





News from Blakeney Church of England Primary School

I love November in Blakeney! It is easy to forget all about Summer as the weather gets colder but the annual fireworks event is a reminder that the community is still working hard.

All the children in the school recently completed a piece of art work to compete for the honour of lighting the bonfire and pushing the button on the fireworks. The email from the Parish Council office inviting the children to enter was timely as I had already been bombarded with "When do we do our firework pictures?" questions. Thank you, Blakeney Parish Council, for including the children-it is one of the highlights of their year. Our specialist music teacher judged the entries and was very impressed.

The children are all rested after half term and are beginning to move into Christmas mode. The nativity play practice has begun and this year we have the added bonus of the Nursery children, who are going to add to the number of animals around the manger! The weather is still holding (as this is written) so that the children can still cycle to school. We have also had some more new pupils arrive and settle in quickly. November is going swimmingly!

The Hedgehogs and Hoglets class have been celebrating the season by Pumpkin picking. They had a wonderful trip and were very proud of their pumpkins. They are currently planning a trip to the sea life centre in between adding increasingly large numbers and exploring making ice!

Samphire Class have been focussed on their topic of Healthy Body, Healthy mind by going on a Mindfulness walk to the Marshes and trying new and varied fruit and vegetables. We had some very reticent children when it came to trying beetroot and butternut squash but the rule of "just a tiny nibble" seemed to work-sort of! In English, Year 5 and 6 have been reading Pig Heart Boy and have produced some amazing newspaper articles and stories. Years 3 and 4 are currently engrossed in Leon and the Lost World and are busy learning how and when to use speech marks.

We held parent consultations recently and it struck Miss Collison and I that for many of the parents, nothing that we told them came as a surprise (thankfully!). Their very welcome presence in the school on a daily basis, and for special events, means that communication between home and school is a real strength in the school. In just the last month we have held an Open Day, A French café, 4 celebration worships, 3 PTFA meetings and a Harvest festival. Parent volunteers run the weekly playgroup and our PTFA are always organising curriculum enhancement opportunities.

We hope that parents feel welcome and a very much needed part of their children's school. The PTFA are organising a community Bingo event at the village Hall on Friday 1st

December. Please come along if you can, you will be helping to support the work we all do for the children. It is a great night out too!

BLAKENEY VILLAGE HALL The Way Forward

The Village Hall is now more than 40 years old and following the AGM at 5.00pm on Wednesday 15th November there will be an informal meeting for residents to put forward suggestions regarding the way forward for the next 40. The bar will be open and all ideas are welcome.

The Hall dates back to 1981 and was in part built as a sports hall with changing rooms to facilitate football and other sports. However, the changing Blakeney demographic means that sports usage has declined dramatically and only carpet bowls and badminton remain active.

The Hall is also showing its age and considerable work is needed to bring it up date. More recently, of course, the dramatic hike in energy costs has meant that it has been extremely difficult to heat the Hall.

It is not all doom and gloom however. The Players still put on two shows each year, the monthly film nights continue to be popular and Tai Chi continues to prosper as do Badminton and Carpet Bowls. The U3A meet at the Hall on a regular basis and the regular Craft and Antique Fairs continue to draw crowds. The Hall is also hired for many one-off events. There are, however, many times during the week when the Hall is not in use and ideas are needed as to how it could be more fully utilised. Maybe sports more suitable to the Blakeney demographic could be developed such as walking football or rugby or indoor or outdoor pickleball. Perhaps exercise classes more suited to the elderly [like me] among us could be set up. In addition, there may be other local groups that could be encouraged to meet and use the space and ways that the stage could be more fully utilised.

If you have ideas and, even better, the energy to develop them do come along. Changes are already being made to upgrade the heating system but we would welcome further input. Ideas are also needed for how the Hall might be brought up to date, and how the money for these very necessary improvements can be raised.

NO OVERNIGHT PARKING ON THE CARNSER CAR

PARK – It has been brought to our attention that several people staying in holiday cottages in Blakeney, are told by the owners of the cottages that they can park overnight on the Carnser Car Park on Blakeney Quay. This is not true, the signs advise that **no overnight parking** is permitted on The Carnser, and this is due to the fact that the Carnser Car Park is liable to unpredictable tidal flooding. Many of the vehicles that are caught out and flooded have been parked overnight on the Car Park when they should not have been. There are alternative car parks for overnight car parking, including Coronation Car Park and Blakeney Village Hall Car Park.

EXTRACTS FROM THE OCTOBER FULL COUNCIL MEETING...

Chairman's Announcements -

- Welcomed Claire Chapman, Community Connector NNDC, who in turn updated the meeting on her role.
- Attended the hearing at NNDC regarding the planning application appeal, in respect of the *Storage Barn, Morston Road'* and we await the outcome.

Planning Items – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building & Appeals.

PF/23/1910 – Proposal; Demolition of North Down House and the construction of a replacement dwelling alongside soft and hard landscaping, at; North Down, Blakeney Road, Morston. *Resolved* – *No objection* subject to the following condition; non-reflective glass to be used on the north elevation on the gable.

PF/23/1917 – Proposal; Construction of studio following demolition of existing studio (amendment to previous application *PF/21/1425*) at, **Southdown, The Downs, Blakeney.** *Resolved* – *No objection;* subject to the following condition; So long as the colour used is neutral.

PF/23/1952 – Proposal; Two storey front extension replacing existing porch and bay window; detached garage; external alterations including new external finishes and alterations to some window openings; installation of air source heat pump at, Doelen House, Back Lane, Blakeney. *Resolved – No objection.*

FINANCE - Accounts totalling £16,203.83 were paid.

Clerk/RFO Update -

- Blakeney Neighbourhood Plan (BNP) the result of the referendum held on 14th September 2023, was 90% in favour of those that voted, to adopt the Plan. Subject to endorsement, NNDC expect to issue the required statutory Decision Notice the w/c 6th November 2023. During this interim stage the BNP should now be given significant weight in decision making.
- The Blakeney Harbour Room has been successfully nominated and therefore listed as an Asset of Community Value.

We will be replacing the **Play area Signboard** as soon as possible on the playing field, as the original is no longer fit for purpose.

ReportsfromRepresentativesonOtherCommittees/Groupswhich have met recently;

Blakeney Surgery – *Cllr Rosemary Thew* gave an update in the absence of Cllr Sutcliffe.

- A 14-page letter was sent to the ICB on 26th September by BPC with regard the proposed closure of Blakeney Surgery by Holt Medical Practice. We received a reply on 28th September advising that in accordance with the NHSE Policy Guidance Manual and the stages set out in their associated advice note, that they have not yet received a final application with supporting documentation from Holt Medical Practice. This is expected towards the end of the year, if HMP choose to proceed, and therefore the members of the Primary Care Commissioning Committee, will not be considering this matter further until any such application is received and listed on their agenda.
- A petition which had over 1,500 signatures was delivered to HMP and the ICB last week.
- With the agreement of BPC, a letter of complaint will now be sent to Jon Punt, at the ICB.


NEW DEFIBRILATOR AT THE BLAKENEY HOTEL – The Blakeney Hotel have asked if I can share the news, that they have installed a defibrillator on their premises. It is located in the main reception area. There is no code to access it, but there is a code on the door, so if someone needs it, then they would need to go to the main reception and ring the bell. The reception team will then allow access to the room. (This is great news, and is in addition to the one located outside of the Parish Office on Langham Road, and the one by the ladies toilet block on The Quay)

BLAKENEY DINGHY PARK – Sadly, sometime over the weekend of $6^{th} - 8^{th}$ October, a number of items were stolen from the dinghy park, mostly kayaks, but a boat and trailer also. The dinghy park management committee undertook a routine site check on the morning of the 9th Oct, and found that things were not as they should be. All those on our dinghy park register were contacted and made aware. We believe that around 18 or so kayaks have unfortunately been stolen, despite, chains, and locks. Anyone who has yet to report the theft of an item, must do so by calling the Police on 101; if you need to check your tag registration number with the Parish Clerk, then please do so. Many kayaks have a serial number on them, which may help the Police in any potential recovery. Crime numbers will be allocated to individual owners via the Police.





Dear Friends,

With reasonable confidence, I can tell you that St Mary's Church Wiveton will be open again by the start of November!

My confidence is slightly qualified because we have already had predicted finishing dates for the work on the roof that have been pushed back (from the end of July onwards)! But as at the time of writing this in mid-October, things are looking hopeful. It will have been six months since the work began, so it has been a slightly frustrating time, but we are all looking forward with great excitement to having Wiveton Church up and running again. It was over 4 years ago that the beam fell from the chancel roof, so it has been a long haul. And we were very grateful that it happened during the night, and no one was injured (just the altar!) Some of you will remember that we had temporary repairs made to allow us to resume services and activities there, until we had raised the necessary funds to embark on the full restoration.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have been involved in making this work happen. Special thanks go to our Wiveton churchwardens Stephen and Charles, who have been at the helm of everything. But many others have also played a crucial role, particularly with fundraising. The Friends of Wiveton have been marvellously creative and hard-working, as ever, led by Anthea, and there has been important support from the PCC and the small group involved with the Heritage Lottery Fund bid, and so on. Many people have been extremely generous in terms of finance and time, and it has been a great team effort. Thanks to everyone for making it happen.

And so, we look forward to the usual service pattern being restored: early Communion on the first Sunday of the month; Meditation Service on the second; Evensong on the third; Family Service on the fourth; as well as the weekly Contemplative Service on Tuesdays (NB: start time probably to be changed from 5.45 to 6.00 - do check!).

This month there will also be an extra service (along with other churches in the benefice) on 12th November, Remembrance Sunday, at 10.45. Please see the full schedule below for all the services on that day and for the rest of the month.

A new noticeboard has been installed, the fencing around the rear of the Hall and the play area has been renewed, gutters cleared, a leak in the Club Room roof identified and repaired, the drains outside the clubroom toilets jet washed, and all general maintenance carried out. Inside, five old radiators have been replaced, the new ones being fitted with thermostatic valves so they can provide background heat when and if required, thus saving energy. These are just some of the visible results, but I think that all the behind the scenes work that keep the hall's business running smoothly also deserve to be mentioned here. A big thank you to everyone involved.

Financially the hall is in good shape. Income from hall hiring is well up, and car park donations are providing a welcome boost. However, due to this year's high level of investment and repair costs we ended the financial year with a - planned - deficit.

The overall picture is positive: the VH is a thriving community centre and offers excellent facilities for a great variety of organisations and private users. Under the auspices of the PC the club room was used to provide a 'warm space' for residents through last winter, and as Wednesday's Community Café is still open one day a week.

Cley Parish Council's Chairman's Report

Thank you all very much indeed for your support to save Blakeney Surgery. The petition had over 1,500 signatures, I understand about 500 practice surveys have been completed and so many of you have written into the practice and the Integrated Care Board that there is no doubt as to your views. In addition, NNDC passed a unanimous motion asking the ICB to keep health services local to Blakeney. If the practice still plans to go forward with their request to close the surgery despite our opposition, the decision will be made by the ICB in January or February next year in public. Our beat policeman, Graham Gower-Smith, reported there have been agricultural thefts local to Cley, so please keep an eye out for any unusual and suspicious activity.

We did not receive the necessary information on the proposal for electric car charging in the village to hold a village referendum to find out what you think, so we've deferred our decision until we do.

We have approved the design for the Newgate Green improvement works. Gemma will be posting this on the website.

Many thanks to all who have signed up to another season of toad patrolling. We have new signs we will put up at the time of the migration.

We are going to ask Highways to again review the speed limit on Old Womans' Lane, as that is a continual cause of concern, especially as we now have school children walking to the school bus at the intersection on the Coast Road.

Following last month's flood on the River Glaven at Letheringsett, I would encourage you to sign up for river flood alerts if you live in a house which might be affected by river flooding. The best way is to call 03459881188 or 08459881198.

The draft Glaven Valley Conservation Area Appraisal is out for reconsultation, closing October 27th. We are happy that it is now proposed to retain the saltmarshes north of Cley and Blakeney and all the villages within the GVCA, including Sharrington. The boundary has been extended to include north of Baconsthorpe, and Selbrigg Pond. We will request that Cley Village Hall car park is put back in.

We are awaiting a planning application for the Barn on Cookes marsh, to request permission for the render which has been applied. The land will returned to its original levels with consideration of any new habitats which have developed over the last few months.

We have decided to continue the Community Café through the winter but not to add in another day – we wouldn't be able to staff it. Do get in touch if you would be interested in joining our helpers for the Wednesday Cafe.

Huge thanks to all those who joined in our litter pick. We collected a satisfying number of bags. As before, there were lots of alcohol bottles and cans which we have mentioned to the local beat policeman.

We've started our loke working parties. Do come along. We'll post-dates on Spam and FB.

We have been trying to get Highways out to cut roadside hedges with varied success, but we will continue. Still to do are Glandford Road outside the houses and Old Woman's Lane near Holt Road.

We are buying electric throws from our Community Support Grant and giving them out via the Community Café. If there are none left by the time you read this, we can get some more. Let us know. Tesco vouchers sufficient for a home delivery







The Ralph Greenaway Trust

Wiveton has its own charity, The Ralph Greenaway Trust, which dates back to 1558. It is now governed by a Charity Commission scheme under which trustees can provide relief to residents "who are in conditions of need, hardship and distress". In recent years the charity has also made winter fuel and educational grants.

The trustees need a new clerk to continue the work of the Trust following the resignation after many years' service of our present clerk. The trustees usually meet twice a year, the new clerk would arrange meetings, and would need to be familiar with Word and Excel and will be dealing with the charity's finances. There is an honorarium of £100.

PROPOSAL FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A Pétanque (French Boules) GROUND ON BLAKENEY PLAYING FIELD.

The French game of Pétanque can be enjoyed by people of all ages, young and Old(er) and by both players and spectators; it is fun, sociable, and has very few rules for beginners to get to know, as many people have found out on holidays in almost any village in France.

It can be played between two people, or in two teams of up to three in each team. I can even be played between groups of uneven numbers. Adults play with special metal balls; children can play with plastic ones.

The construction of the 'terrain' is very simple and requires hardly any maintenance. Essentially it is constructed on a flat (or flattened) piece of ground, the turf and some sub-soil removed to a depth of perhaps 15cm, a good layer of hardcore is laid to ensure good drainage, the top layer can best be described as very find 'gritty sand', again to assist drainage. The whole thing should be recessed a few inches below the surrounding turf. Add a few simple benches for the enjoyment of spectators and those waiting their turn to play, bring your boules and of you go, hours of fun for all.

A sign could be printed and permanently mounted to explain the basic rule. This way the terrain would be available to everyone of all ages, young and old, with or without previous playing experience, and at any time in daylight hours.

Feel you are too old to bend down and pick up your 'boules'? No problem, the 'seniors' in France have a magnet on a retractable cord to save bending!

As with tennis equipment, players generally speaking, supply their own set of three metal boules and a small jack (or 'cochonette'), which are available from sports shops at about £30 (Decathlon) for set sets of three (marked differently), enough for two people to play.

So, is this something that would appeal to you, if BPC were to obtain the funding and install this, would you be likely to use it?

Save Blakeney Surgery campaign

Thank you all for your support with the Save Blakeney Surgery campaign. We have had a great response. We had almost 1500 signatures on our petition, about 500 practice surveys have been submitted and many of you have written to the practice and the integrated Care Board with your views.

NNDC passed a motion on 29th September:

- 1. The council recognises the critical importance of Blakeney Surgery to the community
- 2. The council calls on the NWICB to provide local and equitable health care for those living in Blakeney and surrounding villages.

Holt Medical Practice are now collating all the feedback from the consultation and, despite the overwhelming objections, if they still ask to close Blakeney Surgery, the Integrated Care Board will make the decision in January/February next year. At least they have agreed to have this discussion in public.

River flooding

There was a flood warning for the River Glaven last month. As far as we know the only property flooded in our area was Letheringsett Mill. There was a huge amount of water downstream but it was buffered by the water meadows, and the Environment Agency raised the Glaven outfall sluice to its winter level. I would encourage you to sign up for the River Glaven (or Stiffkey) flood alerts if you are in a vulnerable location on www.gov.uk/Environment-Agency or call 03459881188 or 08459881198. It is easier to call!

Storm outflows at Holt create potential sewage spills into the Glaven. Anglian Water say 'we do have a storm overflow at Holt which may have operated (last month) to discharge storm water, but that would have been normal'. I am waiting to hear if there was a sewage leak. I was shocked to find out the Holt Sewage Treatment Works discharged storm overflows 6 times in 2022. I am in discussions with the River Glaven Conservation Group as to how much harm this does to our beautiful chalk river.


Speeding

I attended a meeting on speeding held by Duncan Baker. There are far more deaths from road traffic accidents in Norfolk than from other crimes. The Chief Constable is putting more resources into rural speeding and I have asked if these could be made available to our area. There are now automatic speed watch cameras with number plate recognition that other counties have linked into the police. I am trying to get more details from the Chief Constable as this seems a good idea.

The Great Flood By George Chapman

Reading the story of "The Great Flood of 1953" by Sarah Woodhouse in The Gun September 2023 issue, brought back memories of that event. My father George Chapman, whom I am named after was the policeman in Blakeney at the time, and we lived in the police house at #8 Langham Road which also served as a police station.

It happened that on that Saturday night my parents decided to travel to Holt to watch a movie, the one and only time I have ever known them to do that. In addition, my youngest sister Pat was performing in "Ali Baba and The Forty Thieves" at the local legion hall. Pat, as I remember, was one of the thieves. It was a night that I will never forget as I was alone at home doing my homework when the storm broke. I found myself at the age of 14 manning the village police station which was also our home. I also had to fetch my sister Pat and get her home. On the way home we went down to the bottom of Blakeney High Street where the corner street light was still working and watched the huge waves breaking as if it were the open sea.

My parents did not get home until the early hours of the following morning due to fallen trees blocking the roads. I had not realized the full effect of the disaster until daybreak when I took a stroll along Blakeney Quay to observe the damage. Debris was everywhere with badly battered boats of all sizes which had broken from their moorage and were littering the roadway. One of the larger boats the "Mary," a former life boat, ended up stranded in a farmer's field near Cley church, some 2 miles from where it had been moored. If it was not for the US Army and all their heavy equipment the boat could never have been salvaged.

My father received a call early Sunday morning saying that an elderly woman, Mrs. Dix, was unaccounted for. She lived at the bottom of Wiveton Hill in a house that was badly flooded. My father had Ted Eales trailer a small boat over from Morston which we launched near her house. Ted rowed over, looked in the bedroom window and determined that her bed had not been slept in. Later that day when the water level had subsided, she was found in the living room where she had drowned. She was the only local person to die during the storm.

There was another loss of life later, in the neighbouring village of Cley when the shingle bank sea defences were being repaired; a bulldozer operator was killed when his machine hit a Land Mine that had been left over from the Second World War.

By then Cley, Blakeney, Kings Lynn, Happisburgh, Great Yarmouth...will be under the sea and mostly uninhabitable if society doesn't change. Miles of coastal farmland will be covered by the sea and unable to produce enough food for us all...but global heating could still be limited if we all take the following simple actions. <u>https://walkinginwater.com/what-you-can-do</u>



A Visit to Old Blakeney - Day one

It is a bright summer morning towards the end of the nineteenth century. We alight at Holt railway station amidst clouds of smoke and steam from a brand-new train onto the platform of a brand-new station, a modern intrusion into an old world, outside are carts and wagons waiting to take passengers to their various destinations. The one that has come for us has emptied its sacks of corn and is waiting to take us to Blakeney where we are to spend a few days and hopefully learn why we think it is so special today. A journey by cart without suspension over rutted gravel roads will be neither quick nor comfortable, we'll get there in about an hour and a half. Life moves at a different pace here, before the railway arrived the journey from Blakeney to Norwich would have taken all day, in winter longer; at times during the worst of the weather, the cart track into Norwich could be anything up to a mile wide, a muddy world. But we are heading north out of Holt on a smaller dusty road that we can see winding ahead beyond the wagoner's broad swaying back. Other wagons occasionally come towards us making their way into Holt, a visible demonstration of a changing demographic. For centuries Blakeney has been the terminus, the stepping-off place to a wider world; people and goods coming and going; that world is dying now but it won't expire just yet, its final demise is still about 30 years away when a millennium's rhythm of ships on the tide will cease; But they'll be still there today.

Despite the swaying and bumping this journey becomes wonderful as we move into the countryside, with fewer smaller trees and softly undulating hills folding down on our left to the Glaven Valley, giving a more open view. A mile or so on we descend into a dip to a ford with a tributary of the Glaven running through it, and the reason this is called 'The Watering Way'. Apart from the breath of the horses and the creak of the wagon; all is still, this world has a silence we don't know*. We slow a little as we climb up the slight incline towards the small farming settlement of Bayfield Brecks, on our right a field of waist-high corn, a line of men attack a waving cliff of stalks, one behind the other their scythes swinging in unison, as we get closer, we can hear their gentle swish, a human cutting machine. Across the field, others are tying the corn into bundles and stacking them into tee pees to dry, 'Stooks'. The view that widens as we come to the rim of the valley is spectacular, the distant blue ribbon of the sea and all the churches of the Haven can be seen, Blakeney's is particularly striking as the trees that obscure it from the south today are saplings. The wagoner is reigning back the horses as we begin our descent down the steep hill leading us to the bottom of the valley and Glandford Ford, this hill is, of course, the reason why this is the way 'back' from 'not to' Holt. The track heads north, level now but more rutted and wet as it flanks the marsh beside the river.

Arriving at the junction with Bridgefoot Lane we turn left toward Wiveton, this approach fits more neatly over the 2023 template we have in our heads, the bridge, albeit crowned with a dusty, rather than tarmac road looks the same, and the church stands proud above, the pub is still scruffily recognisable, the only slight difference is a road running past the front door with a grassy heater piece* in front. As we leave the village towards Blakeney we can see the remains of one of Wiveton's two windmills on our right another sign of changing times. Then it's down the hill and up as we approach the village, this is the most unfamiliar, without the towering trees of today the church looks very grand. Coming to the crossroads we have a choice, normally the wagoner would use Back Lane as the route to the quay, but perhaps seeing us as interested visitors we take the High Street.

'Through the centuries as the quays got busier the noise and horse muck became intolerable for residents in the High Street, particularly during the early hours, so the Back Lane was created to take commercial traffic away. It also led more directly to what today we call the Cart Track (opposite the Manor Hotel). This runs across the fresh marsh, surmounts the sea bank and onto a fording place through the Cley channel. The shingle arm of the spit in this world is at least 150 meters further to the north and on its landward side is a track that runs all the way to the end of the Point and lower harbour* where, during neap tides when ships cannot make it up to the quay, they sit on the sand* and wait to be loaded or unloaded into wagons'.

But here we are still only at the top of the High Street. So slowly we continue down between the cottages, immediately the myth that the street wasn't designed for cars is blown apart as we quickly realise it's even more difficult for two wagons to manage it, the one we meet is driven by a friend of our wagoner. "You got another lot a sketchers then" he asks. "No," our driver replies, I got no idea where this lot come from". It takes a little while to get the wagons past each other. As we continue the buildings of today are all there, everything looks the same, yet not the same; this isn't our world, the purposes of the building are very different, every cottage has a permanent resident and interspersed between the dwellings they all they need to survive, a self-sufficient street. As we descend, on our left the 'Top House' alias the Calthorpe Arms pub, then a baker followed by a small grocery, a tea shop, a cobbler, and a fishmonger, then another larger grocery, a butcher, and another grocery/haberdashery. Having most of the staples we need we move on to recreation; on the left the Ship pub, on the right the Anchor pub, and back across the road yet another, the place where are to stay, the White Horse Hotel. The plunge of the road ahead down to the quay offers a more pragmatic reason for why the wagoner brought his horses down the High Street.

Arriving in Holt the smell of the steam engine pervaded everything, as we come to the bottom of High Street it is the scent of the sea, the marsh, and the mud, all laced with a background mix of horse muck, grain, coal dust, and a sweet stirring of malt, where that comes from, we'll discover tomorrow. We are expected; perhaps hearing the wagon the landlord John Pye has come to greet us. Surprisingly this is a busy hotel, Blakeney is already on the map, artists and the first photographers have discovered it, and I'm so glad they did, I wouldn't be able to write this if they hadn't.

*In our world we have a constant background hum, only in the remotest places, does the silence of past centuries exist, stand and listen anywhere and you will hear a distant aeroplane, cars, or a lawnmower, only perhaps on Christmas Day you might stand in your garden and get close to something like 19th-century silence.

Heater Piece (flat iron) was used to describe the triangular patches of grass that got left between roads at junctions. The Pit today

Please note that my time machine is still in its experimental stages so may not have resolved all the details as clearly as I would like.

Day Two

The next morning John Pye introduces us to John Baines, an ovster fisherman who has kindly offered (for a price) to give us a tour of the village. 'Folla me' he demands, striding off downhill, then swinging his arm to the right says 'Thas the shipping offices of Page and Turner they got ten ships altogether and offices in Wells an Barnam Overy'. "I think he's done this before." More interestingly on the other side, we have wagons pulled up beside the granaries and coal stores; facing uphill they have large blocks under each back wheel to prevent them from slipping back downhill. The view ahead with a spring tide is beautiful, the channel is full and the marshes covered, leading north a ribbon of shingle carrying a road with small boats moored on either side, and this is the way we shall go. John tells us it's called the Carnser*. With this tide it has water on both sides, on our right it covers the marsh to the sea bank and fills it almost up to the road.

John leads us down to a wide bridge, substantial and strong enough to take wagons and carts. A couple of hundred yards further and we come to the New-Cut, John explains. 'You see this here bit a channel, thas straight, thas corse it was dug out; must a bin 70 yare ago, they say it wos dug by Boney's* prisoners of war, but I don't know nuthin about that, Ida thought they'd a gone home by then. They had a chap come here from the Tidal Harbours Commission about tharty yare ago, he told em ther'd med a mistake an that the channel ought to be allowed to wynd sorta natural like, but thas done olrite, ships kin still git up quicker than afore wen the channel went out in a big bend in the marsh on tother side'.

Coming back the view is totally different from what we are familiar with. No hotel, instead cottages warehouses and a long line of ships, not big, mostly about 50 to 60 feet, some single-masted but most of them two-masted ketches*. One is coming around the bend now being towed by a tug called the Comet, John tells us that it has recently been refurbished by the village blacksmith. 'When we git tother end I'll show yu were they do it.' Approaching the quay corner we are surprised to see the granite block that still sits in that position today*. We'll pause a moment and take in this place, the sounds; squeaking pulleys, men's voices, snorting horses, children laughing and the soft hum of physical exertion, and closer the clang of hammer on anvil, we are close by the blacksmith's quayside forge; we are used to the background noise of aircraft and traffic but this place has a different soundtrack. And smells; salty mud, horse dung, sweat, tar and smoke from the smithy. All overshadowed by looming masts, this world is painted a very different colour to our own; yet we walk over the same ground, if you stand in the same place now on a quiet winter morning when all is still you might just hear the echo of that hammer.

All along the quayside ahead the road is filled by wagons, some two-horse, some four. 'Thas mostly grain agoin out, an coal a coming in' John tell us. ' But they teark people too, the London an the Newcastle Packets go from Wells and Blekney to London and Newcastle once a fortnight'.

We are about halfway around the quay when John veers off saying, 'let's hev a look in here', we move away from the quay and turn left into a small yard, 'this here's the' Barking Dicky'* he says. 'Puzzled we say, but the sign over the door says Crown & Anchor '? 'Yare I know, but we call it the Barking Dicky*, it only sell beer', not quite sure how that explains anything. And it's in almost exactly the same place as the bar of the Blakeney Hotel today. It's also in the best place for beer; ahead John points out both a brewery and malting; 'thas were all them smells are a coming from' he says.

We get the impression that he has guided us here because he feels the need for a little refreshment himself, so we'll oblige him. The Dickey is quite small inside, with a few elderly men and some wagon drivers. It's only a cottage, after all, the air is thick with pipe smoke, being guests we are waved to the few seats available. The Landlord, Benjamin Curl, asks us what kind of beer we would like, with maltings and brewery right outside it's hardly going to be stale ale. Not being too sure what we'll get we ask for a light beer, when it comes it is much darker than we expect but tastes very good indeed.

We get into conversation with Wiliam Parker who is the village postmaster, he has one of the very first cameras that use film, he photographs village activities which he makes into postcards and sells to the sketchers (artists) with whom this village has become very popular. We comment on how busy it is outside, he says that the last few decades have probably been the busiest Blakeney has seen, the aforementioned dredging of the New Cut making a huge difference in easing the passage of ships up to the quay. But he says 'it could have been busier 'The Eastern & Midland Railway company had had plans to buy the Blakeney Harbour Company (who currently run the harbour) and bring a line from Sheringham to Blakeney, it would have carried on to Morston where they were intending to construct a branch line out to The Pit and by building an embankment along the shore from Wells to opposite Blakeney Point, embrace a much larger body of water to scour out a navigable channel for the larger vessels they envisaged using the harbour.' Sadly, for them but thankfully for us it never came to pass, the Station Master's house was built in Cley and it is said that the Blakeney Hotel was originally meant to be oil company offices.* But he says that 'now they have taken the railway to Holt instead things here are already beginning to slow down a bit'. John who is leaning on the small bar inclines his head towards the door; it's time to move on.

We pass wagon after wagon, their drivers chatting as they wait to be unloaded, John knows many of them so our progress is slow. Most of the loading is being done on men's backs, but at the end of the quay a small crane is swinging bags of grain into one of the ships, We squeeze through between the horses and on to what today is called Red House Land. A newly built Red House dominates this view, John tells us that its owner Gus Hill is a timber merchant and the quays in front and to the north are his, the space ahead is littered with the stuff from the sea: nets, ropes, buoys and boats, anchors, chains, sails and floats, spread around in considerably less order than the last few words would suggest. Ahead to the north two timber storage barns* the furthest has the masts of a ship looming over it 'There are masts sticking up above that barn', one of us says, pointing north. 'Yare says John, thas were I said I'd bring yu, thats were they fixed the Comet, There's a dry dock in there along the north side a that barn. They put ships in there on Spring tides so they kin work on 'em . They caulk 'em and tar 'em and then float 'em out when the next Springs come, or a bit sooner sometimes if the work gits done and there's a big enough tide '. Dry dock is a bit of an exaggeration for what this is as it is just a trough cut into the Marsh.

We've now come to the end of this busy place's activity and as we stand looking to the north and west the view is just as it is today, so we'll allow one image to slide over the other and come home.

* Carnser is a generic term for a road that leads to the sea or a river. Until recent times the Carnser car park today was all marsh. Half of it was still like that when I was a child. What is now and the dinghy park was muddy a crick was filled in during the 1950s and 60s with the rubble from the dismantled wartime army camps that flanked the the Morston to Langham road.

* Napoleon

These small ships were called' Billy Boys' and were ideally suited for east coast trading.

See the first illustration. This block which has a hole in the top shows up in every photo I have seen, right back to the easiest time. It could have been around for centuries. Perhaps as a base for a marker pole?

Not sure about that it looks very much like a hotel to me.

* Of these barns only, North Granary remains.



WHAT IS THE WALK ABOUT?

With rising sea levels, much of eastern England may be unimaginably transformed before our children's eyes. Thousands of people will lose their homes, and places we love will be lost to the seas. Yet no-one is talking about it.

By 2050, the oceans will have risen 30 cm above their height in 1971, and by the time today's infants are old they may have risen a scarcelyimaginable 1-2 metres - unless emergency action is taken on climate change. The likely impacts for the east of England are difficult to imagine. The Fens of Cambridgeshire, Lincolnshire and Norfolk, which provide much of the country's prime agricultural land, are already at or below sea level and will be increasingly difficult to defend. On North Norfolk's coastal plain, a string of world-famous nature reserves will be inundated and then washed away. To the east, around Happisburgh, Europe's fastest-eroding landscape will retreat at an accelerating pace, while the Norfolk Broads National Park will be transformed by floods and saltwater incursion. Nor is this strictly a coastal concern, for flood risk maps show the threat to stretch even into the heart of great inland cities, such as Cambridge and Norwich.

To raise awareness, I will be walking 180 miles from Cambridge to Norwich, almost entirely on land threatened by sea level rise.


