this, being out of lease, land registration and how best to move forward. This is a slow ongoing process, with much to consider. The SG is a registered charity, BPC is not, still much work to be done.

Community Fund figure of £2,500 is to be allocated as follows:

- i) Blakeney Area Historical Society -

- iii) Blakeney Conservation Duckpond £400
- iv) Blakeney Channel Coastal Community Team (B3CT) - £400
- v) Ruth James (Community First Responder) £500
- vi) Little Crabs Toddler Group (Blakeney Primary School) £400

The proposal to reinstate the **Langham Road Trod** Parish Partnership Scheme was carried and to use the remainder for the 'Community Project Earmarked Funds' towards our expenditure, thus closing this EMF.

Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups which have met recently.

Blakeney Surgery – Cllr Nigel Sutcliffe – We await the response from Holt Medical Practice (HMP) to our questions regarding the future of Blakeney Surgery. The Parish Council have been informed in an email from Holt Medical Practice of their intention to close Blakeney Surgery and HMP have commenced discussion with the Integrated Care Board in that regard. There is a process that now has to be followed by HMP to achieve their goal.

Our District Cllr. Victoria Holliday will bring the further issues to the attention of our MP, Duncan Baker, and she will try and ascertain the lead person at the ICB dealing with the possible closure of Blakeney Surgery, so that we know who to liaise with, she will also contact 'Healthwatch' (the local health and social care champion for the county). BPC will write to the ICB explaining what dialogue has already taken place between BPC & HMP about providing full medical services at Blakeney Surgery.

Blakeney Village Hall Trust - Cllr Jane Armstrong - The Trustees met on 18 January 2023. I reported, on behalf of BPC, that, on the topic of legal advice in respect of the Car Park Agreement, there was nothing currently to share with the Village Hall Trustees. BPC have responded to the solicitor's questions and are awaiting the solicitor's response. The Village Hall Trustees' main issue at the moment is pursuing a solution to the, much higher, electricity costs which mean that costs are currently far outstripping income. The Trustees are hoping to solve this issue by a combination of improved insulation, installation of solar panels and modernised heating system. They are obtaining quotations for the above work which are required in order that they can apply for grant funding. The other measure being considered is whether to increase the hall hire charges for "commercial" hirers. (They are not looking at increasing charges for community groups.) Following Edward's notice of resignation as Chair of the Trustees a couple of months ago, a new Chair, Alex Scott, was appointed at the meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE –

We shall apply to NNDC to have the Harbour Rooms premises, including the car park, the green and the buildings which form this site in the High Street, Blakeney, allocated as an **Asset of Community Value.**

We will dispose of our old **Gritting Machine** which is no longer fit for purpose, we may be able to obtain something smaller and suitable via any scrap money. Also obtain quotes for 2 new grit bins.

We will not be placing the access code of the front of our **Defibrillator** cabinets, as all calls should be channelled through 999 as advised by Community Heartbeat Trust, thus the patient would be assessed as to the level of treatment required, and the Ambulance Service will know whether or not the defibrillators have been deployed and will update the system immediately, i.e., rescue ready/not available.

We will be changing our domain name/address to.gov.uk as per the sector recommendation in due course.

Resumption of BPC Meetings – We continue to use The Scout Hut for our Parish Council meetings for the time-being, as it is more spacious than the Parish Office. However, in order to manage numbers, we continue to ask that if you do wish to join us at a meeting, if you could please let The Clerk know in advance that you plan to attend (a quick phone call or an email), that would be helpful and we will set the room out accordingly. 01263 741106 or clerk@blakeneyparishcouncil.org.uk

Zoe Smith, Associate Ornithologist with the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation, has over a decade's experience working in raptor conservation in the UK and internationally. She was elected to the board of the Raptor Research Foundation in 2022. In this talk, Zoe will give an update on the reintroduction of White-tailed Eagles (or Sea Eagles) to England. Cley Parish Council's Chairman's Report

There has been a lot of discussion recently about planning. It is North Norfolk District Council (NNDC) that legally makes planning decisions. The Parish Council is not a decision maker. It is a statutory consultee, like County Highways and the Environment Agency. They are asked for their views on planning applications, as are many other relevant organisations. The Parish Council represents the village: Parish Councillors are steered by local consultation responses. However, it is NNDC that leads the consultation process on planning applications, which are advertised by placing a yellow notice outside the relevant property. Cley Parish Council puts planning applications on its website, emails them out to those on the village mailing list and lists them as agenda items for Parish Council meetings. Parishioners can respond to planning applications either directly to

NNDC (online or in writing), via the parish clerk or at Parish Council meetings.

The Arcady Hearing took place in January and the Inspector's decision is awaited.

We only have The Warm Space till the end of the month. It's been highly successful, from providing somewhere to work and get a hot drink during a power cut, to our popular soups on Wednesdays and bingo on Fridays. If you need a lift to get to us, we're happy to collect you. Please contact Victoria on 07557054629. New is Knit'n'Natter, Sew'n'Chatter and Make'n'Mend on Monday afternoons. We're hoping to run a community café, say once a week, when the Warm Space finishes.

We were planning to spend our £2,500 Community Support Grant on electric throws and electricity prepayment cards but we've had trouble getting hold of them. In the meantime, do contact the clerk if we can support you at all, clerk.cley@gmail.com

We're holding a litter pick on Thursday March 2nd at 10am. If anyone would like to help, please meet at the Village Hall Car Park. We have hi-vis jackets, pickers etc for you to collect.

The first consultation for our Neighbourhood Plan on Conservation and Heritage is Wednesday March 8th, 4-7pm in the Club Room at the Village Hall. We'd like to hear from you about what you value most about Cley, what Cley's heritage means to you and how we can keep Cley special.

A parishioner asked about the possibility of removing the telegraph poles down to the beach. We're told that BT will discontinue analogue lines such as these in 2025. In the meantime, NNDC are looking at historical usage of the emergency phone at the beach and mobile phone coverage at the location before deciding whether it's possible to remove the lines and poles.

The Hangs footpaths should now have been walked by the Public Rights of Way Officer to check access.

A parishioner asked about parking on Coast Road track which seems to be causing subsidence of the bank. Highways say that they don't provide parking and this primarily is a service road. They don't own the land.

There has been discussion about access to the defibrillator. Currently, in an emergency, you get the code to open the cabinet by calling 999. Because of the emergency care crisis, we've debated the pros and cons of staying with this, putting the code on the cabinet or leaving it unlocked. On balance, our view (and we understand opinions differ) is to leave it unlocked. This is in line with our most recent advice from the Community Heartbeat Trust and will entail fitting a different catch. This we have not yet done, so for now you still need to call 999.

The Parish Council has lobbied for years to get Holt Hill gritted in icy weather. Highways have so far refused to do

this as it's not considered priority and few accidents have been logged (though we know they happen regularly). The Letheringsett-Blakeney Road is gritted, and that's what we're meant to use as our route inland, but Holt Hill would be far preferable. We'll go back to Highways and again make our case. In the meantime, it would help our case if you would report any concerns to https://www.norfolk.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/roads/report-a-problem

We're looking into the costs of buying a few paraffin stoves and torches for residents to borrow during power cuts.

The consultation period for the new Glaven Valley Conservation Area review has been extended to Friday March 31st. There will be two public meetings where you can express your views, both on Thursday 9th March, from 4.30-6 at the Venue, Holt, and from 7-8pm at Blakeney Village Hall. Do have your say! Our opinion is that the villages should remain within the rural conservation area as they are integral to the landscape, as should the salt marshes through which the Glaven flows out to sea.

The Parish Council will be giving Coronation mugs at the Coronation celebration tea party (in the Memorial Garden on Sunday May 7th from 2-5pm) to all Cley children under 18.

There is the possibility of funding from Norfolk County Council for Electric Vehicle Charging Points. This would provide for the installation and maintenance of one charger but it would only be till December 2024. NCC will be looking for funding thereafter. At the moment we've expressed our interest in the scheme.

There is always a debate about the extent to which lokes and footpaths are cleared. It's a balance between keeping them passable and providing a much-needed wildlife habitat by allowing the plants to grow. We'll do our best to get it right: certainly, no wholesale clearance is planned.

The next meeting is Thursday March 9th in the Village Hall at 6.30pm. The agenda will be published on the Notice Board, on the website (www.cleypc.info) and we'll mail it out to those on the Parish email list (if you want to be included in this please email the clerk) and the village WhatsApp. Please comment on or ask general questions about Agenda items before the meeting by getting in touch with the clerk or myself, or come along and participate. Minutes are posted as usual on the noticeboard and website.

The Flower team have gone green!


Over the last year or so, efforts have been made to improve the environmental credentials while arranging or decorating the Church. In particular, banning the use of floral foam.

Floral foam is made from synthetic, non-recyclable plastic and is created using a combination of carbon black, formaldehyde and phenolic foam - which are all toxic.

It was a bit scary to go 'without' especially for those of us who have known nothing else. For others the floral foam was a hinderance and some people just lacked confidence using it: "I've never been trained to use it, so I can't - I don't know how?"

Over the last year we have all been back to the beginning (pre floral foam)! Some amongst us had been experienced in using flower pin holders and chicken wire and other methods to hold the flowers into a suitable container, so we took on board their expertise. We needed to review the

containers and what flowers we were using, but whatever we did we wanted to do it sustainably.



We look for natural and interesting greenery (e.g different colours, leaf shapes, dried, twigs, blossoms/flowers or berries!) If you are lucky with the right kinds of greenery you can make a beautiful seasonal arrangement, without even using cut flowers.

Greenery is first used to create the framework and shape in your vase or container. It helps to 'work with' the greenery - if it hangs best to the left, rather than right, go left. Don't fight it!

A natural arrangement, often less formal than those when using floral foam, is what we are trying to achieve.

We would love to find additional flower arrangers to join us to help decorate our large Church. Can you put greenery, flowers and water into a vase? Would you like to work in-conjunction with another on the team to express your creativity with flowers and greenery?

We are having an informal

Flower Decorating Workshop on Saturday April 8th, starting at 10am.

If you would like to come along and try your hand, with the flower team supporting please come. **Everyone is welcome** and you don't have to have any previous experience. We will provide coffee and cakes too!

Cley WI – January and February 2023

New year, new promise and at the beginning of January our members met to discuss the four shortlisted resolutions (calling for change on a current issue in society) to be voted on at the national meeting later in the year. The voice of the WI is listened to attentively in government circles and its members have a unique opportunity to turn a concern into a national campaign, backed by the whole of the WI.

Once our votes had been cast, we settled down to a sociable stitching session, crafting pieces of felt into fobs, pincushions or suchlike in the shape of 'blood drops'. This interesting choice of finished article was directly linked to a previous WI campaign to highlight the shortage of stem cell donors, urgently needed for the treatment of blood cancer.

Since 2019 and the pandemic, the number of donors in the UK has fallen by 62% and so it was felt that anything we could do to raise awareness of this shortage could only be a good idea. A delicious tea and happy chatter when not concentrating on the perfection or otherwise of one's stitches made for an entertaining and enjoyable afternoon.

Our February meeting began with the AGM but this was very speedily conducted and we were soon able to welcome our speaker, Richard Porter, to present his talk entitled "Wars & Wildlife" drawn from over 50 years of travelling and working on wildlife projects in the Middle East.

Richard's obvious love for this part of the world shone through in his words and with almost 100 slides to accompany them, we were transported to the majestic beauty of Arabia, in particular Yemen, Iraq and Syria. Conflict has beset the region for so many years, the ravages of war have reduced so much of its heritage to rubble, destroyed vast areas of natural habitat and condemned so many of its people to near starvation that it is difficult to believe that any work in the field of conservation and protection of endemic species could be possible. Throughout these troubled years, however, Richard and his colleagues in the Ornithological Society of the Middle East and Central Asia have collected, recorded and published data on, amongst other concerns, the birds of the region, the migration patterns of birds of prey, wintering waterbirds and the decline and regeneration of the marshlands.

Not all the images we were shown were easy on the eye – thousands of birds foundering in oil slicks or decapitated in the name of sport, Marsh Arabs struggling to eke out an existence from drained, barren land – but the final note was cautiously positive. Training programmes have been set up to support local involvement in environmental and conservation activities. Endemic species have survived against all the odds and, with the help of educational material translated into Arabic, converted into an app and freely available to download, young people are being encouraged to swap their guns for binoculars. Long-awaited rains are improving water levels in the marshlands and restoring livelihoods. Water buffalo can once more wallow at leisure.

Richard Jefferson will be revealing the hidden secrets of "The Cley Heritage Walk" on Thursday 2nd March in Cley Village Hall at 2.30pm. Visitors are most welcome. For further information, please telephone 01263 740225.

Glandford

Many years ago, when Natural Surroundings was first established at Bayfield, Anne was responsible for erecting a Barn owl box alongside the River Glaven. It was a great success - somewhere we still have film of a Barn Owl going into the box that was taken on her father's cine camera!

There has been an owl box there ever since, but a while back the latest incarnation finally gave up the ghost. We had been meaning to put up a new box for a while and were finally prompted to do so by the offer of a box from Paul and Liz, keen local photographers, coupled with the offer of help to put it up. We were even more delighted when Roger Combe of Bayfield also offered a box, as it is useful to have two boxes in close proximity as male and female Barn Owls don't always want to roost together. It is great to report that in February, after a long period with few sightings, we have been seeing one or two Barn Owls hunting over the valley fairly regularly in the late afternoon, and they will surely have spotted the boxes, so fingers crossed

Winter is a good time for building projects, and we have now finished a short boardwalk through the wet woodland adjacent to the River Glaven. The ground here in the SW corner of our site is very wet and has been wooded for a long time - it is marked as woodland on the 1906 OS map of the area. Counter-intuitively, the ground here is wet due to springs and seepages and not due to flooding by the river, which at present seldom overtops its banks and even when it does only impacts a relatively small area of our woodland. These are part of the same system of springs in the valley bottom that kept our meadows lush and green all through last year's heatwave and drought.

Our tiny bit of woodland is a special habitat. The dominant trees are Alder, Ash and Sycamore but only the Alders really thrive in the wet ground and all the big trees are prone to 'drowning' or being blown over in severe gales. The result is lots of dead and decaying wood, both standing and one the ground, that is home to many different invertebrates. And, as we head into March, some of the special plants of this habitat will be coming into flower, including Town Hall Clock and both species of Golden-Saxifrage. With so many fallen trees and dead wood it all looks a bit primeval, but our new board walk allows an easy passage and the chance to have a good look at the flowers, fungi and other wildlife.

Lament for a Lost World

It is not unusual for me to remember dreams when I have a fever it is guaranteed. This week I had a fever and I had dreams. The last has left me more than usually moved.

Its theme was a day of celebration in Blakeney and was centred around the Blakeney Hotel and the Quay. It was the pre-invasion era and the cast were all from my early life. It was a hot summer day and people were coming out from the hotel to cool in the light sea breeze. I was standing with a group by the quayside, five of us, I alone am left from that group. It was an unselfconscious afternoon of much laughter and friendly good spirits. Just before I awoke, I had been talking to Jeremy Ryder- Smith (if you can remember him, it'll be you me and two others) and trying hard to recall a funny extract from a book I had just read which I thought would repay the hilarious story he had just told me. He had recently led a parade around the village pulling a very small trailer behind a lawn mower with a very large lady in it dressed as Britannia. They wisely followed a downhill route, although coming down the hill to the quay the trailer definitely looked to be in charge.

It would be strange on waking from a dream of such detail not to feel some grief as much loved and long familiar faces retreat to their graves, but so many, so very many; more than just lost friends it was the loss of a community, a whole village. They are gone leaving the faintest of echos, not because they had no successors, they did, but because they have no successors here.

The houses and cottages that held them now fill with strangers in summer and lay empty in winter. Walk down Blakeney High Street on a winter's night and the windows are dark; but for the miracle of the Blakeney Neighbourhood Housing Society the entire heart of the village would be lifeless. They are gone from Blakeney, scattered far and wide by an explosion in house prices that beginning in the sixties exponentially continues. The distance they were thrown from the epicentre dependant on the availability of social housing locally or their limited ability to buy. Just occasionally a born-here dies and for a brief hour or two time stands still and fleetingly a community is reborn. There are probably just enough of the indigenous population scattered over wider north Norfolk to make a single village population of 60 years ago.

The community I mourn was robust and cohesive, held together by bonds of friendship and ties of blood going back to the days of Blakeney Haven, Doomsday, and who knows maybe the Saxon Shore. A loss that is deeply felt, albeit by a diminishing minority. Of those I do meet the initial greeting is always followed by the same conversation.

Yare I'm ok, you?

Yare, bloody fed up with all this what's goin on, yu dun't hardly see anyone you know no more, plenty of others about, they all seem to know each other but they dunt know us. It's like bein a guest in you own house. All this bloody buildin, down New Road, how many more a they gonna let em squeeze in? They'll knock down a good house and crowd in load of miserable little boxes in a space too small for em. 'Green Croft House', ent no green left there, built all over the lawns they hev, covered in houses; houses what only hev summer people in em. The place is ****** up. Ass like a dead pig alive wi leeches.

This is the thorn in the side of most locals, the invasion of the super-rich and the exploiters, the former are able to buy large houses which were built at a time when architecture followed the local vernacular, knock them down and build new modern and invariably ugly eyesores. Physical embodiments of their own egos. If the local authority challenges them, they have the money to run the gamut of the appeal process and ultimately get what they want. The later are developers who have seen a chance to clean up. They buy a property tell the owners how desperate they are to come and live here then - as you just heard- knock the house down and build six or eight on the empty plot. NNDC have earmarked Blakeney as a growth village so do little to stop it, they are described as a planning authority but planning seems totally absent, bog standard, utility houses that would disgrace Metro Land let alone an historic rural village.

As surely as the characters in my dream a community has died, its demise not sudden, only slowly has its life ebbed away in a process not unlike petrification its original inhabitants gradually replaced by incomers. The physical fabric of Blakeney and Cley remain, and for many that seems to be enough, but its soul has gone. My most powerful recollections are from the time of that dream and in so many ways form the template against which I make sense of the world as I experience it now. I believe a meaningful sense of place is possible only if one's experience of it is four-dimensional. That one knows not just how it is, but how it was.

This was written a couple of days after the dream and is subjective and emotive. Which leaves me wondering to what extent it was the product of a high temperature or a much a deeper feeling of loss and ill adjustment to change. Nostalgia wears rose tinted glasses. So, I should perhaps add a little balance, because there are some (a precious few) who are different, they've seamlessly, noiselessly, slipped in, and almost without notice become accepted by the old community, many of my current friends have come here from someplace else. They join in, they make a positive contribution, they didn't push in telling us how we should do things, they waited courtesy to be invited, they respect local people and did not harbour subconscious assumptions that locals are unworldly or lack their own sophistication. And sophisticated they are, sensitive enough to have noticed more than just the buildings of the world they have come to live in, that others were here

Last Sunday, I heard that the Methodist Church in Blakeney was to close. After talking to Sam Parifitt, she told me of their plans to hold a service there on alternative Sunday's and to still meet on a Thursday morning for prayers for the village, then a cup of coffee and a chat afterwards.

before them, people with roots and a history. If only there

The Methodist Church or the Chapel as we used to call the building when I was young 1947-57 and attended Sunday School led by Mrs Bedwell and her daughter Kathy Thompson who was Peter Thompson's mother. About 45 children sat in the school room and we sang songs such as "Jesus bids us shine with a pure clear light, like a little candle burning in the night" and "" There is a happy land far, far away where saints in glory stand".

The highlights of attending Sunday School were the Anniversary held early in June – we each had to recite a poem standing facing the congregation of our parents. I can remember Mrs Bedwell asking Pat Horne (now 80 years old) to pronounce the word Just and not Jest. Then we would attend the Summer Outing when Mrs Bedwell would arrange for a coach to take us to Sheringham. We would be taken on to the beach and were able to play in the rock pools and paddle in the sea. A picnic was provided by the ladies of the Methodist Chapel and usually a kind person in the village had given Mrs Bedwell a donation so we could all enjoy an ice cream. Happy days!!

Perhaps the highlight of the year was the Christmas Party. The school room was decorated with a large Christmas Tree and Father Christmas – I can remember Dick Grey – David and Andrew Grey's father, dressing up. Each child was given a Christmas present and we enjoyed a party tea and games.

Also recently on a Sunday, I went for lunch at the Harbour Rooms. As I arrived, the chef Paul held open the door for me and introduced himself. He said it was warmer in the bar, so I went in and ordered a drink which was served by Mandy behind the bar. I felt a very warm welcome and I spoke to a few people I knew.

I ordered a child's portion of roast beef, Yorkshire pudding, roast potatoes, vegetables and gravy plus horseradish sauce. I was charged £7 but paid £8 because the meal was value for money. A portion costs £13.50. It was a delicious meal and a treat on a Sunday.

Then another friend who also lives alone joined me and we enjoyed the companionship.

Full marks to the staff at the Harbour Rooms for the welcoming atmosphere and warmth of greeting.

The Harbour Rooms Committee are thinking of alternate ways of keeping the Harbour Rooms afloat. So, GVN readers, let us rally round and show support for them so we don't lose another amenity in Blakeney. The rooms are a

perfect size for a party. I am going to hold my 80^{th} Birthday celebration in the Harbour Rooms – I am getting ready to party in July – watch this space – there's life in the Old Girl yet!


