

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



RECIPE BY MARY NORWAK Swedish Memories

Get to grips with your collective imaginations for this bit. Here's a confession which sounds like the title of a blue film I was a Swedish au pair. More accurately, I was an au pair in Sweden, more years ago than I ought to remember. The traffic was not always one way, and there was a time when English girls were greatly in demand to look after European children and teach them the language which everyone wanted to learn. We entertained a lot, particularly outside through the long days of summer (only two hours of darkness for much of the time), and I learned about the famous Swedish smorgasbord open table. This was a delectable display of savoury foods, eaten in a traditional order. There were various kinds of breads, crispbreads and butter. Then came many varieties of pickled herrings, sardines and anchovies and Swedish caviar made from roe and rather like taramasalata. Next were meats such as kidneys, sausages, ham and jellied pork and veal. In between there would be omelettes, sauté mushrooms, pickled cucumber and beetroot, radishes, green salad and potato salad. Next a diversion to lobster salad and to salmon, ending with fruit salad and cheese.

There were smaller versions for family meals, but there was always a good selection of pickled, smoked and canned fish,

egg dishes, salads and cheeses. A constant factor was the meatball – a simple dish which could be offered with sticks as food for drinks parties. Swedish meatballs are well worth making for family use, to serve in their own juices with salad or vegetables, or to put into gravy or a home-made tomato sauce. A large batch may be made, as they freeze well, and they are delicious with pasta. Versatile really, just like me when I slaved as an au pair.

Swedish Meatballs

12 oz (350g) minced raw beef
4 oz (100g) minced fat pork
2 oz (50g) fresh breadcrumbs
8 fl oz (200ml) mixed water and creamy milk
1 tablespoon finely chopped onion
1 tablespoon butter
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper, butter for frying

Toss the onion in 1 tablespoon butter until golden brown. Soak the breadcrumbs in water and milk, then add all other ingredients and mix thoroughly. Shape into very small balls (about the size of a walnut) using two spoons dipped into cold water. Fry in butter until evenly brown, shaking the pan continuously to make the balls round. From time to time, add a little water to the pan juices, swirl the pan and pour over the meatballs. Add more butter for frying the remaining meatballs. Serve hot or cold.

Serves 4-6.

Extracts from the meeting of Blakeney Parish Council which was held on Tuesday 3^{rd} August 2021 in The Scout Hut.

Chairman's Announcements -

As Chairman, I attended the NNDC Development Committee, at which they discussed 'The Hide', Queen's Close, and the committee approved the application, however, they have said that they will look into the gates as built and that they agent was going to condition the lighting. (Members present advised that the external lighting, having been vastly reduced in the days prior to the committee meeting, is now back on in force and the District Cllr to report this back to NNDC.)

I also attended the NNDC Development Committee, at which they discussed the application to extend the caravan season at Galley Hill House (about to be known as Hilltop Retreats and not to be confused with Galley Hill Farm) and this too was approved by the NNDC committee.

As a member of the North Norfolk Town and Parish Forum, you may be interested to know that the group is in contact with the Minister, via our MP Duncan Baker, regarding second homes and holiday lets, lack of affordable housing for local people, be it rent or to purchase, potential to raise income from second homes and holiday lets etc, all which BPC and other councils have discussed over the years. Some statistics may also be of interest to you; Blakeney has a total of 301 out of 703 (that is 42.8%) properties that are Second Homes or Holiday Lets, this is the highest figure of the table, which included,

Wells (34.2%), Sheringham (26.4%), Mundesley (17.3%), Trimingham (13.6%) and Langham (26.5%). The group are asking that the Minister looks at the potential income that could be generated for the District Council and the parish and towns if they were to introduce a levy for Council Tax on these properties, and for example, an additional income from 5% of the CT Levy at band D £95.20 per household, would bring in £15,993 to Blakeney and to Sheringham, it would be as much as £45,696. To summarise the group continues to work very hard for the parishes and towns in North Norfolk.

The Clerk shared the Play Inspection report(s) with you all and Cllr Jane Armstrong has analysed these, I therefore wish to seek the views of those present, on whether to resurrect the 'Recreation Committee' in order to consider the quarterly Play Inspection reports going forward, or whether to add this job to the 'Finance & Governance Committee', or to simply leave things as they are.

Member's view is, that this would be best added to the 'Finance & Governance Committee' where the reports could then be discussed and considered more fully.

Planning Applications – PF = Full Planning Permission, PM = Planning Permission – Reserved Matters, LA = Alteration to Listed Building.

PF/21/1425 – Proposal; Demolish existing studio and replace with proposed new studio (Consent for PF/17/0653 lapsed) at, **Southdown Cottage, The Downs, Blakeney.** Resolved – No objection, subject to it being built of brick.

RV/21/1785 – Proposal; Variation of condition 2 (approved plans), 3 (restricting use to retail bakery and café) and 6 (extraction equipment) and removal of conditions 4 (no primary cooking of unprepared food) of planning permission PF/20/2515 to allow the primary cooking of unprepared food and sale of hot food on the premises at, St. Nicholas Church Hall (Two Magpies Bakery), The Quay, Blakeney. Resolved - Object; We agree with the objector, who says that the application has been a manipulation of the planning system from the very start and we agree with the objections raised. We strongly believe that this bit-by-bit application will have a detrimental effect on many businesses in the village, most of whom are currently too busy and short staffed, to probably be fully aware of what is going on. We have concerns over the installation of an extraction/ventilation system on the exterior of this building, (which we have been led to believe has already taken place), as it will look straight onto Mariners Hill, a public open space in the heart of the Conservation Area, with the noise and smells affecting the near neighbours and those using Mariners Hill. For these reasons we urge NNDC to refuse this application.

PF/21/1805 – Proposal; Demolition of redundant garages and erection of 3 dwellings with associated parking at, Land at Queens Close (old Garage Block), Blakeney. Resolved – No objection.

RV/21/1876 – Proposal; Variation of condition 2 of planning ref. PF/19/0768 to allow for revised vehicular access arrangements and associated landscaping amendments at, Hilltop Retreats (Galley Hill House), Langham Road, Blakeney. Resolved – Object, we have huge concerns over the highway safety aspect of this proposal. This site lies on a bend, on the hierarchy road into the village, and will itself be generating a higher number of vehicle movements due to its future use. We also wish to see the current hedging preserved.

PF/21/1935 – Proposal; Extension and replacement roof with raised ridge height and including dormers to north elevation and balcony to south elevation to from 9 additional staff bedrooms at, **The Blakeney Hotel, The Quay, Blakeney.** Resolved – No objection, subject to a condition being added that there is to be a restriction/control over the parking on The Pastures driveway and that these proposals do not lead to further water/sewerage problems in the immediate area.

PF/21/1937 & LA/21/1938 – Proposal; Demolition of detached outbuilding ('The Folly') and erection of 3 storey building to provide additional guest suite. Conversion of roof space to 'The Granary' with addition of dormers and rooflights to form two guest suites and erection of extension to east elevation to form entrance hall. Replacement windows in north elevation to part of second floor of the main hotel building at, The Blakeney Hotel, The Quay, Blakeney. Resolved – Due to the number of elements within this one application, we will consider each part separately and comment as such on each element.

The Folly - Object; Upon reflection, we consider this to be a vast overdevelopment of the site and an intrusion upon neighbouring properties, and we support the objections raised

by residents of Quay House. If approved, these proposals must not lead to further water/sewerage problems in the immediate area

The Granary – No objection, although we note that this means a loss of parking spaces, when the Hotel already acknowledges that is has a problem with a lack of parking spaces now. Hence, our no objection is subject to a condition being added; that there is to be a restriction/control over the parking on The Pastures driveway and that these proposals do not lead to further water/sewerage problems in the immediate area

Replacement windows in main hotel – No objection.

RV/21/1859 – Proposal; Variation of condition 2 (approved plans) of planning permission ref. no. PF/19/2219 to allow for installation of solar panel to south elevation roof slope at, Otium, High Street, Blakeney. Resolved – No objection.

PF/21/1989 – Extension and alterations to dwelling at, **Saltmarsh**, **18 Morston Road**, **Blakeney**. *Resolved* – No objection.

Accounts totalling £10,533.95 are approved and paid.

Clerk/RFO Report – Carnser Car Park and Coronation Car Park figures reported along with cashbook balances held.

The Bonfire & Fireworks committee have agreed to defer any decision about the 2021 event until September.

The 'basket swing' on the playing field, is due to be repaired by Fenland Leisure sometime this month.

Resolved to appoint Rosemary Thew as the 1 Parish Councillor to the **Dinghy Park Management Committee** and to approve the representatives on behalf of the Blakeney Sailing Club; John Seymour, Alan Collett and David Fairbrass, subject to the Dinghy Park Committee confirming that these persons comply with the recent adopted changes to those eligible to be appointed.

Resolved that having considered the **Tree Survey** dated May 2021 that we ask David Gillett to provide us with an itemised quote for all the proposed work, coded green, and then for all the proposed work coloured yellow.

Resolved to award this years 'Outstanding Contribution to the Community Award' 2021, to Rachel Bould, for spearheading a super community response in light of the Covid pandemic, this recognition and award to be announced at the Party on The Pastures on 22nd August.

Resumption of BPC Meetings —We have booked the Scout Hut for our Parish Council meetings for the time-being, as it is more spacious than the Parish Office. However, the venue is only permitted to allow a certain number of people inside due to Covid restrictions we will have to manage accordingly, and so for now, if you do wish to join us at a meeting, if you could please let the The Clerk know in advance that you plan to attend (a quick phone call or an email), that would be helpful and we will set the room out accordingly.



Thoughts from the Rectory for September 2021

Dear Friends,

I dare say the name Hildegard of Bingen will be unfamiliar to some readers. But I thought I'd share a bit about her, because she was such a fascinating woman. The reason I mention her now is that she is remembered in the calendar of saint's halfway through this month (17th September).

Hildegard was a remarkable person, and her accomplishments are all the more notable for having been achieved by a woman in what was then a largely male-dominated world.

She was born in 1098 AD, the youngest of ten children, and brought up in SW Germany. At the age of 15, she became a nun, in the Benedictine tradition, and in due course prioress of the monastery in 1136. She had a series of thirteen visions, which she recorded, making it clear that these were not dreams or hallucinations, but had come to her "when she was awake, and looking around with a clear mind, in open places according to the will of God." In these writings, including "The Book of Divine Works", she described the essential and dynamic unity of all living things under God. She wrote poetry too, which has been likened to that of Dante or Blake.

She was also an accomplished musician, and produced 77 superb and original pieces of music, written for her nuns to sing. I've had a CD of her music for years, and I still find it beautiful and powerful. Her writings and music are still being published and recorded.

But she didn't shut herself off from the world at all. She was a speaker, and counsellor, and wrote letters of advice to popes and emperors. Before the murder of Thomas à Becket, she wrote to Henry II, warning him about the abuse of power!

I love the idea of someone who managed to combine the contemplative life with the urge to speak truth to power. She managed to sustain a sense of the beauty and sacredness of life and the created world, while stirring things up to make sure that the world and its people were treated properly!

At this time of climate crisis, for example, I reckon we all need to try to emulate that: cherish the world, and challenge the complacent!

We are extremely grateful to him for his unstinting service.

I would also like to thank our serving flood wardens, very ably led by Andy Gonzalez and Calum Meadows, for all they do for us. We are in safe hands- because of their broad local knowledge, flood wardens perform a vital role in translating intelligence from the Environment Agency into life-saving action on the ground. We do need additional flood wardens; if you would like to become involved in this important role, please do get in touch and I will pass your details on.

Flood events are going to become more common and we need to be prepared. One of the great difficulties in Cley in a flood event is knowing which properties are occupied. If you own a second or holiday home, we <u>really</u> need your contact details so we can easily find out whether your property is occupied or not at the time of a flood alert or warning. This information could save lives: so please send your details to the clerk on <u>clerk.cley@gmail.com</u> and we will keep them securely.

We are still looking for one more person to complete our community speed watch team which is otherwise ready to go. Training will be provided and time commitment is an only couple of hours a month.

Our superfast broadband is now live in most of the village! Whether or not you submitted a voucher, you can contact your provider of choice to get a quote and be connected.



Go to the right place for health help this summer

The NHS in Norfolk and Waveney has launched an eyecatching new campaign urging both residents and holidaymakers to choose the right service for illnesses and injuries this summer.

Called "happy healthy holidays", the initiative is being spearheaded by NHS Norfolk and Waveney Clinical Commissioning Group with the aim of reducing the number of people going to emergency departments (A&Es) with minor problems.

It reminds both residents and visitors of the wide range of support which is available for anyone who needs medical help. As well as **self-caring** for minor illnesses and injuries using a well-stocked first aid kit, people can:

 Contact NHS 111 by calling 111 or visiting 111.nhs.uk for advice on what to do and where best to go for treatment for urgent medical problems.

Anyone who thinks they need A&E should call 111 first, and they can book a time slot at an emergency department if necessary. Calling 111 first will help urgent and emergency care services to maintain social distancing and ensure that patients receive the right care in the right place, in a timely and safe way

- Visit a **pharmacy** for expert help and advice on common conditions such as hayfever, colds, cuts and bruises and insect bites. Pharmacies also offer free lateral flow tests so that people without symptoms can regularly test themselves for COVID-19.
- Drop into the NHS **Walk-In Centre** at Rouen House on Rouen Road in Norwich. Open between 7am and 9pm daily, it can help with minor cuts and wounds, strains and sprains and skin complaints.
- Go to the **Minor Injuries Unit (MIU)** in Cromer or Wisbech, which have x-ray facilities and can provide treatment for minor wounds, burns, simple fractures and other injuries. People can call 111 for their locations and opening times.

Dr Anoop Dhesi, a local GP and Chair of NWCCG, said: "Across the NHS, we are seeing demand for services rise. By reminding people of the options which are available for more minor complaints, we hope that we can reduce pressure on our emergency departments and keep them free to focus on treating patients with life-threatening illnesses or injuries.

"Although we are specifically targeting this campaign at holiday-makers, we'd also like to take the opportunity to remind local people of the range of help which is available. By going to the right place first time, you will often be seen faster, which means that you can get back to enjoying your day more quickly."



The Norfolk Coast Dark Skies Festival is returning for its 3rd year this autumn. With an emphasis on wildlife and the dark, a range of face-to-face and online events will include wildlife walks at night, stargazing, soundwalk, talks, podcasts and activities. The 2-week long festival launches on Saturday 25th September at Thornham Village Hall and will celebrate the stunning dark skies and landscapes of the area as well as raise awareness about issues of increasing light pollution.

We are really lucky as the Norfolk Coast is one of the darkest areas in the UK. This contributes towards the rural character and feelings of remoteness and tranquillity that we enjoy here. Our wildlife also benefits enormously from the dark night-time – whether they use it to hunt, to hide from predators, reproduce, migrate or simply to sleep like we do.

Unfortunately, light pollution can have a negative effect on our wildlife, our well-being and the rural atmosphere of the coast. Through this festival we can discover the wonders of our environment after dark and learn how we can all do our bit to preserve the night skies. We're very interested in talking to parish councils, businesses and organisations who are keen to become more dark skies friendly.





SALTHOUSE PoW LOVE STORY SPARKS PLOT FOR NEW NOVEL

The unexpected discovery of a prisoner of war camp at Salthouse during the Second World War provided inspiration for the latest novel by local author, Sarah Mitchell, launched this summer. 'The English Girl', published by Bookouture, is based on historical events unearthed by the author during research for her first novel, 'The Lost Letters', set in Wellsnext-the-sea.

Bardhill Camp, located behind the Dun Cow pub, was an RAF base which housed German and Italian prisoners of war from 1946-1947. The prisoners were kept on after the war ended to clear mines from the beaches. Although collaboration was initially illegal, a local girl from Cley, Janette Dams, fell in love with one of the German soldiers and they later married, much to the disapproval of certain members of the community.

Mitchell said, "Despite having lived in Letheringsett for nearly 20 years, I had no idea that there was a PoW camp on this part of the coast and it was exciting to come across evidence of its existence. The relationship between the villagers and the PoWs is documented on the Salthouse village website; in December 1946 each household was asked to host a PoW for Christmas lunch and this opened the gates to relationships being forged, creating tension and unease in a small rural community."

'The English Girl' is a fictional account of these events set amidst the atmospheric landscape of Cley marshes during the bitterly cold winter of 1946. It imagines the impact of the prison camp and the sudden presence of captured soldiers upon a small community, sparking mixed emotions for those facing the loss of loved ones killed in battle. The narrative features a young girl, Fran, who meets and falls in love with Thomas, a German prisoner, forcing her to embark upon a journey of secrets and betrayal.

Sarah Mitchell, a barrister, grew up in Norfolk and graduated from the UEA's Masters programme in Creative Writing in 2015. This is her third novel. 'An English Girl' is available from Amazon in paperback or kindle format, in paperback from Jarrold's book department, and can also be ordered from other local bookshops.


