URGENT APPEAL

The financial position of the GVN is now precarious. Each year we appeal for funds to help cover the costs of producing the Glaven Valley Newsletter – this year is more important than ever.

Over the last year we have faced a number of challenges

- A reduced number of advertisers with some defaulting on payment.
- A significant increase in the cost of the white paper used to produce the main part of the Newsletter costs have increased over 80%.
- A continual reduction in the number of people donating to the Newsletter in 2022 227 people made contributions 4 years ago this was over 400.

Taken together this meant that we ran at a loss of over £4,000 in 2022 and is obviously not a sustainable position.

We are taking a number of steps to address this, including a strict payment up front for the Yellow Pages section, increasing our advertising rates, reviewing our printing costs, and ensuring we are printing the right things for our readers. We are also asking you, our readers, if you can make a donation to us. We appreciate that times are tight for all people, but without increased financial support then the Newsletter will not be able to continue on its current basis.





EXTRACTS FROM THE APRIL FULL COUNCIL MEETING...

The Chairman welcomed our **Guest – Giles Orpen-Smellie** (**Police & Crime Commissioner for Norfolk**). Giles gave an informative verbal update on various aspects of the constabulary and his role and answered questions. We hope to have the Police & Crime Commissioner join us at a future Annual Parish Meeting, as this would a wonderful opportunity for both parties to engage.

Planning – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building.

PF/23/0070 – Proposal; Change of use from holiday cottages to ancillary accommodation to main dwelling, and external alterations including demolition of porch, construction of lean-

to plant room, blocking up of one window and installation of two bifold doors, at, Barn Owl, Three Owls Farm Cottages, Saxlingham Road, Blakeney. No objection.

RV/23/0473 – Proposal; Variation of Condition 2 (approved plans) of listed building consent LA/21/0227 (Works associated with replacement side extension following demolition of existing side extension) to allow amendment to design at, Red House, The Quay, Blakeney. We support the comments made by the NNDC Conservation & Design Officer, ie. that the parapet should be lowered by approximately 0.5m so that it is no higher than the proportionate verge height approved.

PF/23/0472 – Proposal; Insertion of two rooflights into south facing roof slope at, 1 Hilltop Retreats, Langham Road, Blakeney. No comment.

PF/23/0579 – Proposal; Demolition of existing single-storey dwelling and erection of replacement single-storey dwelling with accommodation in roof space at, Little Butts, Saxlingham Road, Blakeney. No objection.

FINANCE

Accounts totalling £11,946.28 are to be paid.

Clerk/RFO Report – Parish Partnership Scheme – Village Gateways application approved by NCC; however, we will assess the offers of the same via the proposed A149 speed limit review before committing.

Blakeney Surgery – Cllr Nigel Sutcliffe gave the following update; The closure was raised and discussed at the recent Annual Parish Meeting on 16th March 2023. We were well supported by our MP, District Cllr, and Alex Stewart from Healthwatch Norfolk. On the day of the meeting, we had received a letter from the Integrated Care Board, thanking us for our letter of the 23rd February 2023 regarding opposing the closure. They identified the reason for closure as being that it is no longer economically viable to continue providing primary care services to the local population from Blakeney surgery. It also said that their decision will be based on the information provided in HMP initial request to close, options appraisal and existing patient feedback. As the result of a 'teams' meeting arranged by our District Cllr, and Healthwatch we were advised to respond to the ICB's letter, which we have done today. We have a meeting with Healthwatch scheduled for the 18th April. when we will discuss further actions and they will help prepare some surveys that can be conducted to help our case. In addition, Jill Bennett of BBC Radio Norfolk has been in touch so that they can start to air news items about it. BPC can do nothing now because of the election, but she would like to interview patients who are adversely affected by the closure so please help us to prepare a list. One final point, is that a letter has been prepared for inclusion on the website of our MP for complainants to use. Other issues will follow with him, once the election is concluded. Holt Medical Services Ltd; this is the company with the partner GPs in control. What is the connection? A149 Speed limit review: Old Hunstanton to Sheringham – *Resolved* that in principle this is a good idea, however, with 20mph limits in residential areas and any clear/straight stretches of road to stay at 60mph.

Resolved to allow the Blakeney Regatta Committee use the playing field for the **Rural Sports** on Saturday 5th August 2023.

Re: Application for closure of Blakeney Branch Surgery (part of Holt Medical Practice)

Thank you for your letter dated 15th March 2023 in response to our letter of the 23rd February concerning the above application. Your letter is regarded as the first step in the consultation process which will ultimately decide whether the proposed closure takes place or not.

Those who oppose this closure are concerned with the content of the fourth paragraph of your letter in which you indicate, ". That decision will be based on the information provided in Holt Medical Practice's initial request to close, options appraisal, and existing patient feedback received, which the Practice has represented to the IBC in its initial request to apply for closure." I must state that the current status of Blakeney surgery, which the collection of repeat prescriptions, is the result of Holt Medical Practice withdrawing services from the community by an incremental process starting with the removal of the dispensary, this was followed by doctors and nurses not holding any face-to-face consultations. This action was taken without any proper notification or discussion with the patients who use it and in direct contravention of guidance to medical practices contained in the document 'The NHS Primary Medical Care Policy and Guidance manual'.

The Parish Councils whose patients would use Blakeney surgery have made representations to Holt Medical Practice since 25th November 2021 but these have been ignored. There seems to be a view that since Blakeney surgery have not provided front line medical services to its patients for a few years it does not matter and that that has become the new reality which patients must accept. Let me assure you this is not the case, and the various villages who used Blakeney surgery are deeply concerned by its proposed closure. The Covid-19 pandemic has only compounded this problem and it is felt that this is being used as a vehicle by Holt Medical Practice to legitimise their actions taken before the pandemic to remove medical services from Blakeney surgery without the proper consultations having been taken as required in the above-mentioned manual.

In addition to the above other important facts have either not been considered or considered and dismissed by Holt Medical Practice. These relate to equality, health inequalities and social value. The population of North Norfolk has, according to census data, the highest proportion of population that is aged 65 years and over in England and Wales amounting to 33.4%. It is suggested that this profile is in fact under represented by patients who used Blakeney surgery and that it is an everincreasing percentage. Many patients are not only elderly but are infirm and for them to get to Holt Medical Practice (6.5 miles away) or Melton Constable branch surgery (9.5 miles away) is a difficult journey especially where public transport

is virtually non-existent. Use has to be made of patients own transport, or use a taxi, or seek support from a relative or a friend. This impacts adversely upon their individual carbon footprint at a time when everyone is expected to be reducing it not increasing it.

We now have support from Healthwatch Norfolk in our campaign to get face-to-face medical consultation returned to Blakeney surgery.

Our future actions will include conducting a survey with parishioners to explain what has occurred so far and to ascertain their concerns and establish what they feel their medical requirements are. This information will be communicated to you once completed.

Since you are the statutory partner with the responsibility for holding Holt Medical Practice to account, I look forward to receiving your response to the issues I have raised.

Thoughts from the Rectory for April 2023

Dear Friends,

The main event of this month has to be the Coronation of King Charles III. It's been a long time since the last coronation, of course, and I'm sure there will be plenty of spectacle and celebration. There are all sorts of events marking the weekend, locally and nationally. Let's hope for fine weather! In these troubled times, it's hoped that the coronation and activities surrounding it will bring people together, as they focus on a very ancient institution, with all its time-honoured traditions, steeped in Christian symbolism.

The Church of England has produced a prayer booklet, with a prayer and reflection for each day from Easter Day through to Coronation Day. On the back it explains that the booklet is designed to help people to: "pray for the King, our nation and the world; explore the symbolism of the Coronation Service; reflect on Jesus, the Servant King".

That last phrase is interesting. Queen Elizabeth always said she saw her role as one of service and sacrifice to the people of this country and the Commonwealth. King Charles has also pledged to continue that approach. It just so happens that on the day I'm writing this, the Bible passage given for today in this Coronation booklet quotes Jesus saying "Whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant" (Matthew 20:26). That's a commitment that's not easy to honour when you're in a position of great power or privilege, whatever organisation you're involved with. And dare I say, it's something which a lot of our political leaders could do with re-learning? And it's something that the new King will need support to fulfil, including the support of our prayers. As we remembered very recently on Maundy Thursday, Jesus, on the last night before his death, demonstrated servant leadership in the most dramatic way by washing his disciples' feet - a job normally reserved for lowly servants to carry out.

Let's pray for King Charles, that he will be able to take that sense of service into his reign, and for ourselves, that we're committed to serving each other in our communities, and live out our calling to "love our neighbour", whoever they may be.

Have a wonderful Coronation Weekend, and enjoy the celebration!

Cley WI report on March talk

Richard Jefferson has long been the 'go to' person for facts, figures and minutiae where local history is concerned and Cley WI has reaped the rewards of his extensive knowledge at previous meetings. It is well documented that in the Thirteenth Century, Cley was one of the busiest ports in England and the River Glaven a wide estuary with huge ships sailing all the way up to the church, something we can scarcely believe today. The slides were many and varied following the direction of the Walk and its

sites of historic interest. Even those of us who think we know our village well found that we still had a lot to learn.

The Walk itself takes about 45 minutes and Richard has offered to lead a small group of our members on a tour later on in the year. Further details to follow.

Report on April talk

A Talk by Dorothy Tucker on Kantha: Stitched Stories

Dorothy Tucker returned to Cley WI to present an excellent talk with slides explaining the history of the Kantha quilt tradition which emanated from the Bengal region of India before Partition.

During the monsoon season Bengali women used worn out garments such as Saris placed layer upon layer and stitched them using a running stick to quilt the fabric - they even used the threads from old saris - an early example of recycling.

In some cases, elaborate embroidery was sown onto the fabric depicting Hindu symbols e.g., a Lotus was often placed at the centre of the piece then birds, fish, flowers, parrots, elephants, lions, horses and riders were embroidered from the centre out to the edges of the fabric.

Dorothy showed us examples of various pieces of work - one was approximately 100 years old. She also brought along other pieces she had purchased on her trips to India as well as some of her own work. The Joss Graham Gallery in London has an extensive collection of Kantha Quilts.

Dorothy has been a member of a Textile Study Group for many years - it is celebrating its 50th year and works are being exhibited in various locations. For more information visit the website: textilestudygroup.co.uk

News from Natural Surroundings

April has been, for once, fairly average in terms of temperature and rainfall. At Natural Surroundings we are particularly pleased that it has, like March before it, been relatively wet. April droughts have become all too familiar. The plants have responded accordingly, and when the sun comes out it is joyful to see Orange-tips and Brimstones fluttering around a myriad of flowers. By mid-month our Bird Cherries and pears were in full flower, with some of the choice woodland flowers, such as Herb Paris, Beautiful Lady's Slipper and Merrybells coming along nicely.

Bird-wise we have had a quiet spring. A Firecrest sang on one day only, and very few summer migrants had arrived. On 12th and 13th April, however, we were graced by the presence of a Willow Warbler. This used to be a common bird, but with the impact of climate change the 'centre of balance' of its breeding range in Britain has moved northwards - it is still common in Northern England and Scotland. Norfolk is now on the edge of its range and in common with many plants and animals away from their core distribution it is only found as a breeding bird in Norfolk where the habitat is just right. By contrast Chiffchaff, which used to be massively outnumbered by Willow Warblers, is now far commoner and we have several in full song.

We have hosted volunteers at Natural Surroundings for quite a few years now, Our Garden Club have been a loyal band who enjoy working in our wildlife gardens as well as taking on other varied tasks such as meadow management and making charcoal. We are always pleased to work with volunteers and share our skills, and they have the added bonus of free access to our gardens. This spring we are looking for volunteers to help with renewing our willow structures and creating new ones, all under the watchful eye of Larry, who very generously keeps our willow bushes in shape and manages them for use on site. If you would like to

volunteer to come and to learn how to work with willow, or come and help with our herb garden, bee garden and butterfly garden, please do come along on Thursday mornings from 10.30 am till 1 pm - everyone is welcome.

Do you have limited mobility? Discover the North Norfolk Wheelyboat "Poppy"

On the 22nd April 2022 Poppy, Norfolk's first wheelchair accessible powerboat made her first official splash.

Officially launched by the Countess of Leicester, Poppy set sail for the first time from the heart of her new home, Blakeney Quay.

Starting again from 8th April until 26th October we plan to operate a free of charge regular service from Blakeney or Morston harbour into the Blakeney National Nature Reserve.

Although trips are free, we welcome donations towards the cost of running/ maintaining the vessel and providing an excellent service to our customers.

Our trips are always dependant on the tides and weather conditions. The trip is approximately one hour but can be made shorter to suit needs.

The Vessel is specifically designed for wheelchair access and enables adults and children with limited mobility the opportunity to access the surrounding area, and experience the pleasure of the sights and sounds of Blakeney wildlife that we all take for granted.

Blakeney harbour provides a sheltered environment comprising part of two national nature reserves famous for its bird life and one of the country's most important seal colonies.

Poppy is owned and administered by The North Norfolk Charitable Trust.

We are able to accommodate a maximum weight, wheelchairs and passengers inclusive, of 365kg. Please ensure that your cohort is equal to or below this weight.

District Councillor's report From NNDC

'Elections

NNDC is flagging the need for photo ID to vote in the local elections on May 4th (such as passport, drivers' licence, bus pass, blue badge etc - these don't have to be current as long as the photo is a reasonable likeness).

Coastal

Coastal maintenance works have been undertaken at wells, Sheringham, East Runton, Cromer, Overstrand, Bacton, Walcott, and Happisburgh.

Planning

NNDC has joined the Joint Venture in Nutrient Neutrality (with Natural England etc) so the brake on many planning applications should be lifted late spring.

The Enforcement Team are down to 176 cases from historically high levels: new cases are logged within 24 hours and site visits within prioritised case requirements.

Benefits

The 4th round of the Household Support Fund has just gone live. This will help those eligible with energy costs. Discretionary Housing payments are available for those struggling to stay in their homes.

NNDC has been given 1.25mill to provide 11 additional affordable homes for Ukrainian and Afghan refugees by December 23. Long term these will become available as temporary accommodation or affordable homes.

There are 20 plus affordable housing developments coming forward in the next 2-3 years which should result in 350+ houses.

There are 2775 households on the housing list and 69 households in temporary accommodation.

The criteria for energy efficiency improvement works have broadened so more homes are eligible.

Sustainable growth

The first allocation of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund has been received (£150k). Some of this will go to the Sustainable Communities Fund to which you can apply.



The bridge was removed in February 2022 by the National trust with the intention of not replacing it. Local people wrote letters and emails to the National trust and our local MP and the National trust agreed to replace the bridge but by December of 2022 had gone back on their word.

People and groups from the community and beyond again campaigned with letters and emails to the National trust pointing out the safety aspect of the bridge being removed and the obvious danger to the public this presented and managed to obtain a commitment in March 2023 from the National trust to replace the bridge with a planning application going in to NNDC in June.

The support from our local MP has been woefully lacking it is the pressure from the community of Stiffkey and the surrounding villages and beyond that has brought about this commitment to rebuild the bridge.

Boots along the Coast Path Part 1

The idea of a walk from Blakeney to Hunstanton was born over supper one night with a friend; Mike Curtis. * He believed that there was more than one way of knowing the world. You

could travel far and have experience of many places, be cosmopolitan, a world traveler, which is not that difficult if you have the means. Or you can know a smaller world, an area bounded by your life and habitation, a wood, a hill, a valley, or as here a harbour, a stretch of coast.

There is as much knowing in a small world as in all the world and this coast has a particular richness and touches us in ways that places known in a wider sense never can. I had been describing some of my favourite spots along the coast and despite his intimate association with Blakeney and Morston Mike confessed that many of them were unfamiliar to him. A walk seemed the obvious way to put this right. The third member of our party was Boots. For all of his life this small, untidy black terrier, with his four white socks, boundless stamina and a IQ superior to a few people I've known was my constant companion - standing like a lookout on the bow of Ebbtide, scampering up mountains in Scotland, or trotting lead-less around Liberty's in the West End of London. I went to few places without him. So, I was anticipating the expedition with as much enthusiasm for him as for myself.

As I approached the bottom of the road - I thought I could hear Mike coming but it was a local man who came lurching round the corner dragged by a large black Labrador. He leaned back on the lead, looked at me with a slightly puzzled expression, and said, "Whatayer goin on a hike"? I replied that I was. "I dorn't much like the look a that." He jerked his head toward the south-west, where there was a cloud. "Still, I'll say namore." It was his habit to append all his statements with these safety-catch phrases, which I suppose is quite natural if most of the prediction you have ever made failed to materialise. So, I was considerably heartened by his observation. I have always thought that a person's perception can be judged by how far and how clearly, they can see down the road ahead, and I knew I was listening to someone for whom life's every moment came as a surprise. When Mike arrived, I told him why I thought it would be a bright sunny day. It was grey and cool as we set off from the Mash Green, but from my reading between the isobars of the previous night's forecast I was confident we were in for a lovely day. The first mile was uneventful. Boots had the most excitement, trying and spectacularly failing to mate with a large Red Setter bitch, I wondered how big things looked to him. Reaching the Greens at Morston my right knee gave way and I fell. Lying face down and peering through the wet grass Brancaster suddenly looked a long way off. My knee had been a problem for a day or two, but when I got up, I found the ache had gone and everything suddenly looked brighter. The path from Morston to Stiffkey Freshes is one of the most beautiful on this coast. The white of the Point dunes standing out brightly against the wind-darkened ribbon of the Pit and Wells East Hills spread indigo to the north west. Some horizons excite you as to what might lie beyond; East Hills do that, it's a landscape that pulls you onward. Stiffkey Freshes came next.

The Freshes where I once kept a boat have a special place in the heart of my family. Every summer evening when the children were small, and if the tide and weather were right, we would be there, the children running naked, flinging themselves off the mud ledges into the warm incoming tide. I would often go out and catch a few mackerel, which we would then cook on an old fire grate propped up on stones. It 's probably still in the bushes there somewhere. At Stiffkey we met Jack Rowe – an old bait-digging mate - gathering hay at the bottom of the Greenway. "What about when you raced my tractor through the village?" he said. "Left my old Fergie for dead." "No running today," I said," I just hope I can keep walking." Leaving along a narrow-overgrown path we came to the Whirly Gig*, another favoured spot, the children learned to ride their bikes around its smooth tarmac circle. It was here that we noticed an elderly lady up ahead with her dog. She was dressed as if for shopping in Harrods – long smart coat, grey stockings and big shiny black shoes, each one of which looked at least as heavy as my pack. We thought we had been getting along at a good pace but we couldn't keep up with her. We increased our stride but we still didn't gain on her. Then, as if sensing our struggle, she stopped and turned to wait for us. She turned out to be a Scot and I guessed she could easily have walked from there. Breathlessly Mike said, "We couldn't

catch up with you," "Ah weel," she replied, "ye dinna do it all the time like me." I wondered, how she knew that? While she was distracted with her dog, which Boots's unwanted attentions had driven into the hedge, we seized the opportunity to get ahead of her. But the occasional glance back suggested we were walking on the spot until she turned for home. By now we could see Wells across the marsh, but first we had to negotiate a very overgrown stretch of grass and scrub where we got wet feet. Emerging from there we came onto North Point Bank, directly east of the town, and bounds what was once a finger of tidal estuary stretching inland as far as Warham. The old saltwater creeks can still be seen winding though the farmland. * We came into Wells through the whelk sheds, which afforded a perfect, unspoiled preface to the town. Sadly, it's not that way anymore.

Mike and his wife Pooh came to Blakeney in the late 60s. He quickly became a friend, and remained so until his death in 2007. He was one of those people who enable you to see beyond self-imposed limits. Everything you offered for his opinion came back gilded. Painting in watercolour imparts an understanding of less being more, that true beauty is usually simple and clean. Mike epitomised this. During an evening he might, if asked (or if not already playing the piano), pick up a small guitar and play. If it was one of his own songs it would be a gentle but perfect balance of music and words. He was totally in love with this place and became an essential part of it. When he died, Blakeney's enormous church was too small to hold those he left behind. Now a wildlife reserve.


