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

#### **News from Blakeney CEVA School**

All the children in our school are in full swing at the moment with a mixture of lessons, visits, and extra-curricular activities.

Athletics season is upon us and the children are enjoying their hurdling practise. We are also bringing the Maypole out of storage and have new ribbons! It is very exciting to see the wonderful old oak pole back in the playground. I am told by a parent of a current pupil (who attended Blakeney themselves) that it was always a tradition for the children to dance around the pole for Mayday. It is rather heavy and cumbersome but I hope the dance will be worth the effort.

This month, all of the children will be going on a walk with Bishop Graham. The walk; from the school, down to the Quay and on to Morston, will be a wonderful opportunity to talk with the Bishop. The children who are all very familiar with the route, have some particularly fascinating questions for the Bishop based around finding God in special landscapes. Blakeney Harbour and The Norfolk Coastal path are certainly two of those. To be given the time to appreciate this and an opportunity to talk about it will be a wonderful time for reflection.

May will also see the Year 6 children taking their SAT's exams. They have been taking extra lessons in English, Spelling and Grammar, and Maths during school and attending a revision club after school. Our own assessments identified any gaps in their learning and revision is tailored to meet the needs of each child. This is being done in a fun and informal way and always includes snacks and fruit juice! I haven't seen any signs of nerves as the children know that they are well prepared to take these tests. I advise plenty of sleep, relaxation, and hearty meals. Having happy, healthy, and enthusiastic children who are well balanced and enjoy learning is our aim. Regardless of the outcomes, we are very proud of this cohort and know they will go on to their future schools representing Blakeney in a very positive light.

This month also sees our school federation Founding Day. Each year, all 4 schools in the Pilgrim federation (Walsingham, Kelling, Hindringham and Blakeney) get together to celebrate its' creation. Last year, Blakeney hosted the event and this year it is the turn of Walsingham. All pupils and staff will arrive at the shrine in Houghton St Giles for a service of thanksgiving where Year 6 children from each school will speak of their Federation memories. With the exception of nursery children, we will then all walk the Holy Mile to the Anglican Shrine for a picnic and ice cream.

These days are always lots of fun and give children and staff an opportunity to see familiar faces.

Our amazing PTFA are also incredibly busy at the moment. On Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> May, they will be providing tea, coffee, and

cakes at Stody Lodge gardens. The tea room is open from 1pm-5pm and tickets are available on line. The children and staff here at Blakeney have sampled many treats provided by the PTFA over the years and can commend them to you whole-heartedly!

It is rare that I write a newsletter without giving out a particular thank you. So many members of the community help our school and being in a position to show gratitude is one of the most rewarding parts of being at Blakeney CEVA Primary. Last month, the yellow lines outside the school and safety signage was refreshed after a parent raised a concern about traffic. Thank you to the parent who took the time to contact our local MP and thank-you to Duncan Baker and his office, who expedited the work. The safety of our children is paramount. Thank you also to those residents who continue to drive with particular care past the school.

Coming up before half term; the older children are visiting the Dyson building at Greshams School for a Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths Day, John Lorimer-who discovered Sea Henge- is coming in to talk to the children about its' significance and the whole school are undergoing CPR training with the East Anglian Air Ambulance. Thank goodness we have a half term to recover!

#### **DIGITAL SWITCHOVER WEBINAR**

attended by Rosemary Thew (Chairman Blakeney Parish Council)

Webinar hosted by Duncan Baker. The professional input was from BT and Virgin.

The switchover from analog is industry led and analog will be switched off by the end of 2025. Thereafter, phone lines will be served by broadband. Most people should not be aware of the change. Apparently, home land lines are unreliable and the change is happening worldwide.

Providers will contact customers ahead of the switchover. If someone does not have a mobile phone or access to broadband, a free solution should be offered to ensure contact with emergency services. This is likely to be a router to transmit phone calls at no extra cost.

Those depending on land lines need to be in touch with their provider (who should contact them). Telephone companies are working with local authorities to identify vulnerable people. There will be provision for them to have a fall back in place in the event of a power cut (when land lines won't work), although that protection seems to last only one hour.

A mandated engineer should visit vulnerable customers to assist and bulk migration is currently paused for more work to be done to identify vulnerable customers in rural areas.

For those who have broadband, the switchover should be simple-plugging in a wire to the existing router. However, additional extensions are not so easy and will need to be paid for. Migration is on a "batch" (geographical basis) with millions already migrated with no problems and vulnerable customers protected.

Publicity material should be made available as migration approaches.

#### **COMMUNITY GROUP REPORTS**

**GLAVEN CARING ICO** – Alan Collett - Thank you to the Parish Council for granting the charity a sum of £500. Dr Tony Allibone started the charity in 1974, some 50 years ago, providing the elderly a warm and friendly welcome, in a relaxing atmosphere. This basic premise has continued and grown. This year it is celebrating its 50th anniversary, more news of which will follow!

It is managed by three committees, the supporters committee, the staff committee, and the trustees. The clients have traditionally come from the twelve villages of the Glaven Valley plus Holt. Today the boundaries are a little more flexible. It is the charity's intention that the first passenger picked up, by its bus should be in the centre one hour later. Negotiations are ongoing with Fakenham Age Concern to provide its bus to transport clients to and from the villages of Briston and Melton Constable.

The centre, its staff and many volunteers provide just what the clients require, be it quiet, or conversation, music or games, lunch or coffee and cake. The activities are carefully planned and tailored to those that come through the front door. We enjoy visits from Pets as Therapy, such as PAT dogs, or rabbits or horses. The trustees are currently working on a policy to enable clients to bring their own pets to the centre. Perhaps greyhounds and rabbits on the same day would not be such a clever move.

Recently at a Safeguarding training session, one person voiced that the knowledge gained at the previous training session about Dementia, was exactly the knowledge they would have liked to have had when they had been caring for a family member with dementia. It seemed to strike a chord. There is a need to educate/support those caring for and living with Dementia. Glaven Caring is going to hold an event to provide the opportunity to do just this and maybe if successful, hold more than one. The details are being worked out, but support is being sought and provided by the Holt Medical Practice with which the charity has had historic close connections. The charity currently provides the hot meals for the Poppy Café or Club in Holt once a month, and looks forward to further cooperation with this venture.

GLAVEN VALLEY NEWSLETTER – My name is Oscar Haynes, and I look after the production and distribution of the Glaven Valley Newsletter. In my opinion, the GVN exemplifies all that is good about a local magazine. Each month, with the help of over 45 volunteers, we print, collate, staple, and deliver 1500 copies throughout the valley. Most of these are hand delivered to each door, with copies put in each of the various churches, and about 30 posted to various parts - to people who have left the location, but who still want to be kept in touch.


We have two basic principles, which I strongly believe in. First, that the GVN should be delivered to anyone who wants it, and secondly, that it should be free. From time to time there have been suggestions that there should be a charge for the magazine, and that second homes and holiday homes should not receive copies, or - at least - that they should pay for them. To keep track of those people who do or do not want to receive a copy and pay or not, would be an administrative nightmare, and I know, from personal contact and feedback that many second homers greatly appreciate the magazine and use the yellow pages to look for locally supplied services, and make financial contributions.

Regarding the question of charging, our objective is not to make money, but, rather, to provide an informative and hopefully interesting and entertaining publication for the community. Our costs do keep increasing, but as long as we can break even thanks to the generous donations from residents and Blakeney Parish Council, and the advertising revenue, then we are happy.

The other subject which sometimes comes up is "why don't we get into the 21st century and go digital - rather than this archaic paper version". During lockdown, we had no option, and we set up the GVN on line (as it still is), but - interestingly - the vast majority of people we have asked say that they value, and would much prefer a paper copy - and that is what we intend to continue with. Also, of course, not everyone has internet facilities...

Regarding the production of the GVN, for many years we have done this in a small shed in Glandford, but the collapse of the ceiling after heavy rain prompted us to look round for an alternative, and we are very grateful to the Blakeney Village Hall for making one of the changing rooms here available. Our volunteers much appreciate a warmer, drier environment, and now here we have our printer, collator, electric stapler and - perhaps - the most important item of equipment, namely this wonderful hammer! I would personally like to thank all of our wonderful volunteers. We very much appreciate the positive feedback we have for the GVN, and we hope we can continue to provide this for the whole community.

BLAKENEY **NEIGHBOURHOOD** HOUSING **SOCIETY** – (written by John Seymour; Chairman) The BNHS was formed just after the second world war and currently owns 39 houses, mainly in Blakeney, plus two in Wiveton and three in Cley. A further four cottages, owned by the Society, in Cley are subject to a long-term lease with Broadland Housing Association. Houses are let to people with a birth connection to Blakeney or one of the surrounding villages. This makes us almost unique in the country. It is something to be celebrated as without the existence of the Society many more homes would become holiday cottages or second homes. We are aware of the occasional negative comment but rightly or wrongly, we have a policy of not means testing except at the point of awarding a tenancy agreement. This is a topic which gets raised from time to time and I am pleased we have, so far, kept to one of the founding principles of the Society.

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It isn't easy. Having put Covid behind us we were then immediately faced with the energy crisis followed by high rates of inflation and soaring costs. This led us to making the difficult decision to peg rents again in 2023 for the third year running at their 2019 level. We have increased rents for 2024 but we will never recover the three years we lost in terms of revenue.

Costs for repairs and renewals have also increased significantly. Consequently, we are now having to make difficult decisions about many items which we were able to do prior to 2019 which we now can no longer afford. One very good example is with windows. Whereas we were installing new double-glazed windows whenever the opportunity arose, we are now having to resort to repairing frames and upgrading the secondary glazing. In 2023 we had a deficit of £56,000 necessitating depleting the funds in our reserves. That is not sustainable over the longer term.

The Society is responsible for such work as exterior painting, boiler servicing, chimney sweeping, smoke and heat alarm servicing. Every year we are replacing several boilers and wood burning stoves. We have looked into air source heat pumps but the conversion costs make it economically unviable for both tenant and Society.

As reported last year, Energy Performance Certification surveys have been completed. The majority of houses fell into the E grade category which is currently the lowest grade acceptable. The government had set a revised target of C grade to be achieved by 2028. In some ways we have been fortunate as the Government has backed down on its' target. Two houses we have refurbished have achieved C grade.

Electrical Certification is ongoing and is about 95% complete. This has to be redone every five years for rented properties and the cycle is already beginning to repeat itself.

In 2023 there were two tenancy changes. One of the Morston Road cottages houses was refurbished and now has a new tenant who had been on the waiting list for some time. The other was when a tenant was able to purchase a house and has

moved away from the village. In turn his house is now occupied by the former tenant and family from Little Lane.

One significant matter arose during 2023 which caused the committee a lot of soul searching. 1 Little Lane, one of the John Wallace legacy cottages, became vacant and quoted costs to refurbish it were beyond what we could realistically consider. Reluctantly we decided to sell the property which caused some unfortunate and ill-considered comment locally. John Wallace was aware this could happen and, in his Will, he specifically covered the point we must not be tied to keeping any property if it was no longer viable. 1 Little Lane is on the market and under offer again and in anticipation of selling it the Society is in the process of buying a replacement in Queens Close.

The proposed joint development between BNHS and Broadland Housing Association is moving forward at an incredibly slow and frustrating pace. Our contact within the BHA has recently advised they hope it will be ready to start building later in 2025. Time will tell. I expect it to be closer to 2026.

A great piece of news for the Society and we believe, the Community, is the very real likelihood of the War Memorial Cottage Trust being transferred to the Housing Society. Both parties are in favour of the move so it will, hopefully, go ahead without any problems. The Trust Deed which determines how the trust acts will be part of the transfer.

The Housing Society Committee works well. The Officers (Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, Housing Officer, and Rent Officer) are in regular contact between meetings dealing with day-to-day matters as they arise. We meet with the rest of the Management Committee every two months.

We do need new committee members. Several of the existing members are over 70 and it is only a matter of time before they will want to step down. If anyone would like to join us, please get in touch. The Society is too important for the Community not to have an active and vibrant committee.

**BLAKENEY PARISH COUNCIL** - Report for the past year and a glance to the year ahead by Rosemary Thew (Chairman)

This has been a very busy year for Blakeney parish council. But before coming to all that has been going on, I would like to bring you up to date with changes to your serving councillors. Last May, Edward Hackford decided to stand down as a councillor after just about 8 years. Our thanks to Edward for all he did. I am pleased to say that we had a good level of interest in filling the councillor vacancy, with the result that there was a contested election and Judy Pegden and Mike Reed were elected. The council is delighted they have joined us, both bringing a wealth of local knowledge to the table. So, thanks to them for what they are doing and grateful thanks too to our County Councillor, Michael Dalby, and our District Councillor, Victoria Holliday, who seems to have 36 hours in every day. And, of course, thanks too, to my fellow parish councillors who, in their various ways, contribute to the good of the village. So, to the work we have been doing.

**Blakeney Medical Surgery** - For nearly 3 years now, Blakeney parish council, and particularly Nigel Sutcliffe, has been fighting for the restoration of medical services to the surgery. Services were withdrawn in 2019 and the surgery has since been used mainly for prescriptions. A decision about closure needs to be taken by the Integrated Care Board who met on 13 February. They decided to defer a decision until 23 April to explore further the practice's proposed strategy for mitigation. Blakeney parish council believes the proposed mitigation to be inadequate and will be seeking improvement.

Blakeney Neighbourhood Plan - After 6 years work, involving people from the council and the wider community, the Blakeney neighbourhood plan has finally been made following a village wide referendum. This means that all planning applications have to be considered against the plan both by Blakeney parish council and by North Norfolk District Council before decisions are made. The plan seeks to set benchmarks for housing design, lighting etc. as well as protecting the very special environment in which we live.

**Housing -** As previously reported, it remains an ambition of Blakeney parish council to provide more affordable housing. As I said last year, we are in discussion with Blakeney Neighbourhood Housing Society in particular, but there are a number of legal and administrative hurdles beyond our joint control, and progress is frustratingly slow.

Maintenance Issues - We consulted last year about whether to keep street lights on. There was a mixed response, but the majority view seemed to be to have street lighting on until about midnight and then again in the morning. This view was based mainly on safety concerns and that was the decision taken by the council. Blakeney parish council is now seeking grant funding for a replacement upgrade of the street lighting stock with LED bulbs which are cheaper to run and longer lasting.

Maintenance work is being done to the village hall car park and, in conjunction with the National Trust, to the Carnser car park both of which get very heavy use. Blakeney parish council also works with Norfolk County Council about highway repairs

and, finally, work was done to Back Lane to improve inadequate yellow line painting and road patching.

A trod has now been put on Langham Road to protect pedestrians walking from the south of Kingsway to the public footpath near Scargills. 'Village Gateways' are also to be installed on roads leading in to the village in an attempt to calm speeding traffic. And the entrance to the overflow car park on Langham Road has been improved for safety reasons. All these projects are receiving financial help from Norfolk County Council.

**Plans for the Next Year -** A village wide consultation showed support for the installation of a site for pétanque/ French boules. An application is being made for grant funding, and the same for the replacement of the football goals on the village playing field, after a request from the young people of our community.

Blakeney parish council is continuing the work already underway to replace old commemorative seats and replace them with new, uniform ones; the now annual Party on the Pastures is planned for 18 August and the end of season bonfire event for 26 October; a village noticeboard is planned to show the location of key sites (shops, churches etc.) within the village.

Finally, the former Scout Hut, now known as the Parish Room, is available for hire. Please do consider it as you plan for parties or other events. In addition, you may have ideas about how the Room might be used for business purposes. Blakeney parish council would be pleased to hear from you if so.

My conclusion: there's a huge amount going on. Blakeney parish council is working hard to ensure that the village in which we live is somewhere we can be proud of. But we could not do all this without our hardworking and tireless clerk.

#### GUEST SPEAKERS – THE FUTURE OF BLAKENEY SURGERY

#### How we got here - Nigel Sutcliffe Blakeney Parish Council

I reported at last year's APM as to where we were. At that point in time, we had received formal notification from the ICB that HMP wanted to close Blakeney Surgery on the grounds 'it is no longer economically viable.' The next issue was for HMP to enter its 'Patient Consultation Phase' which commenced with the public meeting held at this Village Hall on the 1st August 2023. Those who attended that meeting would recall the huge number of people who attended including many who could not get in due to fire regulations. You will also recall the overwhelming support for both the retention of the surgery and the need for it to return to full face-to-face consultations.

At this point I should inform you that BPC did write to the ICB before the HMP consultation commenced to express their lack of confidence in HMP, effectively conducting their own review, in that they were not independent or objective enough to do it. We got no reply. It is worth noting that a sub-group to combat the proposed closure was formed comprising the chairman of BPC, our District Councillor, former G.P.'s Doctors Chapman and Archer and myself. We were active

throughout the 'Patient Consultation Phase' putting our case forward whenever we could. This activity included placing banners to stop the closure of the surgery, it included a petition with hundreds of signatures on it to stop the closure, and an information point at the 'Party on the Pastures.'

At the halfway point in this consultation BPC wrote to both HMP and copied in the ICB to point out that it had been constructed in favour of what HMP wanted - that is closure. The bulk of HMP's patients were and are unaffected by the closure of Blakeney surgery only the patients that used that facility are affected. The survey conducted by HMP contained nothing within it about the return of full medical services to Blakeney and some of their published papers indicated that whatever the ICB decision was Blakeney surgery may still have to close. Our concerns were rejected by HMP which was no surprise as it was not in their interest.

It is worth noting at this point that the Open Meeting on the 1<sup>st</sup> August is the only time that HMP engaged directly with their patients in the whole of their Patient Consultation Phase. They also did not engage with media interest in the reasons behind their decision to want to close Blakeney surgery. The final submission by BPC during this consultation phase explained the stealth nature by which services had been withdrawn from Blakeney by HMP and most importantly it explained that their patient income, surgery income and prescription income made it perfectly viable for Blakeney surgery to be kept open, with a doctor, nurse, and receptionist. The submission also identified the substantial difficulties in getting to High Kelling or Melton Constable surgeries.

I am afraid all of our work was ignored by all involved in this process and the submission by HMP to the ICB was too close Blakeney surgery. At this stage another NHS organisation the PCCG who actually makes the final decision on closure, got involved and they determined to defer that decision to the 23<sup>rd</sup> April 2024 so that the ICB could consult further on 'mitigation' issues. This relates to the collection of repeat medications it does mean, I doubt, that the decision to close will be rejected. Members of the ICB are here tonight to discuss this further so please have your say.

The problem we have is that HMP has a monopoly of franchised medical services to all within its area. In other words, if we don't like what they offer we have nowhere else to go to get medical services. It follows they are telling us what and how we will receive medical services and we, as has been proved by this exercise, have no say in it. Remember we have had two independent public surveys conducted by Healthwatch Norfolk and our MP Mr Baker which showed overwhelming support to keep Blakeney surgery open as it had been before HMP undertook their course of action to close it. You may recall last year I introduced Healthwatch as a new ally in our struggle. That did not last long since they chaired the open meeting at this Village Hall and they helped design and have validated the Patient Consultation Phase of HMP closure plan.

I will conclude by assuring you that we have done everything we can in this battle to keep Blakeney surgery open, but the problem is no one is listening to our structured and reasoned arguments. HMP have said from the start that the surgery will close and that is what is going to happen. It would be nice if those involved in this really cared about the patients who have already and will be further affected by it – thank you.

#### Concerns about the consultation & its legality – District Cllr, Victoria Holliday

I would just like to preface my statement by saying I am one of the few people in this room who actually worked as a GP at Blakeney Surgery, seeing patients who were on occasion quite ill, and that I found the set up perfectly satisfactory.

The current engagement by the Integrated Care Board and the previous consultation by Holt Medical Practice on the closure of Blakeney Surgery are wrong on many levels. There has been no public consultation on the removal of dispensing, GP, and nurse appointments from Blakeney Surgery, which despite what the Integrated Care Board and the practice are telling us, first occurred before Covid. We're told the Patient Participation Group was informed at various stages, but that is hardly a comprehensive engagement with the community.

As a result of our fight to keep Blakeney Surgery open, new policy has been brought in by the integrated Care Board which requires public consultation for changing what is offered at a branch surgery. However, the Integrated Care Board refuses to do this retrospectively for Blakeney Surgery. Obviously, a public consultation is seen as important so why aren't we being offered one? It feels as if access to healthcare for branch surgery patients has been taken away without the decision going through the proper channels.

The practice's previous consultation, and the current engagement by the Integrated Care Board, are on what options are open to patients in Blakeney and surrounding villages no longer able to collect medicines from Blakeney. Why is there no public consultation on what options are open for patients no longer able to see a GP or nurse at Blakeney? This is being swept under the carpet.

How are any of these consultations taking into account the Integrated Care Board's legal duty to improve the quality of services for patients, including improving patient experience? And their legal duty to make it possible for all patients to access the same level of healthcare, including those who live far away from the surgery, or live alone, or have no transport, or are elderly and infirm?

Just think of the demographics of Blakeney and surrounding villages; over half of the patients say they have a disability, more than 40% are over 65, almost a fifth have no transport, almost half live alone. The patients who attend Blakeney Surgery are being disproportionately harder hit by the closure simply because of where they happen to live and where they happen to be in life. And I haven't heard how these consultations are taking into account the Integrated Care Board's legal duty to work towards net zero and reduce carbon emissions. Instead, they will be increasing them by almost 19 tonnes of CO2 a year. The practice would need to offset this enormous increase by planting over 700 trees annually which will take about an acre of land each year. I don't see any plans for that.

I urge you all to write to the Integrated Care Board asking for a full and rigorous consultation on the permanent withdrawal of GP and nurse appointments, as well as medicine collection from Blakeney Surgery, which takes into account the Integrated Care Board's legal duty to look after its patients equally, and to look after the planet.

Sadie Parker – Director of Primary Care – NHS Norfolk & Waveney Integrated Care Board (ICB) & Mark Burgis – Executive Director of Patients and Communities gave a presentation with slides. (Pg. 10 and 11 are copied below.)

We want to focus on the issue of medicines collection:

- 85% of people supported collecting medicines from a different Blakeney based site **tell us more, e.g.** What will the building need to offer? Accessibility? Parking? Opening hours? What about access issues such as pavement? Location?
- Delivery was a popular suggestion and whilst the practice can deliver some prescriptions, online pharmacies were also suggested – tell us more, e.g. What support and information would people need to access online pharmacies or deliveries from high street pharmacies?
- There was very limited support (5.8%) for the vending machine idea **tell us why e.g.** Is there anything that would help or encourage people to use them?
- Comments were made that many people, especially older people were not confident with using mobile phones and the internet tell use more, e.g. Is there anything that could be done to help people learn new skills?
- Many comments raised concerns about what would happen if the prescription was wrong, or the patient had questions – tell us more, e.g. What support and information would people need to contact the pharmacy or dispensary?
- Is there anything else about medicines collection that concerns you? Are there other ideas?

Next steps; No decision has yet been made following the application to close Blakeney branch surgery. We need more information to help us complete our thinking about how the most vulnerable people might be affected and how they could be supported if the decision is taken to close. We want to hear from people in Blakeney and surrounding villages – we have asked the parish councils for help – please let us know if there are other opportunities. The final decision will be taken by the Primary Care Commissioning Committee after 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2024. Written feedback will be accepted up to Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> April. (These dates have been adapted in line with the Preelection guidance for NHS organisations Spring 2024.)

**Duncan Baker MP** – Huge thanks to everyone involved in this so far, everyone here this evening and more. What we are seeing here is wholly unacceptable to our community. We

get the feeling that the ICB are simply delaying the inevitable. The mitigation put forward is totally unacceptable, this is an area that desperately needs medical services, in an area which does not have a good enough public transport network.

**Questions/views from the public** – were listed by the ICB and they will be type out the questions and responses and send to BPC. (*They are within the pages of this edition of the GVN*)

Holt Area Caring Society (voluntary drivers) – Peta Benson – Our volunteers take people from the whole of the Holt medical practice catchment area and we have done our best over the last 45 years. We keep the cost as low as possible, at a 50p a mile charge. Blakeney to Holt is around £5 or £6. Whilst we do our best, sadly sometimes, we do have to say no, to requests.

**Duncan Baker MP** – Going forward – Many thanks to all of you for attending this evening, including the ICB. There are 42 ICBs around the country. It is worth remembering that we, the public, are their customers, and it is the taxpayers which fund the ICB. And as customers, it is clear that we are not happy with the mitigation being proposed. We wish it to be accepted that we are happy with what Holt medical practice does offer, BUT this mitigation being offered, is simply not good enough.

Analog is due to be switched off by the end of 2025 and all telephone providers will contact their customers ahead of the switchover, although we are most concerned with how vulnerable people will cope with this change. Reports from Representatives on Other Committees/Groups which have met recently;

**Blakeney Surgery** – Cllr Nigel Sutcliffe.

Since my last update the Annual Parish Meeting took place on the 7<sup>th</sup> March 2024 and was well attended by local people. At that meeting presentations were given by our Chairman, District Councillor, MP, and myself. Sadie Parker representing the ICB also gave a presentation and took questions on the proposed closure of Blakeney surgery and the issue of mitigation as outlined in the HMP submission to close the surgery. The questions raised at the meeting were insightful and searching in nature and most were taken away by the ICB to provide answers, and we have now received those and they have been placed on our website. Sadie Parker reminded everyone present that no decision had yet been made by the PCCG regarding the request from HMP to close the surgery.

A number of local representatives had also attended the Norfolk Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee (NHOSC) meeting held on the 21<sup>st</sup> March 2024 where the issue of closure and of the process of how we have got to where we are was discussed by that group who represent Norfolk County Council and can submit 'her call-in powers' to the Secretary of State. A decision regarding this was not made since the ICB reminded the NHOSC that no decision had yet been made to close the surgery. A submission is to be made to this Committee, on all of the above issues, which has been prepared by Dr Archer. In addition, a paper on governance issues has been prepared by Alexandra Hooper of Stiffkey Parish Council which will also be submitted.

At our APM in 2023 I introduced Healthwatch and their role in the process, and considered them as a new ally in our campaign to keep the surgery open. In the discussions we had with them they were supportive of our position and undertook

a public survey on our behalf which revealed some useful data not least of which was a desire by those surveyed to keep the surgery open. They then became distant from us and the next thing we knew they were advising HMP on what they needed to do to close. They provided the chair of the open meeting held on the 1st August 2023, who you will recall informed everyone present that he was a retired GP, that he understood where HMP were coming from and that their Patient Consultation Phase, of which that meeting was the start, was more comprehensive than needed to undertake. attendees at that meeting felt the chairmanship was less than impartial.

Healthwatch also staffed drop-in centres during the consultation phase and more importantly they have validated the data gathered by HMP, a fact which had been used by the ICB in their presentations to the PCCG. I feel the lack of impartiality and objectivity by Healthwatch, Norfolk is of concern.

Healthwatch, Norfolk is funded by Norfolk County Council and their role, '.is to hold the health and social care system to account on behalf of all...' Their objectives include: -

- 1. Providing information and advice to the general public about local health and social care services.
- 2. Making the views and experiences of members of the general public known to health and social care providers.
- 3. Enabling local people to have a voice in the development, delivery, and equality of access to local health and social care facilities.
- 4. The promotion of high standards by health and social care providers.
- 5. Providing training and the developments of skills for volunteers and the wider community scrutinizing, reviewing, understanding, monitoring local health and social care services and facilities.

Have Healthwatch have stepped out of their remit with regards to HMP. Who initiated their change in actions was it HMP, the ICB or whoever?

BPC will raise the lack of independent objectivity by Healthwatch, Norfolk as a formal complaint with Norfolk County Council.

#### CORRESPONDENCE -

Village/Business Signage Board – It has been confirmed that solid colours are to be used (as opposed to pastel, noted previously).

We will draw up a draft consultation document along with a list of proposed consultees, based on the recommendations from the Traffic Matters Working Group regarding the future operation of the village hall car park.

We shall proceed to explore and obtain more detail on possible installation of CCTV on the quay to cover the Carnser & dinghy park area, following the theft of a number of kayaks in 2023. Blakeney Harbour Association to be approached and asked if they would take the lead on this and its funding.

#### **Cley Parish Council's Report**

The Integrated Care Board is meeting to decide on the closure of Blakeney Surgery on May 7<sup>th</sup>. It's a virtual meeting by Teams so any of you can join and ask a question (to obtain a link email nwicb.contactus@nhs.net). We have referred the closure to the Secretary of State as we feel due process has not been followed.

We are hoping to refresh our parish community support fund with grant funding ready for next winter. In the meantime, there are other places to go for help such as the Blakeney Food Bank - check out the 'hardship' page on our website, cleypc.info.

Our intrepid Toad watch team saved over 1000 toads this season which is absolutely brilliant.

There have been reports of suspicious behaviour in the beach car park at dusk. Our beat policeman would be very grateful of any details of cars involved, such as registration numbers or even make.

We've had a meeting with Highways to discuss the safety issues with the steps coming down from the bank into Coast Road at Artemis and we may actually be making progress. The Trails team (who manage the Coastal Path) admit that handrails would be helpful and the steps may need realigning, ideally to access the pavement not the road.

There continue to be complaints regarding the sewage works, both in terms of trucking activity and the odour. Please contact the Clerk if you have any concerns or report directly to Anglian Water on 03457145145.

We are looking for projects for which we can apply to get grant funding from the Hornsea Three Wind Farm community fund. These need to be community based, environmental or sports/recreational. Grants of up to £5000 do not require match funding, which is always a help. A water harvester for the allotments has been suggested but any ideas gratefully received.



#### **District Coucillors Report**

#### From NNDC

#### 'Planning

The current phase of the new Local Plan examination is complete. There may be modifications to the plan coming out of these hearings which will go out to public consultation and possibly another round of Hearings. The new Local Plan hopefully will be finalised by the autumn.

#### **Benefits**

The Household Support Fund has been extended to September 2024. This helps the most vulnerable households with the cost of essentials. NNDC operates an emergency support fund for help with grocery costs. From 6th April it will be easier to obtain a Debt Relief Order which means more residents can access debt relief. There will be 53 Mondays in the financial year 24/25 which means those on Universal Credit miss out on a week's Housing Costs. Almost £100k has been allocated in Discretionary Housing Payments to support tenancy issues, homelessness prevention and to support people to stay within the community.

#### **Housing**

NNDC Cabinet has just approved a new Housing Strategy to provide a framework for the delivery of housing to meet the district's need. A new Housing Allocations Policy will be going out for consultation shortly. This will make the allocation of social housing fairer and hopefully simpler, but you will be able to give us your views. The Task and Finish Group on finding solutions to reduce homelessness in North Norfolk will be reporting its findings May/June. We've had stimulating discussions with various organisations from the Eastern Landlords Association to Emmaus. Eligibility criteria for warm homes grants have been simplified. These are for homes with energy ratings of D-G. This is well worth applying for: get in touch with me if you're interested.

#### **Finance**

A new Economic Growth Strategy has been adopted.

#### **Environmental Services**

#### Other news

#### **Blakeney Surgery**

The decision whether or not to close Blakeney Surgery will be made on May 7th at a virtual meeting of the Integrated Care Board's Primary Care Commissioning Committee. We have written to the Secretary of State for Health to ask for her intervention against the proposed closure.

#### **Digital switchover**

This is an industry led switch to digital landlines with the old analogue lines switched off by the end of 2025. To be sure, vulnerable customers, i.e. those who are dependent on landlines, need to contact their provider about they

should be preparing for this change. I would encourage you to reach out to those who you think are in this category. I am arranging a meeting with BT to talk about mobile coverage in hard-to-get villages.

#### **Broadband connectivity**

I have been in touch with Openreach to ascertain what their plans are for full fibre roll out to the villages which are not connected. It's very difficult to actually get hold of the build teams in the local area so I'm having to work through the Executive Complaints and Escalations Team!




#### For a Five-Year-Old

#### Letter's & Articles

#### HEINKEL 111 CRASH LANDS IN THE GLAVEN VALLEY

My father George Chapman who I am named after, was the Police Sergeant in Blakeney during World War II. A story that I heard him tell many times when I was growing up involved the crash of a German Heinkel III at Sharrington, a fifteen-minute drive inland from Blakeney. On May 4th 1941, the plane with its four-man crew was returning from the May blitz on Liverpool and was intercepted by RAF fighters over an area known as "The Wash" as they were about to cross the North Sea. The attacking aircraft was either a Boulton Paul Defiant or a Blenheim (both aircraft claimed the attack). The pilot, Alfred V Bachselten, dove the Heinkel through 10,000 feet to evade his attackers, leveled out over the North Norfolk coastline. He then took the aircraft through a right-hand turn and crossed the coastline in the vicinity of Cley. With landing and navigational lights switched on, he committed the stricken plane to a field to the north of the village of Sharrington, near Holt.

When the plane with the call letters "A1+LK" finally came to rest at 01.04 hours in the North Norfolk countryside, three of the crew clambered out and prepared to destroy their aircraft. The Heinkel had survived the crash mostly intact other than the propeller blades which were bent around the engine nacelles and the long glass nose was damaged when the aircraft slid through the twin hedgerows each side of the farm service lane.

After the crew had removed their dead 20-year-old crew member Bruno Kauhardt, who was killed in the fighter attack, they attempted to destroy the Heinkel by a self-destruct device which failed to ignite; they then pumped aviation fuel from their main tank and ignited the aircraft by soaking their flight maps in fuel.

All that would remain of the aircraft was the burnt-out black shell with the vertical tail which still carried the Luftwaffe swastika insignia and a yellow "L" on the upper wing tip. The Heinkel had previously been painted matt black which was normal practice for night bombers. Shortly after the crash, a local member of the Home Guard, having heard the noise of the approaching aircraft, journeyed up the farm lane on his small motorcycle to investigate. By the time he arrived, the aircraft was on fire with the crew standing beside it. He quickly withdrew from the scene to get assistance, although others speak less charitably of his action. Having had no contact with local inhabitants, the crew decided to walk in the direction of Holt and passed through the village of Letheringset, arriving in Holt in the early hours of Sunday morning where the streets were devoid of people. Having failed to find any police officers to whom they could give themselves up, they decided to head off down the Kelling road towards the coast.

In the meantime, my father was now aware that the crew from this crash had disappeared without trace. He found this rather unusual as German pilots had previously made very little attempt to evade capture after being shot down over Britain. Deciding to expand the search, my father was in the process of rounding up help when he called on Police Constable Barnard who lived in Kelling, only to find him at home with the German crew.

Apparently, PC Barnard was cycling home from his appointed night duties when he came across the surviving crew members at about 6:00 am and took them home, where his wife made them breakfast. They were all enjoying a cup of tea when my father arrived to spoil the party. In other than war time, PC Barnard might well have been publicly commended for his bravery and humane action.

The captured crew were then taken to the main police station in Holt. There the senior officer on duty, no doubt in response to the apparent casual "surrender" was heard to say, "I suppose you Germans think you are going to win this bloody war." Admirable patriotism at this stage of the war, but not the normal courteous expression by the officers of the Norfolk Constabulary that one would expect.

Later that day, the crew was handed over to the military authorities at The Gresham School Hall which had been taken over by the army. The crew was subsequently taken under armed guard by rail to Liverpool Street Station in London on route to a POW camp.

Still with thoughts towards an escape route, Alfred Bachselten sought a corner seat, only to find that on the journey to London all the stations were called "BOVRIL." "We were already there," he said.

As a foot note to this story.

The information in this article was compiled by Russel Reeve who was a member of the United States Eighth Air Force Historical Society, who had been approached by the German Luftwaffe Association for information regarding this crash.

Russell contacted me in December of 1990 to see if I had any materials in my possession belonging to my father that could shed light on this crash. I was able to provide them with the information regarding the crew's capture and crash site; others including the pilot at the reunion were able to provide information on the crash itself.

On the 50th anniversary of the crash, the three German survivors, all in their seventies, visited the farm where they crashed. They met the lady, still living in the same house, who had observed them from her bedroom window when they set fire to the plane. They also visited the grave of Bruno Kauhardt buried at West Raynham, then traced their journey to where they were captured, and finally to Kelling where they visited PC Barnard's wife, who had fed them breakfast and was still living in the same house.

Both PC Barnard and my father had passed away shortly before the request for information was received. My youngest sister Pat was invited to meet the crew; the pilot, Alfred Bachselten, had good memory of my father.

For the crew survivors, the events of May 4<sup>th</sup> 1941 may well have saved their lives as the Luftwaffe rates of attrition were to be high in the forthcoming Battle of Britain and also in the events leading to the conclusion of the war.

## **Evil. Under The Sun or in the Ice and Snow**

As we progress ever further up the path of enlightenment\* the view widens, although perhaps not our ability to understand more of what we see. The utter barbarity of the slave trade and the atrocities inflicted throughout the British and other European Empires are not just unconscionable and unforgivable, but difficult to understand outside their context. Young people learning about them today are understandably appalled and angered by what they are taught, and by being made to feel guilty about the colour of their skin. Feeling bound to respond somehow, they need to apportion blame, even to punish someone. I'm sure many of us feel the same, although self-flagellation is hardly going to do it. So, who do we blame?

Unfortunately, the culprits are long dead, so disfiguring their effigies has to suffice. But what if Edward Colston and the other slave traders could be brought back from the dead and stood in line in the street? What would happen to them? I hope just tomatoes. But the current level of anger makes me wonder. The moral consensus today (at least in the West) is that the world has become more humane, but - as the deaths of so many children in Gaza graphically testify - human nature doesn't change. Revenge doesn't lose its sweetness.

I believe two mistakes are being made. One is judging past centuries against the morality of today. The other is deciding who was guilty. The modern world no longer blames the German people for the Holocaust. The current generation bears no guilt. It's in the past and was perpetrated by an evil regime which, like slave trading, no longer exists\*. To insist

that people should take responsibility and be made to apologise because of the colour of their skin is simplistic, but that of course is the least of it, it is difficult not to see racism lurking in the background. Surely, we can narrow it down a bit more than that? At some point in its history, every country in the world had slaves, and it wasn't just European countries that were involved in the Africa / New World slave trade. But what did 18th-century English peasants, coal miners and mill workers know about it? How were they implicated? Mostly they couldn't read or write, and few would have known where Africa or India were, let alone what was happening there. They were slaves themselves. I interviewed a man born at the end of the nineteenth century who witnessed the last of it. He rushed to join WW1 just to get a coat to wear. He'd had to work in the mud in all weathers with a meal sack to cover him from the rain and the ice and snow\*. Men would steal turnips at night because they were always hungry. One of the gentry he worked for when he was just a boy wanted to take a whip to him because he didn't wash a pony correctly. That was prevented by the intervention of a local man who said. 'You take a whip to that boy and I'll take a whip to you. You're not in India now!' It was a ruling elite that committed the atrocities, and they just happened to be mostly white.

There were two populations in 18th-century England: the rich and powerful and the poor and powerless. If you didn't have a job there was no safety net, and most had trouble finding their next meal or a place to sleep. For every 1000 children born in early-18th-century London, almost 500 died before they were two, generally due to malnutrition, bad water, dirty food, or poor hygiene. Orphans roamed the streets. They didn't attend school and had no chance of improving their lives. Set against 140 deaths in every 1000 on slave ships, it's clear that the lives of the poor in England were no better than those of slaves. If you worked on the land, you were paid so little that unless you kept a pig and could grow your own food you starved, and if you forgot to doff your hat to the landowner's wife you could be thrown out of your house, or worse. The cotton that was picked by slaves in the US came to British cotton mills. Much of the labour there was provided by women and 'pauper apprentices', who were often children below the age of ten. Many of them were orphans sent into factories by the Poor Law authorities, often far from their homes. In 1800 some 20,000 of these children were working in the mills. So, there was slavery at both ends of the cotton thread.

If you worked in a mine or a mill you were given tokens to give back to the mine owner for food and clothing. How is that not slavery by sleight of hand? Little boys as young as ten working below ground squirming into spaces too small for a man to get into. Women and girls worked long hours in the cotton mills under terrible conditions. If you were a slave in Virginia, you could be beaten if you didn't work hard enough. If you were a press-ganged sailor in the British Navy, you could have the skin taken off your back with the lash, or be tied to a rope and dragged under the keel of the ship for little more. To settle even the slightest differences over ideology or lines on a map, European nations sent their best and bravest to be slaughtered in their thousands and eventually millions, their bodies piled into heaps then covered in earth to be later disinterred so their bones could be ground up and spread as fertiliser over the same fields in which they had once toiled.

Brutality was everywhere. It seems we are becoming very particular about those we choose to persecute, and blaming all white people for the sins of a few is unkind and unjust, particularly as their ancestors suffered as much, if not more, under the heels of that elite. So, can we narrow the blame down a bit further? All over the country, there are stately homes and large country mansions, some of which are still occupied by direct descendants of slaves, or mill- and mineowners. What should they do? Well, as their grand roofs and monetary legacy come from the subjugation/persecution of others, perhaps they should respond in some way. But how?

To apologise for the actions of another person is meaningless without their consent, so should they make some sort of reparation? Well, yes, perhaps they should, but who to and how much? I suspect that no amount would be enough, and the moment they accepted any inherited responsibility the books would not be squared until they were penniless. Each person who could identify as the direct dependent of a slave would get their share, which I guess would be about £1.50. That of course doesn't mean that something couldn't be done to balance this unequal equation - perhaps anonymous gifts to organisations that support those affected by racial/social inequalities or others disenfranchised because of their origins? Nothing should be insoluble if you have a conscience, but looking to blame anyone for those terrible things seems pointless unless we can first understand all of it and use that knowledge to ensure that it doesn't happen again. Sadly, though, it seems impossible to alter what we are. The human capacity for cruelty and barbarism remains.

\*Assuming that we are.

\*Well not where we can see it.

As a boy aged nine, I worked picking mussels by hand, (bare hands) the threads that held them together were tough and the mussels were a mix of barnacles and broken shells and often covered in a slush of frozen seawater. I got reprimanded at school for biting my nails. I never did, sharp shells and ice bit them for me.

Addendum: Writing these contributions (which began back in the days of Peter Miller), it often feels like walking a tightrope. My only intention is to try to make this magazine a little more interesting and offer something to amuse or to think about. That of course brings with it the risk of being seen as being opinionated. I do hope this isn't the case as it certainly isn't my intention, as quite often I don't hold an opinion either way. Other than to focus a light and be able to speak freely.
